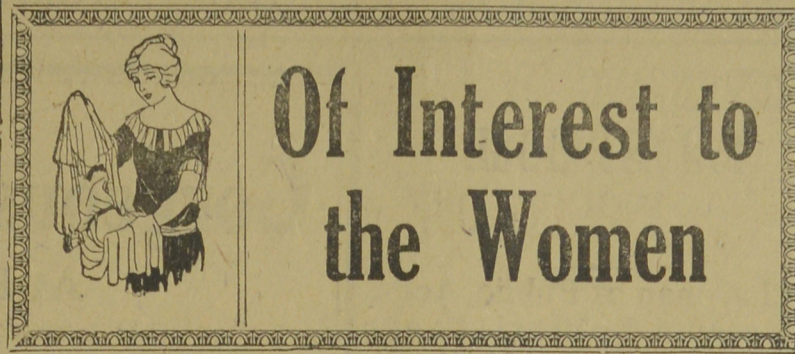

DANCE FROCKS.

The youngest girl has a dance dress with a full skirt this season. It is filmy, it is light in character it is lacy with ruffles and frills, it is in every sense a youngish thing with all the spirit of the modern young girl woven into it. There are infinite varieties in its make-up. There are many variations of its style.

At dances recently many types of this sort of dress were seen and admired by the throng that looked on and by the throng of those who were not quite on to the latest thing in fashion, but who longed to know what was what and to imitate.

There was a dress with a fitted bodice made of printed chiffon with a very light blue background of color and a scattering of rose bouquets over its surface. This was made with a full skirt and a five-inch fold of lightish blue maline for the hem upon which were applied some of the bouquets cut from the material of the frock itself.

There was another frock of this same general character made of maline in a pinkish blond tone. There were many tiers of flounces on the skirt, and there was a flounce wound about the bodice of the maline, with simple shoulder straps for the same material for purposes of holding the frock together. This was extraordinarily becoming to the frail short-haired thing who wore it. She had wits enough to know her own style and make the best of it. A bright future might almost be predicted for her knowing that she had brains enough to wear so extraordinarily becoming a thing.

Another dress is made of chiffon in one of the pastel colors—any one that happens to be a becoming favorite. It is trimmed with rows of ruffled narrow lace. It is distinctly girlish in all of its characteristics and strangely enough, it appeals with the greatest amount of strength to the members of this sophisticated younger generation which surrounds us and—sometimes but not this time—shocks us. This time everyone approves and gives this dance dress the utmost of their approval.

Dresses of satin or crepe with long rings of silk threads making the skirts are more than popular, and with older women as well as the younger girls. They are done in all of the popular pastel colorings and they have a way of conforming their lines to the given figure with the utmost of grace and style.

There is another sort of dance dress which is generally given favor and that which must be conformed to the figure—that is, it must be chosen or designed to fit a given set of lines. It never drapes twice in the same fashion and it never has two swinging panels of the same sort.

But wherever a bulging line occurs there should be a swinging panel to cut the ungainliness of effect, and wherever there is too thin and straight a line, there a bit of draping will appear to fill out the lack. The dress is part of the general tendency in the direction of individual styles, and it is a matter of lines only—of beautifully consecutive drapings.
