

BIG PULPWOOD
SEASON IN N. B.
NEARING CLOSE

Peeling About Done and
Cutting of Wood Into
Lengths Under Way
—Scott Interests are
Active.

With the full moon of August, Monday the 23rd inst., pulpwood peeling operations will have ceased after the biggest season which New Brunswick has experienced in some time, possibly the biggest ever. After the August full moon the pulpwood will not peel.

J. M. Scott, M. L. A., and J. Stanley Scott of this city are among the chief pulpwood operators in this section. During the summer they have had several hundred men employed in various camps throughout the province. York, Sunbury and Queen's Counties are the chief seat of operations but operations also were carried on in Kent, King's and Northumberland Counties. At the present time peeling is pretty well through and the crews are at work cutting the wood into lengths.

Winter Operations.
Winter operations on pulpwood are largely confined to hauling it from the woods to the railway sidings or transportation to the pulp mills. These operations are generally separate from the woods operations and are contracted for on a different basis.

American and Local Market.
The American market is taking pulpwood freely at the present time and the New Brunswick market also is good the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company buying large quantities. That company adopted the policy of letting its own limits grow and buying from farmers and other operators the pulpwood which was needed for the Union Point mill. That policy is to be continued. Last winter the cutting of logs on the Nashwaak River was greatly curtailed about nine million feet being cut and this year it is understood there will be hardly any logging done by the company, supplies being bought in the market.

Has Auto Agency.
Mr. E. A. Betton of this city has secured the Maritime agency for the Morris-Oxford and Morris-Cowley automobiles. These cars are of English manufacture and enjoy immense popularity in the Old Country. A feature of these cars which will make a strong appeal to motorists is that they will run thirty miles on one gallon of gasoline. Mr. Betton's father, Mr. J. Edgar Betton of London, England, who has had a long and successful experience as a salesman is associated with him in the enterprise.

Returning to England.
Mr. J. Edgar Betton of Surrey, England, who has been visiting his son, Mr. E. A. Betton, here for some weeks will return to England next week. Mr. Betton has for some years been the Old Country representative of Moir's Limited, chocolate manufacturers of Halifax, and has been successful in establishing a large trade for that concern on the other side. He had made up his mind to retire from business and take up his residence here, but the company absolutely refused to listen to such a proposal. They made Mr. Betton an attractive offer which he has decided to accept. He plans to sail from Halifax the latter part of next week.

GOVERNMENT
MEETING ON
MONDAY NIGHT.
The Provincial Government is to hold its regular August meeting here next week. The session is to open at eight o'clock Monday night. The ministers and other members are expected to arrive during the day on Monday. The rate of stumpage for the ensuing year already has been subject for discussion at a caucus and it is expected that a decision will be reached and the rate announced. As a reduction was made last year it is believed that an increase in the rate of stumpage will be made.

ASSIGNMENT IN MARYSVILLE.
G. Leonard Inch, Butcher Has \$3,000 Liabilities, Assets Negligible.

An assignment has been made by G. Leonard Inch of Marysville, butcher, to E. A. MacKay of this city, official receiver, for the benefit of his creditors. The latter include a number of Jewish cattle dealers of Fredericton. Liabilities amount to \$3,002.40 and assets to \$54.92. The business was taken over some time ago by Mrs. Sadie C. Pickard of Marysville who has a chattel mortgage for \$1,800. She is now conducting the business.

REGISTRARS
NOT ALL NAMED IN
YORK-SUNBURY

Registration Has Been
Begun in the Majority
of Polling Divisions—
Additions are Not Numerous.

J. B. Hawthorne, High Sheriff of York, who has been appointed returning officer for the constituency of York-Sunbury in the Federal general election to be held September 14th, has not yet secured all the registrars to act in the various polling sub-divisions throughout the two counties. Several have still to consent to act. It is expected to have the list completed in the course of a few days. H. G. Fenety is clerk to the Returning Officer.

Registration of voters has begun already. A. C. Fleming and J. H. Hawthorne are the registrars for No. 1 and No. 2 Divisions of Fredericton and have registered a considerable number of names. Registration also has been begun in other polling divisions where registrars have consented to act.

Young Voters Registering.
The registration is largely of names of voters who came of age since the last registration for the election of October, 1925. The number is not large. Omissions also are being rectified. As polling does not take place until a month from tomorrow there is still ample time.

Calcium Carbide Used
City Engineer J. D. MacKay on Thursday had city employees at work treating the gravel roadways in Waterloo Row and Woodstock Road with calcium chloride. Enough of the latter was purchased to treat fairly long stretches of road experimentally. The calcium chloride is for the purpose of laying dust and improving the surface of the road.
