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Truro Well on Way to Maritime Hockey Title

Overwhelmed Campbellton in First Game of Maritime Playoff — North Shore Team Will Have to Go Some to Overcome Lead in Next Game.

Truro, N. S., March 9.—The Truro Bearcats tonight took a firm hold on the Maritime hockey championship when they defeated Campbellton, champions of New Brunswick and winners over the Abergweits, of Charlottetown, by a score of 6 to 0.

Twenty-five hundred excited fans cheered to the echo as the Nova Scotia champions nosed ahead in the race and steadily increased the lead to a safe margin; safe not only for the first home and home playoff for the 1926 Maritime championship but a lead that will make it almost impossible for Campbellton to overcome in the second game of the series that is to be played at Campbellton on Friday evening.

Murdock Starts Score.

Murdock started the score one minute after the whistle in the first frame, and before the end of the game the stalwart defence rolled up five goals with Murdock taking the sixth.

The Campbellton team was outclassed in every point of the game. Unable to get in effective combination, the New Brunswick champions were kept back in their own territory by the checking and stick-handling of Kuhn, Smith and Murdock.

Gets 66 Shots.

McKenzie, in the New Brunswick net, received 66 shots to handle, while Guinan had things easy with only 11 shots reaching him. The game was not in the same class as others played in the arena this season. However, both teams worked hard. Reliefs were called out frequently, substituting in pairs nearly every time the whistle sounded.

Referees Butler and Moore handled the game in fine style, and little time was lost, so quickly did they get the puck moving after a mislay.

The penalties were few, both teams drawing an equal share.

Boston, March 9.—The New York Americans defeated the Boston Bruins here tonight 1 to 0 and complicated considerably the task of the Boston team in clinching a play-off position in the National Hockey League.

Billy Burch, New York centre, netted the one goal of the game in the first period and after that the Americans gave a masterly exhibition of defensive play that robbed the famous Boston attack of all its sting.

ANCIENT SKULL IS UNEARTHED

Copenhagen, March 8.—The skull of the oldest Scandinavian has been unearthed at Bo, in the Swedish province of Bohuslan.

According to Dr. H. Hagg, of the Stockholm Rigmuseum and Prof. C. M. Furst, it is the only known skull of the Ancylus period, 9,000 years ago, when the Baltic was a fresh water lake, and southern Sweden, with the Danish Islands, were joined up with continental Europe.

FUR GARMENT STRIKERS ARE DISPERSED

New York, March 8.—A platoon of police, some of them using their clubs dispersed 500 striking fur workers today when they attempted to hold a demonstration in downtown Manhattan today. One hundred men and twenty-five women strikers were arrested on charges of disorderly conduct.

The disturbance was the first of any importance since 12,000 fur workers in more than 2,000 shops went on strike February 16 for a 40-hour week and an unemployment fund to guarantee against seasonal layoffs.

CANADIENS MAY COMBINE WITH SASKATOON

Dandurand is Non-Committal on Rumor — Western League Not Business Success During Present Season.

Montreal, March 10.—A report is going the rounds in local professional hockey circles to the effect that next year the Canadiens, last year's National League champions, and Saskatoon, at present leading the Western professional Hockey League, will combine to play as the Canadiens at the new Mount Royal Arena here.

Managing-Director Leo Dandurand, of the local French-Canadian squad, did not care to make any statement in connection with the rumor today, but certain circumstances at present evident, would make the report look to have some foundation.

In the first place, it seems certain that the Prairie teams, now in the Western loop, will get rid of their franchises at the end of this season. The long jumps to the Coast have been too hard on them in a financial way, and the lack of artificial ice in the mid-west has made home games near the end of the season very uncertain. Saskatoon and Regina will most certainly drop out of the western league, and that organization will redevelop once again into practically the old Pacific Coast circuit with the addition probably of Edmonton and Calgary.

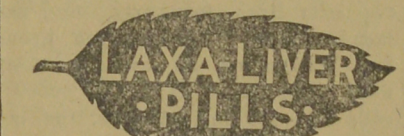
