GARRISON HAS FIFTY FIRSTS TO CREDIT IN 1926

Single G. for Stud Next Spring — New York Sale is Attracting Many Buyers.

Single G. 1.58½ has been retired and will enter the stud next Spring. The horses of the late Charles Weiland go to the New York auction. Wayne Hal has been winning down in Maryland getting a mark of 2.16¼. The money-winning system of classification is to be given a thorough trial next season.

Benelwyn, the two year old brother to Mr. McElwyn, 1.59½ has taken a record of 2.17.

Walter Garrison is the leading race-winning reinsman of the year with 50 first moneys to his credit. Gill Wetmore of Vernon, N. Y. has bought Atlanta Georgia, 3 year old pacing brother to Abbedale, 2.01¼. Oakhurst Farm's two year old Quite Expressive 2.27¼ is a sister to Escotillo, 2.03½ and Finvarra 2.05¼.

Guy Richard 2.02½ will not be trained next year but will be in the stud at Kingston Farm, Lexington, Ky.

McNally Used in Vacancy in Three-quarter Line — Pierson and Holmes Reserves — Mt. Allison is Saying Little About Its Team This Season.

The University of New Brunswick's rugby football squad will leave by motor-bus this morning for Sackville where the team will play Mt. Allison University Thursday afternoon in the first of a home-and-home series in the Western Intercollegiate section. A number of "rooters" also will motor to Sackville to see the match. Coach C. B. Burden and Manager J. B. Carr accompany the squad which is composed of the following:— forwards Woods, McLenahan, MacMurray, Dalzell, Macaulay, Fowler, Petrie; halves, Donohoe (capt.), Currie, Chestnut; three-quarters, Goodspeed, McNally, Steen, McCaffrey; fullback, Hickson; reserves, Pierson, Holmes.

Saying Very Little.

CANADIENS MAY FACE LAW SUIT RE ICE

Montreal, Oct. 26—All professional hockey games in Montreal will be played at the Forum this winter.

It is learned that the owners of the Canadiens have signed a contract with the management of the Forum to play all their national hockey league home fixtures at the West End rink. With the Montreal Maroons having the Forum as their permanent home, the switch of the Canadiens from the Mount Royal Arena will give the Forum 48 home games this season.

Hector Racine, president of the Mount Royal Arena, stated that the Arena management would ask the Canadiens to live up to their contract which still has four years to go. It is understood that in the negotiations the Canadiens offered the Mount Royal Arena as high as \$50,000 or a release from their contract. Mr. Racine would not state whether his company proposed court action or not.

MAORI FIFTEEN WON IN WALES

GREB WON TITLE WITH ONE EYE

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 26—Harry Greb, former middleweight champion, who died here Friday, won his title and also the major portion of his boxing honors while blind in one eye. This was vouchsafed by friends today when their pledge of secrecy had been removed by the death of the fighter.

Greb, they said, had been totally blind in his right eye following an injury he sustained in a bout with "Kid" Norfolk in 1921. Last summer the left eye became infected and Greb was told that the only means of saving what was left of his sight was to have the other eye removed at once. He consented and last month entered a hospital under an assumed name. The operation was successful and it was impossible to detect a glass eye which had been substituted.

Lalonde Signs Scott of Saskatoon for New York Americans — Young Players for Minor Pros.

Montreal, Oct. 26—Another player squabble may result, following an announcement made today by Manager "Newsy" Lalonde, of the New York Americans, of the National Hockey League that he had signed Laurie Scott former centre man of the Saskatoon Sheiks and ordered him to report to the star-spangled squad next Wednesday at Niagara Falls.

The Toronto St. Patricks claim a string on Scott, but Manager Lalonde said here today that he had received Scott's signed contract and would protest any interference on the part of the Greenshirts.

The Gotham pilot has sent out notices to all his players to report for training at Niagara Falls on Wednesday of this week. The Niagara rink will be used by the Americans again this season.

St. Pats are not the only ones who feel a little badly over the signing of Scott by Lalonde, Manager Cecil Hart of the Canadiens also expressed himself as having wanted the former Sheik.

"I'd have gone after him," Mr. Hart said "but I laid off when the league awarded him to Toronto at the meeting last week."

There is no doubt that the move of Lalonde will stir up considerable fuss before long.
