

M'GOLDRICK
SWEARS THAT HE
STOLE THE COAT

Georgt Crowley Charged With the Offence—Evidence Completed This Morning—Remanded Until Friday.

An unexpected development occurred in the case against George Crowley charged with the theft of an overcoat, John McGoldrick who is under sentence of two years in penitentiary for stealing fur coats from J. Clark & Son, Limited, stating on the stand that he stole the coat from an automobile.

The case was heard on Tuesday and was completed this morning Crowley being remanded until Friday for judgment. P. J. Hughes, K. C., appeared for the prosecution and C. R. Barry for the defence.

The coat which Crowley is alleged to have stolen is the property of Kenneth Staples and was taken at the time of the U. N. B. "Con" last February. Crowley sold it to Ed. Wilkins for five dollars and his arrest followed.

McGoldrick when brought up from gaol and placed on the stand swore that he stole the coat about three weeks ago from a standing automobile. He hid the coat in a field and then gave it to Crowley who sold it. Mr. Hughes cross-examined the witness but he stuck to the story.

Chase Remanded Until Monday

FINANCES OF
HOSPITAL ARE
IMPROVING

Gratifying Information Given Trustee Board at November Meeting—Isolation Hospital Now Clear of Patients

At the November meeting of the Trustee Board of Victoria Hospital the unusual and cheering information was given that the financial position of the institution had been improving for several months and that expenditures were being reduced.

The Board dealt with a variety of matters.

Dr. Ross, president, was in the chair. The other members present included Mrs. C. D. Richards, Mrs. Daniel Richards, Col. Loggie, Chancellor Jones, His Worship, Mayor Clark, Ald. Goodspeed, Ald. McKnight, Ald. Davidson, Coun. Rowley Manzer, Marysville.

Hospital Lighting.

The president directed attention to several matters deferred at the last meeting, including the proposal for lighting the hospital. Ald. Goodspeed from the committee having this matter in hand was able to make a very satisfactory report upon the project. He explained that the city council had been sympathetic in the matter and agreed to allow the Trustees to conserve the present waste to produce electrical power for lighting Victoria Public Hospital; all necessary expenses to be undertaken by the hospital.

After most of the members had expressed their views upon the scheme, and after thanks of the Board had been extended to the Mayor and members of the city council and others who had assisted the committee, Mr. Goodspeed was authorized to go ahead with this expected expense-saver.

The repairs committee was authorized to proceed with some concrete work in connection with the nurses' home. It was proposed to defer this work until next season, but this did not prevail.

Statistics.

Miss Pringle in her monthly report as Superintendent shows that 104 patients were treated in October. Of these 69 were medical and 14 were surgical cases. In the maternity department there were 5 births. One contagious case was admitted; 44 operations were performed, 17 major and 27 minor; 57 X-Ray examinations; maximum number patients in one day 43; minimum, 25.

Miss Helen Roelofson, a graduate of Guelph General Hospital Training School has taken up her duties as O. R. charge nurse. Miss Crothers who was acting in this position since the resignation of Miss Stone, has resumed her regular work as Night Supervisor.

Isolation Hospital.

The Superintendent also reports that both floors of the Isolation hospital were in use during October. The scarlet fever floor has been occupied continuously since early in July; it was closed today.

Gift of Books.

Mrs. A. C. Moore of Stanley has offered to donate to the hospital many (Continued on page 5.)

LEE ROGERS OF
MEDUCTIC MET
DEATH ON C. N. R.

Crushed by Rock Tuesday While Working on Extra Gang—Accident Occurred at Mile Sixteen.


Lee Rogers of Meductic lost his life at Mile 16 on the Fredericton-Saint John subdivision of the Canadian National Railways on Tuesday. The unfortunate man was crushed by a rock at about 10.30 in the morning and expired an hour later. His body was shipped to his home last night and the funeral took place this afternoon at Meductic.

Rock Slipped Slightly.

Rogers was a member of an extra gang which was at work hauling rock for filling at various points along the Saint John River where the current had washed away material. The gang was at work sixteen miles from Westfield. A chain was being placed about a large rock which was being lifted on a flat-car. In some way the rock slipped and slid a short distance. The distance was sufficient to catch Rogers and crush him. Aid was given the unfortunate man but his injuries were too severe for his life to be saved.

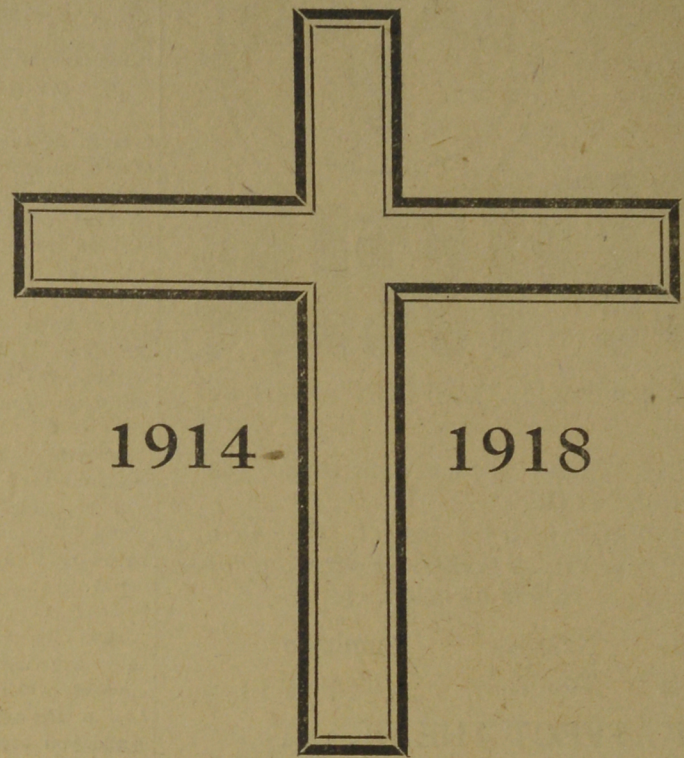
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MUSIC FROM DARK
