### Egg Laying Contest.

The Barred Rock pen of George Wood of Carter's Point is leading in the New Brunswick egg laying contest with a total of 417 eggs and 419.5 points. The pen of Morris Steven of Hoyt is in second place with 335 eggs and 368.3 points, this being the only pen with more points than eggs. A. T. Reid's pen is in third place with 441 eggs and 367.6 points and next in order is John Moore's with 360 eggs and 312.6 points. The total yield of eggs last week was 573.

### Eggs Are Plentiful.

The mild weather during the early part of January caused the hens to speed up in eggs production, consequently house-holders are getting fresh eggs at the lowest prices in years for the month of January. The prevailing price is 50 and 55 cents per dozen. Mr. Fred H. Ferguson, who keeps a large flock of bred to lay hens is selling strictly fresh eggs over the counter for fifty cents a dozen and is finding a keen demand for them. He says that a large increase in production has enabled him to lower the price.

John Sues Wife Living in Bangor, Me., Who

## Casey vs. Casey.

In Edith Casey vs. Clifford Casey the plaintiff wife is residing in Barker's Point, York County, and the defendant husband formerly of Newcastle, in Portland, Me. The plaintiff before marriage named Jones was married to the defendant by Rev. Earle A. Kinley, Baptist, at Newcastle, June 27, 1920. She alleges non-support. They lived with the husband's parents in Newcastle. The wife later removed to Marysville and Barker's Point supporting herself and a daughter Marguerite, being an employee of Canadian

Cottons Limited. The plaintiff alleges that she last saw the defendant at Boiestown in July 1924 and that Emma O'Donnell of McNamee gave birth to a child in September of that year of which he was the father. Other women unknown to the plaintiff also are named as correspondents.

## Vaughan vs. Vaughan.

In Warren W. Vaughan vs. Edith Maude Chase Vaughan, both parties are residents of Saint John. Rev. David Hutchinson, Baptist, married them November 20, 1918. The plaintiff alleges that the wife left him in August 1924 and went to Boston to live. Herbert M. Wyman of Saint John is named correspondent.

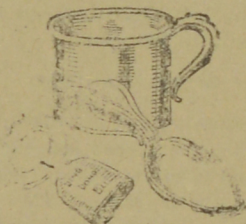
## Knowlton vs. Knowlton.

In Jessie Berteaux Knowlton vs. Eldridge Bryson Knowlton, the name of the plaintiff prior to marriage was Hatheway. She was married to the defendant by Rev. R. P. The plaintiff alleges that she left her husband in January, 1925, because of his misconduct. On one occasion as the result of receiving an anonymous telephone message to the effect that the defendant had gone with a woman to the summer home of the mother of the plaintiff in Millidgeville, the plaintiff and her sister proceeded to Millidgeville by taxi. At the summer home they found the defendant partially clothed. He told them to get out. Misconduct with women unknown to the plaintiff is alleged.
