EX-PREMIER AND GARLAND HAVE ISSUED STATEMENTS; NEW GOVT. TO IMPLEMENT LEGISLATION

Ottawa, July 4.—The government proposes to implement all legislation passed this session by both houses of Parliament, but which failed to obtain the royal assent, before dissolution insofar as it is possible to do so under the law. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Prime Minister, made this clear.

Mr. Meighen and his acting ministers met in council Saturday, but the Premier said that he had no announcement to make at the conclusion of the meeting.

Quiet Week-End.

The capital is enjoying the quietest week-end in nearly a year. The majority of the members were on their way back home before Saturday night. Premier Meighen spent an hour in his office today and went home without giving out any statement. Ex-Premier King spent the week-end at his country home in the Gatineau Hills.

No announcement concerning the personnel of the new cabinet is expected for some days yet. The date of the election may not be announced for a couple of weeks. The middle of September is still spoken of as the probable time, but there is nothing official on the subject.

Declaring that a "serious question arises as to whether Parliament has been legally and constitutionally dissolved, seeing there was no prorogation notwithstanding that both Houses of Parliament were in session with His Excellency, the Governor-General was present in the capital at the time," Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, ex-prime minister, tonight issued a statement on the constitutional question.

Commenting that the only notice that parliament was dissolved, was a letter to the Speaker from the Under-Secretary of State and that "Senators and members of the House of Commons were informed by messengers and page boys that their presence was no longer required," Mr. King adds: "This method of assuming to dissolve parliament is quite contrary to constitutional usage and law."

Attacks Premier.

After quoting authorities on procedure to support his contention Mr. King adds:

"But Canada's Prime Minister is apparently not hampered by either British or Canadian constitutional law and practice. After the declaration by the Commons on the night previous that their actions were a violation and an infringement of the provisions of the House, Mr. Meighen's acting ministers could not face parliament even for the purpose of having it prorogued or dissolved. He therefore advised a course which would not be tolerated in Great Britain and is a violation of constitutional law and practice in Canada and has assumed responsibility for an act of the crown which is in contempt of the rights and dignity of parliament."

Raises Doubt.

After quoting a number of authorities on procedure, Mr. King raised a doubt that "a proclamation communicated by a member of the Civil Service," would be sufficient notice of dissolution. He rehearses the procedure followed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1911 when two proclamations were issued dissolving parliament. One made it clear that only the fact that the Senate had previously adjourned to a later date prevented the usual announcement in both Houses, and that therefore parliament was prorogued on Sept. 7. On the same day (July 29) a second proclamation was issued dissolving parliament a third issued writs for an election, and a fourth summoned parliament to meet again on Oct. 11.

Members Ignored.

"In the present case," says Mr. King, "Mr. Meighen has assumed to dissolve parliament by a single proclamation enclosed in a letter addressed to the speakers of both houses by a deputy minister. Under the proclamation issued, parliament was not even prorogued to any date. Though both houses of parliament were in session, the governor-general was not permitted to meet parliament in person. Senators and members of the House of Commons were completely ignored, their presence in fact being treated with contempt."

"The first breach of the constitution of Canada was led to and been followed by other serious infractions and violations of the rights of the Canadian people. In circumstances so serious, it becomes the duty of all who cherish liberty to consider how far the validity of parliamentary proceedings and of public and private right is being affected by the unconstitutional course being pursued, and to make their opinions known in no uncertain manner."

Statement by Garland.

The following statement which, according to E. J. Garland, former member for Bow River, has been authorized by a conference of the Progressive group was made public by Mr. Garland tonight:

"On Tuesday, June 29, it was made known that Mr. Meighen had accepted an invitation to form a government. This he did without having communicated with the Progressives or seeking their co-operation."

"A conference of the Progressive group took place the same day during the course of which a telephone communication was received by Mr. Forke requesting him to meet His Excellency the Governor-General. Seized of the importance of the situation, the group, after discussion, undertook to give to Mr. Forke a memorandum for his guidance in any conference that might take place. It was clearly understood by all our members, first, that the memorandum was simply a guide for Mr. Forke; secondly, a general indication that we were prepared to act fairly with the new administration and facilitate that completion of the session's business and thirdly, was purely voluntarily and in sense could it be considered as a contract."

Promise Denied.

"It was, of course, always based on the assumption that the new ministry was legally constituted and capable of functioning. The memorandum was not addressed to His Excellency, nor was any other communication from the Progressives directed to the governor-general. Mr. Meighen had no assurance from our group nor did he seek an assurance. No promise was broken, for no promise had been made. However, had the Conservative temporary government been legally and constitutionally established, the Progressives would undoubtedly have given it assistance in completing the work of the session. This fact may be proved by the following incidents:

Meighen interviewed.

1. The Progressives requested an interview with Mr. Meighen and secured it at the very time when Mr. Forke was being consulted by His Excellency. In this interview no mention whatever was made of co-operation or assistance and it was solely for the purpose of ascertaining the procedure that Mr. Meighen intended to adopt.

2. A majority of Progressives rejected the purely partisan fiscal motion introduced by the Liberals.

Reasons For Dismissal.

"We assisted in dismissing the Conservative shadow government for the following reasons:

"(1) It was not legally capable of functioning either as to the introduction of money bills, or estimates, or in the letting of necessary contracts."

"(2) The act of Mr. Meighen in attempting to usurp the functions of government in so illegal a manner is evident when it is known that the proper step for Mr. Meighen to have taken was to have sought properly elected and sworn his ministry."

"(3) The action of the Governor-General in refusing to accept the advice of his advisor, the late prime minister, was unconstitutional and calculated to restore Canada to a purely colonial status."

"Following the declaration by Parliament that his acting ministers violated the provisions of the House, Mr. Meighen had at least three courses open to him:

"(1) It was still possible for him to seek the necessary adjournment and properly establish his ministry, when the session's work could have been concluded."

"(2) Resign office and allow the late ministry of Mr. King to be recalled. As less than one month has passed since the change in the House occurred, it was legally possible for the late ministry to return and complete its work."

"(3) Mr. Meighen, himself of all his alleged ministry legally sworn in as prime minister, etc., could have and should have secured royal assent to the legislation which had passed both Houses. This would have included the agricultural credits bill, the revaluation of soldiers' land bill, the Montreal harbor bill, the Hudson Bay Railway and much other legislation and estimates."

Meighen Blamed.

"That he failed to do any of the above, but advised the summary dismissal of Parliament, without either meeting Parliament, or arranging for the assent to the legislation constitutes not only a breach of faith to the people of Canada, but a disgusting insult to the people's representatives. But worse still, by advice to the Crown, Mr. Meighen made His Excel-

p. m. Physiology, (Leaving).

Decrease From Last Year.

Fewer candidates are writing these departmental examinations at the seventeen examining stations throughout the Province, than wrote last year. In 1925 there were 1529 candidates writing and this year there are 1403. There is a decrease particularly in Normal School candidates, and slight decreases in the numbers of Superior and Matriculation candidates. There are more High School Leaving candidates the number being 106 compared with 82 last year.

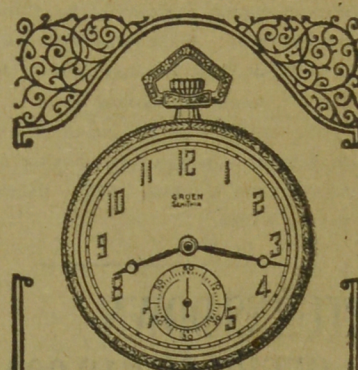
More in This City.

However more candidates will write at Fredericton this year than last. Fewer will write Normal School Entrance but more will take the Matriculation and High School Leaving.

The three chief examining stations are Fredericton, Saint John and Moncton. The others have smaller numbers of candidates writing. All sections of the Province are allotted examining stations.
