### MIKE M'TIGUE SHOWS SOME OF OLDTIME SKILL

#### Too Much for Risko in Light-Heavy Division — Risko Had Ruled Heavy Favorite.

New York, July —Mike McTigue former light-heavyweight champion of the world decisively outpointed Johnny Risko of Cleveland in a ten round bout at Madison Square Garden. McTigue's victory came as a surprise following Risko's victory by a large margin over the present champion, Paul Berlenbach in the same ring several weeks ago. McTigue lost the crown to Berlenbach last summer.

The former 175-pound titleholder made a brilliant showing against his heavyweight opponent despite a 15-pound handicap in weight. He out-boxed outpunched and out-generalled his youthful foe and beat the Cleveland baker to the punch all the way through.

Risko entered the ring a favorite due to his defeat of Berlenbach, but McTigue, one of the ring's most artful boxers, jabbed and pounded his way to victory in six of the ten rounds. Two went to Risko and the others were even.

McTigue employed a flashing right cross to the jaw and a right uppercut to batter down his opponent. In a furious tenth-round rally, the former champion staggered the Clevelander twice. Risko was aggressive throughout but helpless before McTigue's reach and boxing skill.

The crowd was the smallest ever to witness a professional boxing contest in the Garden, 3,895 persons paying \$9,045.

### URNS DOWN OFFER OF \$12,000 TO BE COACH

Preferring to remain with University of Washington and live at his home in Seattle, Head Coach "Rusty Callow" of the Washington crews declined an offer of \$12,000 per year to go to University of Pennsylvania. He has a contract with three years to run at Seattle at \$6,000, but it is understood that the Pacific Coast institution was willing to release him if he desired to take the Pennsy job. The newspapers of Seattle and other cities in the State of Washington call upon business men and alumni to increase Callow's salary. The coach and his wife are graduates of Washington.

### OAKLAND INSURES TWO INFELDERS

Oakland, Calif., July 3—James Rees, seconde baseman, and Lynford Lary shortstop each were insured recently for \$100,000 by the Oakland Pacific Coast League Club. Reese is twenty years old, and Lary nineteen. They are known as "the Keystone Kids," and constitute the fastest combination in the history of the Oakland team.

After breaking in the first heat and finishing sixth the Aubrey horse showed her stamina and speed in the succeeding three heats, winning after brushes with Harry S., Wil-teen Boy and Eliza Todd.

In an exhibition race to beat 2.13 for the mile Vera Grattan 2.09 1-4, Frank Adams' latest importation from Quebec breezed through the mile in 2.11 breaking the long standing track record of 2.11 3-4 made by Terrace Queen some years ago.

Paced by an automobile, Adams' horse thrilled the crowd with an exhibition of speed that was dazzling. There were many who thought that Vera had beaten 2.13 but few only thought that the rule would be completed in 2.11.

Wimbledon, England, July 4—The women's lawn tennis crown, tossed aside by Queen Lenglen the other day is to rest on the head of either Senorita de Alvarez of Spain or Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree of England.

The senorita earned the right to dispute the succession with the English girl by eliminating Mrs. Mollie Mallory, 6-2, 6-2 while Mrs. Godfree defeated Mlle. Didi Vlasto of France, 6-4, 6-0.

It was truly a Spanish day in the Wimbledon classic and King Alfonso who, with his Queen watched Senorita de Alvarez's brilliant victory from the Royal box, was so pleased that he rose to acknowledge the crowd's plaudits.

#### Style of Spaniard.

The Spanish champion who is 21, pretty, graceful in every movement, gained her victory by much the same means as Mlle. Lenglen has habitually employed to win hers. She is tremulously alert every movement is all over the court for returns and generally right where she ought to be, and quick as a flash to find an opening for one of her drives from near the baseline for a placement.

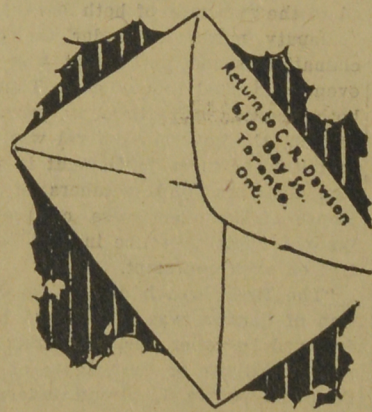
