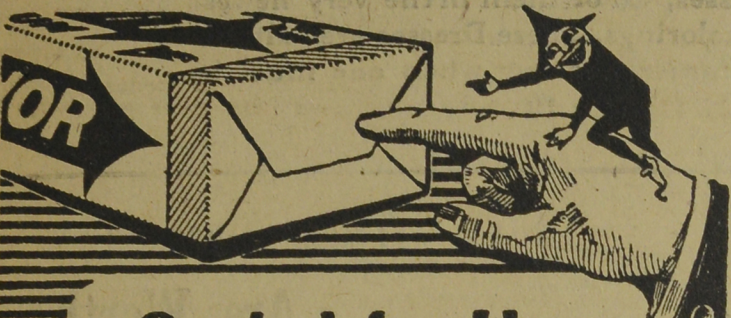

CREAM PUFFS AND STRAWBERRIES.

Put one half cup of butter into one cup of boiling water, heat to the boiling point and sift in one cup of sifted flour. Stir constantly until the mixture forms a ball. Turn into mixing bowl, add one egg and beat with a wooden spoon until the mixture is smooth; repeat with a second egg and finally a third. When thoroughly blended drop the choux paste from a large spoon upon a buttered baking sheet about two inches apart. Bake in a hot oven (450 Fahrenheit) twenty-five minutes. The strongest heat should be on the bottom. Remove from the baking sheets to a cake cooler and when ready to serve split and fill with whipped cream into which sugared strawberries have been folded. Sprinkle with sifted confectioners' sugar.

STRAWBERRY JELLY.

Wash drain and hull two quarts of firm strawberries; fruit a little underripe will insure a finer flavor; set to cook over a slow fire and let cook gently until the boiling point is reached. Strain through a double fold of cheese cloth or jelly bag; there should be one and one half cups of sugar and continue cooking to the boiling point, stirring constantly; then add one half cup of pectin. Let boil vigorously one minute, remove from the fire, let stand one minute skim, and pour into sterilized glasses. When cool cover with melted paraffin, set the covers in place and store.

Strawberry Bavarian Cream.

Take 1 cup mashed strawberries using both pulp and juice, 3-4 cup powdered sugar, 1 cup heavy cream stiffly beaten and 3-4 of level table spoon granulated gelatin. Soak gelatin in 4 teaspoons cold water. When soft, melt over hot water. Add melted gelatin to strawberry juice and let partially cool and set. Beat sugar in whipped cream, fold this into partly set gelatin and allow the whole to stiffen thoroughly before serving. It may be molded in large fancy mold, in plain loaf, or individual molds. This dish may be served with plain cream and sugar or remainder of box of strawberries may be mashed sweetened to taste and poured around it.

Caramel Cookies.

One cup butter 2 cups brown sugar, 1 cup sour cream, 5 cups flour, 1 tablespoon soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs well beaten. Mix and sift half of the flour with salt and stir into first mixture. Dissolve soda in sour cream and add. Stir until smooth and add vanilla. Mix well and form into a roll about as thick as a rolling pin. Chill in the ice box over night. In the morning cut in thin slices and bake in a hot oven for 8 minutes. Butterscotch cookies are brittle.

Here and There

Stormont, the best mine in Nova Scotia, when gold-mining in the province was an industry, is to be re-opened. Until it closed down, twelve years ago, Stormont mine had produced over 575,000 tons of ore, giving an average of free gold of \$4.13 per ton, or \$2,225,000 during its activity.

A record single shipment of Indian motor-cycles, consisting of 85 cases, from Armory, Mass., recently arrived in Tokyo, Japan, having come forward by Canadian Pacific Rail and steamer lines. The demand for motor-cycles in Japan is a steadily increasing one, being a cheap and convenient method of locomotion and well suited to the somewhat narrow roads of that country.

Twenty-one British Rotarians recently came over to Canada on the Canadian Pacific liner "Montclare" en route to the International Rotary convention at Denver. On their return trip they came back through Canada, travelling to Winnipeg and Fort William, and taking the Great Lakes trip on C.P.R. steamboat to Port McNicoll. They returned to the Old Country by the C.P. liner "Montcalm."

The Canadian Pacific Railway has just added two of the new Mount Class observation cars to those running out of Montreal. Five more are just about ready to run and the balance of four cars will be ready for service shortly after these. They are all-steel cars, made up of three compartments, and one drawing room with a parlor room and observation platform. They will be a feature of long-run trains on the C.P.R.

The English football team now touring Canada had one of the most strenuous work-outs in the history of any athletic body. Staying for a week-end at the Chateau Lake Louise they had a practise at an altitude of a mile and a half above sea level, where the thinness and dryness of the air had a wonderful effect upon them. Their captain thought it remarkable that prize-fighters in training had not utilized the marvellous properties of this training camp.

A fourteen-car special Canadian Pacific Railway train carried more than a hundred of the most prominent representatives of banking and financial interests of New York City and State to Quebec, where they held their 33rd annual convention of the New York State Bankers' Association at the Chateau Frontenac recently. Included in the party was Col. J. W. McIntosh, Comptroller of Currency, Washington; and W. J. Donovan, Assistant Attorney-General of the U.S., and several financial specialists of New York's leading newspapers.

While Canadian Pacific train No. 87 was standing on public crossing preparatory to taking passing track, an automobile, occupied by four persons, ran into the side of the train, badly damaging the auto. In another case, a driver said he saw the train and heard the whistle signals sounded, but too late to avoid running into the side of the engine. Yet again, a touring car, travelling about 25 miles per hour, ran through the crossing barriers at a public crossing in Montreal but did not stop. No injuries were reported in all three incidents.

Representing capital running into billions of dollars, a party of around eighty prominent bankers, financiers and men representing commercial and business interests, recently arrived at the Windsor Street Station, Montreal, from New York, and made a tour of the pulp and paper industries and the new aluminum districts of the St. Maurice and Saguenay Valleys in Quebec Province, with a view to personal inspection of the prospects in those great developments. The party was accommodated with five twelve-section compartments and drawing room sleepers, two dining cars and the private car "Montmorency," the sole being C.P.R. equipment.

TRAINED WILD BEASTS TO BE BIG FEATURE OF SPARKS CIRCUS

Mgr. Chas. Sparks, of the Sparks Circus coming to Fredericton on Saturday, July 10 is of the firm conviction that variety is not only the spice of life but of a modern circus as well, and has this season deviated from the straight and narrow circus traditions of the past by augmenting his two hours' program with a vast number of trained wild animal numbers of a thrilling nature, among them being a group of six real forest bred African lions. One thing that, according to newspaper reviews, impresses the public in watching the exhibitions given by this remarkable group of lions is the untamed fierceness of the animals. While yielding to the persistent efforts of their trainer, Steve Batty, to train them the tricks that primarily make their performances so interesting, there is abundant evidence that their native wildness has not been subdued and that they are still "kings of the forest" despite their enforced captivity. Cleverly as they have been trained, it would be quite unsafe to exhibit these lions in an open ring, and consequently they are presented in a great Safety First arena, in which they can be seen to advantage with absolutely no danger to the spectators. The Sparks Fighting Lions are in worthy company, for half a score of other remarkably trained wild beasts are included in the new displays, chief of which are a group of nine royal Bengal tigers that have been trained to the limit of animal intelligence. Then there is a mixed group of Polar bears, great Dane dogs and lilliputian ponies—all recent importations from the world's foremost wild animal training quarters at Stellingen, Germany. Of course there are many other animal acts of a domestic nature intermingled with the wild animals. A group of South American llamas have been trained to bend obedience to the will of the trainer and will be another rare feature of this famous circus in conjunction with the Sparks seals and

sea-lions, the Bibb County educated pigs, and a host of other animal acts that have helped make the name Sparks a household word. All will be seen in the stupendous street parade, the longest in world, at 11 A. M. on Circus Day. Tents located at Race Track. Prices children under 10 years age 35 cents. Adults 75 cents.

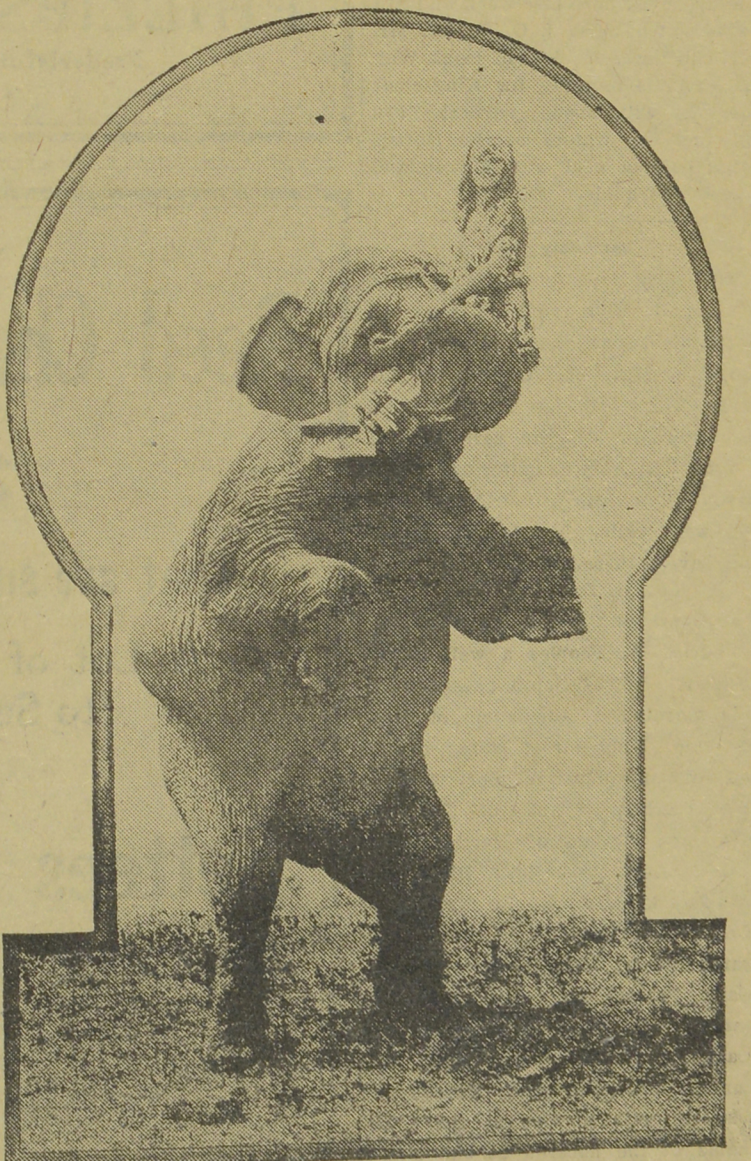
TO HAVE SHEIK AS SON-IN-LAW
