

DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATIONS ONTOMORROW

More Candidates Will Write Here Than Last Year But All Over the Province are Fewer.

Two hundred and forty-five students are scheduled to write the Matriculation, High School Leaving and Normal School Entrance Examinations here this week beginning tomorrow morning. Inspector M. G. Fox of Gagetown is to be in charge of the examinations as supervisor. He will have as his assistants W. M. Burns, R. K. Nevers, James A. Hughes and Miss Louise Kinghorn.

As usual the examinations will be written in the assembly hall of the Provincial Normal School and will continue until Friday afternoon. The Normal School Entrance and Superior examinations will be completed Thursday afternoon and the others the day following.

The Program.

The program for the examinations is as follows:—

Tuesday—9 a. m., Assigning seats; 10 a. m., British and Canadian History, (Normal School Entrance); Practical Mathematics, (Superior); English Literature (Matriculation and Leaving); 2 p. m., Algebra (Normal School Entrance), Latin (Superior), Algebra and Arithmetic (Matriculation); Arithmetic and Bookkeeping (Leaving).

Wednesday—9 a. m., Arithmetic (Entrance); Latin (Matriculation); Latin (Leaving); 11.15 a. m., Nature Study and Elementary Agriculture, (Normal School Entrance); Chemistry, (Matriculation); Chemistry (Leaving). 2.30 p. m., English Grammar.

Thursday—9 a. m., Geometry; 11.10 a. m., Geography (Entrance); Botany, (Matriculation and Leaving); 2.30 p. m., Writing and Drawing (Entrance); History and Geography (Matriculation and Leaving); 3.55 p. m., French (Entrance).

Friday—8.30 a. m., Greek or French (Matriculation), French, (Leaving); 10.35 a. m., Algebra (Leaving). 2.30 p. m., English Grammar.

AMERICAN MOTORISTS IN HUGE NUMBERS

Visiting Cars Noticeable on Roads Now — Display of American Flags Not Overly Appreciated.

There has been a noticeable rush of American cars through Fredericton already this summer and the prospect is that 1926 will be the greatest year on record for visiting American cars. Last week and particularly Sunday, the American cars on the highways were noticeably numerous. The State of Maine sends the most of them but many come from more distant places.

The Flag Question.

The flag question which has arisen in other parts of Canada as far as visiting American cars are concerned, also has arisen here. There is a resentment on the part of residents of a display of the American flag on cars unless there is a showing by courtesy of British or Canadian colors at the same time. There have been several cases of visiting American motorists having been requested to display Canadian or British flags with their own while on Canadian soil. The requests have been complied with.

Flags Removed.

This morning a visiting car was observed in Fredericton with five American flags displayed and no Canadian or British flag with them. While the car stood in front of a restaurant the flags were removed and placed within the car by some person unknown as a hint that there should be a display of another.

HEAVY CATCH OF GRILSE ON THE MIRAMICHI

Many Reach the Market Here—Inspector H. E. Harrison Now Has Jurisdiction as Far as Renous.

The present summer has seen one of the greatest runs of salmon on record in the Miramichi River. The particular feature of the run is the huge number of grilse which are being taken in nets in the tidal waters. Large numbers of these young salmon have been placed on the market in Fredericton and there also has been heavy shipment of the fish to more distant points.

Fisheries Inspector H. E. Harrison of this city recently visited the non-tidal waters of the Southwest Miramichi which now are included in the inspectorial district. Formerly the lower portion was in the district of Inspector A. L. Barry of Newcastle but a change has been made. Inspector Harrison now has supervision of the river as far as the Renous.

Violators Prosecuted.

Several prosecutions of violators of the fisheries regulations on the Southwest Miramichi are underway on the information of Overseer Parks. One of the accused is charged with resisting officers as well as violating the regulations. The violation consisted in failure to observe the rule permitting netting in alternate fortnights only.

On the Saint John.

On the Saint John River there also has been a good run of salmon and anglers at Hart's Island Pool have had much sport and net fishermen also have done well. The water however is still high. As it falls the fish are expected to come in larger numbers.

Preparations are being made to give the salmon a better chance to reach Upper Magaguadavic waters a special constructed elevator-fishway being intended for St. George.
