TEACHER PUTS  
ON TWO NEW  
WORLD'S RECORDS

Broke Late Ralph Rose's  
Record for Putting  
Twelve-Pound and  
Eight-Pound Shot.

New York, July 9.—Two world's shot put records established almost two decades ago by the late Ralph Rose, fell at a benefit meet for the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in the New York American League Stadium. Both new marks were established by John Knuck of the Kansas State Teachers' College.

After shattering Rose's record of 57 feet 3 inches for hurling the 12 pound ball by 6 3/4 inches, Knuck picked up the 8 pound pellet and tossed it 68 feet 7 5/8 inches, more than a foot beyond the old mark of Rose, 67 feet 7 inches.

Completing his triumph in the weight tests, Knuck won the 16-pound throw with a heave of 48 feet 3 1/8 inches leading Schwarze of Wisconsin, newly crowned champion and Bud Houser of the Hollywood A. C. in the three tests.

Knuck won his fourth event of the meet when he hurled the javelin 204 feet 9 1/2 inches. Knuck's heave was more than two inches farther than the best cast of Charley Harlow of the Hollywood A. C. 202 feet 4 1/2 inches.

Home Run Saved Devon  
From Shutout Friday by  
Imperials, Score 5 to 1

Coyle Lost Sight of Ball on Staples' Long Hit and  
It Went For the Circuit—Pitchers in Good  
Form But Wheeler Supported the Better—  
Imps Batted Hard.

Ken Staples' home-run in the seventh inning saved Devon from being shut out by the Fredericton Imperials Friday evening at Queen's Square. The score was 5 to 1 and had it not been for Johnny Coyle losing sight of the ball when Staples hit along the left foul line it would have been 5 to 0. The ball was found just after the runner passed third base but he beat it to the plate on the relay.

Wheeler Was Good.  
"Tot" Wheeler pitched for the Imps and turned in a great game. He fielded his position well taking five chances perfectly. None of the hits off him were better than singles except Staples' circuit clout. Burse did not do so well in the box and received the poorer support. The Imps were wounding the willow vigorously although none of the hits was long. The Devon errors counted but the Fredericton runs were netted largely through bunting singles in the second and third innings. Several times Devon left runners stranded when any kind of hit would have meant runs.

Devon Batted.  
Bill Rutter started the game for Devon as if something was going to happen, hitting safely. Hersey nipped things when he took Keene's drive on the meat hand and whipped the ball across in time to double Rutter. It was the best fielding play of the game. After that Devon did not do much until the third when Keene was passed and Jack Watson hit safely. With two

on Dunphy was an easy strike-out. In the fourth Irvine hit but was thrown out at second on a choice when Staples batted. Staples stole second and took third on a wild pitch but two outs on easy flies retired the side. In the seventh Staples' home run was the feature but Miles hit right afterward, stole and was sacrificed to third by Burse. Wheeler was master of the situation and fanned Rutter, stopping any more runs. Devon never stopped trying. Keene drew another pass in the eighth, first man up, and stole second. There he napped long enough for Wheeler to snap the ball to Dougan for a putout.

The second was the big Imperial inning. McLenahan was safe on J. Watson's error. Dougan hit. Wheeler was out on a long fly to Staples but the runners played it safe. Lister hit and a run went in. Hersey then sent out another long fly to Staples and the runners took no chances. Jack Coyle then hit the ball out along the right foul line. Umpire Harrison declared the ball fair and Dougan scored. Devon howled that the ball was foul but the decision stood. Jack Babbitt then stepped into one for another hit making four hits and three runs for the inning. The Imps kept it up in the third. Windsor, Conn., July 7.—The wizard of Windsor, Harry A. Brusie made his home town admirers and they are many happy by driving two winners at Sage Park course today and to add to their pleasure he won behind trotters which appeared to be in for defeat.

Brusie's winners were Tippie Volo and Plain Mary and both turned in sterling performances the Peter Volo filly trotting one of her miles in 2.12 1/2, faster than any other of her age and sex ever has over a half mile track so early in the Summer.

The aged mare had to go five heats to outrace the favorite Peter Bean and her three winning miles were 2.10 1/4, 2.10 1/2, 2.10 3/4.

Tippie Volo, the undefeated three year old of the season was naturally well fancied to win her race but her followers were given an anxious hour when she made a break in the first heat and the Kansas City filly Sarah Goodrich was home first very comfortably in 2.14 1/4.

The daughter of Peter Volo was however a real trotter in the second heat. Her speed was too much for Sarah to match and she was trotting well within herself in 2.12 1/2. Second to her in this last mile was the Western colt Guy Stewart. Tippie was off by herself at the end of the third mile the Loomis colt again getting the place.

Tippie Volo is owned by Fred Holsapple of Copake Falls, N. Y., and has won four races this season. On her form today she looks up to going through the circuit undefeated.

Signal Flash, a grandson of Peter the Great bought at the New York sale by Trainer Townsend Ackerman for H. C. Kuhlmann of Ellenville, N. Y. at the modest price of \$300 won the purse for two year old trotters in 2.19 1/4, 2.18 1/4.

Ackerman racing another of his stable had Fred Hyde drive Flash the combination was faultless after the first heat which was taken by Peter Dawes.

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
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
