PARLIAMENT RESUMES TODAY AFTER ELEVEN DAYS RECESS; ESTIMATES ARE COMING SOON

Ottawa, March 14—After a recess of 12 days, the House of Commons will resume sittings tomorrow afternoon with practically the full work of an ordinary session before it.

Beyond conclusion of the debate on the address practically none of the regular business has been done. The financial year ends with the close of the present month, but estimates have still to be brought down. Main estimates will probably be tabled on Monday or, if not then, within a few days.

An interim supply bill will be necessary, but this cannot now become law till after the close of the financial year as the Senate does not meet again till April 6.

Order Paper Piled Up.

The order paper is piled up with scores of questions and with sufficient private members' motions to keep the house going for weeks. Of the latter, one of the first to be considered will be that of J. S. Woodsworth, Labor, Winnipeg North Centre, that Canada shall not accept responsibility for complications arising from British foreign policy. But while so many private members' motions remain to be considered, there are now only two private members' days a week remaining—Mondays and Wednesdays. For the first four weeks of the session Thursday is also a private member's day. But Thursday has already automatically lapsed as a private member's day for the remainder of the session, although the house this year has not yet seen a single private member's day.

Premier to Take Seat.

Premier King will take his seat in the house on Monday afternoon and introduction of government legislation on old age pensions, rural credits and for the return of natural resources to Alberta is expected shortly. The main estimates will, it is reported, contain an application for completion of the Hudson Bay Railway.

A deputy speaker will be appointed, probably in the coming week. A number of names has been suggested for the appointment. That of W. A. Duff, of Lunenburg, N. S., has recently been

added to those mentioned.

The customs probe resumes on Tuesday.

More Charges Hinted.

During the recess, activity has been evidenced on both sides. Right Hon. Arthur Meighen has been here steadily, while Hon. H. H. Stevens has had the opportunity of going into the mass of evidence he proposes to offer to the special committee in support of his charges. There are hints of further sensational disclosures. In the Government camp the "co-operative" agencies have been at work all the week, turning out legislation, and it is said that it is pretty nearly all ready. The old age pensions bill is printed, and the rural credits bill is finally drafted.

Controversies Likely.

The session resumes with at least the assurance of variety. A great deal of the legislation that will be proposed is extremely controversial, and some of it—such as the Hudson Bay Railway vote—promises to enlist the strongest kind of resistance from the Conservatives. If the Government survive, the passing of many of its bills through the House will likely call for closure, while, if progress in that way is secured, the Senate will be on its job and prepared to exercise its scrutiny of legislation from the other House.

Defections Hoped.

The general sessional outlook can be judged only in the light of what has happened so far. Conservatives will keep up their bombardment, and they express confidence of being able before long either to compel the ministry to quit or else prevent it from functioning. In large degree it will be dependent upon the conduct of the Liberal members, especially from Quebec. Apparently Progressives and Independents are completely sewed up to the Government, Conservatives say. They are in control and getting what they want. If this fact should create among the Liberal following an unrest of which there are already symptoms, only a very slight defection would be necessary to accomplish the rout of the Government, the Opposition believes.

MAY BE THE BIGGEST MINING CAMP IN WORLD

Port Arthur, Ont., March 12—Prediction that Red Lake, Ontario, would become the world's largest mining camp—possibly exceeding the Klondyke—was made by Walter Hyde, Port Arthur civil engineer, who with his partner, Gordon McLaren, has returned from Red Lake.

Mr. Hyde fears that unless special preparations are taken there will be much hardship along the 140-mile trail from Hudson, nt., to Red Lake for four or five weeks during the spring break-up as it will then be impossible to mush to get food supplies. Men leaving for the field should go fully provisioned, he said.

There are about 1,500 men in the district now, prospectors being scattered over a radius of 50 square miles, according to Mr. Hyde. Red Lake contains only two tents and the mining recorder's office. Boats by the hundred will ply Lac Seul which is 110 miles long, this summer, he believes.

GOVERNMENT COMMENDED BY LIBERAL PAPER

The provincial government is to be congratulated on the brevity of the Speech from the Throne. No time was wasted on irrelevant matters, and the business to be transacted was referred to in as few words as possible. Nothing more was required for the occasion. The ministers are entitled to credit, too, for the promptness shown in laying before the Legislature, and the country, departmental and other reports. Both supporters and opponents of the government are thus provided with ample time in which to digest the contents of these interesting volumes. The government will earn additional gratitude if the speech making can be reduced to the minimum—consistent, of course, with the duty of guarding the public interests.

Grand Falls, March 14—Fraser Saunders, deputy liquor inspector, was in town this week-end in connection with the cases of violation of the Prohibition Act on trial before Police Magistrate Kelly. A. M. Chamberlain was prosecuting attorney and Max Cormier and Albert Dionne, of Edmundston, appeared for the defense. In two cases the fine was paid without trial, one case was dismissed and a fourth case will come up again for trial on Tuesday, next.

SCHOOLS IN THE WEST TO BE SOLD

Winnipeg, March 12—To satisfy a judgment recently given in favor of a creditor in Quebec City, public schools in West Kildonan, Man., will be sold on October 1, next, unless a settlement is made in the interim. An order was issued in the court of King's Bench today declaring the municipality liable. The claim against the school district amounts to \$898.
