LOYD GEORGE IS A MAGNETIC PERSONALITY; A BORN LEADER AND A MASTER POLITICIAN

Great Britain's greatest organizer remains on the outside in the moment of gravest crisis since the war. David Lloyd George as Minister of Munitions rallied and led the British masses so successfully that he became Prime Minister at the most critical time in history, and continued on through the first years of the post-war settlement period.

"L. G." as his friends call him, is magnetic, a born leader, a master politician. He loves the limelight. Back in 1915 he was rushing to Wales to compromise a coal strike. Four years later he was in the midst of another dispute arising out of the unsettlement in the coal industry. Mr. Lloyd George jumped from crisis to crisis with the ability of a mountain goat, but always he escaped destruction by making a compromise.

An emotionalist, sentimentalist, sensationalist, Mr. Lloyd George stood out above all other statesmen because he was so different. He hypnotized the people and was a victim of self-hypnosis. He climbed to the very pinnacle of personal success and then slid slowly down to the bottom. There he has remained ever since the Liberal party became the target of Labor and was punctured full of holes in the election of 1922. The personal fight between Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Asquith (now the Earl of Oxford) for the leadership of the Liberal party was largely responsible for its demoralization, and the Labor leaders took advantage of the opportunity offered them. One by one "L. G.'s" political friends dropped away, the last of them being Sir Alfred Mond, the wealthy manufacturing chemist.

Recently the old war Premier has been conducting a lively campaign in the hope of restoring his political fortunes. It may be that the strike will

bring about an improvement in the position of the Liberal party. It is the politically neutral party of the moment. Though its sympathies are wholly with the Baldwin government, it is not compelled to make vote-wrecking decisions. Mr. Lloyd George has pleaded for further negotiation. He has urged mediation. The Liberals can lose nothing; they may gain greatly in political prestige.

However the strike ends, there will be work for mediators. That is a role in which "L. G." would like to make a reappearance. Incidentally, it is difficult to find another leader better qualified for the job. He is unpopular with the rank and file of Labor, and he has few political friends among the Conservatives.

A forecast of the political situation after the strike must be a guess. Much will depend on the outcome of the strike itself. Whether the Conservative party will be stronger as a result of Mr. Baldwin's firm stand is a question which events alone can answer. Certainly Labor did not risk a general strike without giving deep thought to the political future of its party. It may be that in defeat its leaders—the party more strongly consolidated, its ranks increased and the future brighter. In any case, Mr. Lloyd George must be hopeful of rallying the Liberals. A middle party may gain recruits as the result of a strike.

To date it has been clear that Britain was divided sharply. Interest in the Liberal party program has been at a low ebb. The country recognized the fact that vital issues were being raised and that eventually they must be settled. It may be that after the strike the electorate will be glad to accept Liberal policies. If that proves to be the case "L. G." will again be a prominent factor in British politics. Such kaleidoscopic changes are not unique in British politics.

2. Specialty club and other association exhibits.
3. Exhibits of individual breeders.

These exhibits will include both exhibition and commercial strains. There will be no competition, but each exhibitor will be given credit for his exhibit by having his name and address attached to the coops in which his birds are shown. His name and address and the sale price of his birds will appear in the official "Programme and Directory of Exhibitors."

Think what this will mean to you. At one grand stroke advertising to the whole world, the fact that you are producing birds and are open to do business.

Now is the time to prepare. Next spring will be too late. The Congress will be too early in the season for young stock so that nothing but mature birds will be exhibited.

The breeders of recorded production poultry will be awake to this great opportunity and will get the reward they justly deserve. Breeders of exhibition quality birds don't be blind to your opportunities, be prepared to reap a harvest.

Late hatched chicks, if given proper care, frequently grow well and develop into the best colored birds of the year making ideal birds for early fall showing the following season. This applies equally well to males from recorded production stock, but it will be




