TWO HEADED CALF AT COCAIGNE

Moncton, May 13—Calves with two heads, others with six legs and still others with an extra head and extra legs have been reported before but one at Cocaigne which has been reported and which lived for two days is the strangest of all. SECRET OF THE SUCCESS OF LUTHER BURBANK, THE PLANT WIZARD; THE WAYS OF SCIENCE

Prof. Vernon Kellogg, of the American National Research Council, was long a personal friend of Luther Burbank, and had the opportunity of studying him at closer range than most of those who have been writing the obituaries of the great plant breeder. Himself an expert, Prof. Kellogg is competent to judge Burbank as botanists should judge him, and he observes that Burbank knew little conventional botany and was not interested in plant growing as a science. He did not create new varieties for money, and he did not create them for love of science. If he produced a new plum it was because he believed it to be a better plum than formerly existed. With the great forces that helped him in the task he was not greatly concerned. For instance, in his 1894 catalogue of his "New Creations," there is a reproduction of a photograph showing a "sample pile of brush 12 feet wide, 14 feet high and 22 feet long, containing 65,000 two and three-year-old seedling berry bushes (40,000 blackberry-raspberry hybrids and 25,000 Shaffer Gregg hybrids), all dug up to be burned with their crops of ripening berries. Of the 40,000 blackberry-raspberry hybrids of this kind, 'Phenomenal' is the only one now in existence. From the other 25,000 hybrids two dozen bushes were reserved for further trial."

Ways of Science.

The ordinary reader of this paragraph, says the Toronto Mail and Empire, would gaze at the picture in amazement, marvelling at the ways of science. But scientists would gaze at it aghast that so much valuable material should be thus destroyed, for to a real scientist any one of the hybrids, worthless for Burbank's purpose, would be quite as valuable as the ones that Burbank prized. That is to say, from any one of them a further knowledge of botany might be gleaned. But Burbank was not really interested in science or botany. He could not be. He was no Fabre or Mendel. He had a set job to do, and he had neither the time nor the space to keep and study all the hybrids he produced. He was always working toward some definite aim, some improved fruit or flower and what he happened to create on the way did not capture his attention. It was because of this trait in his character that in 1905 the Carnegie Institution at Washington made an arrangement whereby Burbank would receive \$10,000 a year for ten years on the understanding that he was to permit a scientific observer to come and go in his garden, to have free access to all his experiments and records. This was done for the purpose of gaining real scientific information which Burbank himself was not concerned with.

Burbank was glad to have the money and also the company of the scientific botanist when the arrangement was made, but after five years the agreement was terminated by mutual consent. It was neither happy nor fruitful, for Burbank and the scientists spoke different languages and neither could understand the other. But if Burbank had not that love of growing things that inspires a poem like Housman's "The Cherry Tree," or that devotion to science that led Mendel to his great experiments with field peas, he had his own peculiar gifts without which science and love of nature might well have proved barren. His leadership as a plant grower was due to his extraordinary sensibility, to certain physical qualities which seemed appropriate enough to his delicate,

sensitive nature and almost effeminate appearance. He had extraordinary fingers and eyes, and his nose was one of the most delicate that ever bent over a bouquet. His fingers, eyes and nose enabled him to detect the most minute variations in the hybrids he was growing, and at the earliest possible moment determine which he needed and which he would consign to the flames. His delicacy of perception, added to his experience, was what made him a master in his profession.

Correlation.

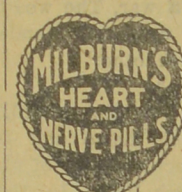
One of the products of this union was a unique knowledge of correlations. He knew there was a correlation between the form and texture of a leaf and the size and flavor of the fruit that would come later. So he was able to make his rigid selections without waiting for the fruit to come for confirmation. This sense of correlation was the most important single thing that he brought to his work. Prof. Kellogg reports that he has seen Burbank crawling round on hands and knees in a bed of hundreds of seedlings. Scores of odors were arising from the bed, all mingling in a soft perfume that was a delight. But Burbank would sniff round the individual seedlings and his nose would tell him from which one or which little group there was arising the delicate aroma that he was in search of and desirous to propagate.

One of his important achievements to which little attention has been paid is the importation of many plants which under the favorable conditions in California took on such new qualities as to make them almost new varieties. But to offset this there is to be recorded the fact that many Burbank creations which delighted all beholders in California proved disappointments when tried out in less favorable soil and climate. This at one time led to some ill-natured and uninformed people calling Burbank a faker. He was, says Prof. Kellogg, who writes in the New York Times on this subject, inexpressibly hurt and bewildered by these criticisms. Indeed he was a man of such tender nature that he would weep when somebody said too rough a thing to him, and he would weep when generously praised. The writer points out that Burbank was not interested in money.

CITY OF FREDERICTON BUILDING LAWS

The attention of property owners is directed to the following amendments to the Building Laws of the City of Fredericton, which became effective April 14th, 1926:

"1. From and after the passing of this Act, it shall not be lawful to erect a wooden building of any kind within the Building Limits.

2. From and after the passing of this Act, the roof of every building erected within the Water, Fire, and Light Limits, and any roof removed within the said Limits, shall be of slate, gravel, metal, sparham roofing or other fire-resisting material.

3. From and after the passing of this Act, Public or Service Garages shall only be established in buildings constructed of brick, stone, or other fireproof material."

It is necessary to obtain a permit to build or repair a building.

Permits are issued at the office of the undersigned.

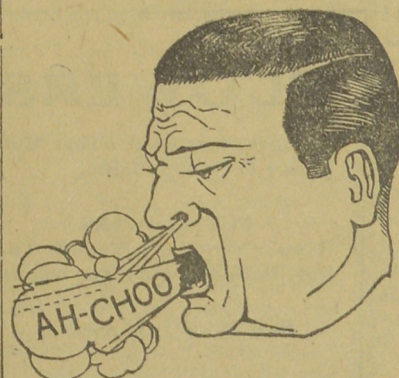
