

CROWLEY AND CHASE REMANDED UNTIL FRIDAY

Arrests Follow Those For Burglary at J. Clark & Son's Store—Other Charges are Laid.

In connection with the three arrests made on Friday last as the result of the burglary at the store of J. Clark & Sons Limited, two more were made Monday afternoon by the Fredericton police when Seymour Chase and Geo. Crowley were taken into custody. It is understood that information secured in connection with the other arrests resulted in the arrests yesterday.

Remanded Until Friday

Chase and Crowley appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning and were remanded until Friday next. John McGoldrick, Stanley Colwell and Harry Mount who are held for the stealing of the eleven fur coats from Clark's are to appear on Wednesday having been remanded until that date.

Drugstore Robbery

Chase who has appeared often in the police court is charged with breaking and entering the Quality Pharmacy which was robbed a few days ago when liquors, toilet articles and fountain-pens were taken to a considerable value.

Theft at the "Con"

Crowley is charged with the theft of an overcoat belonging to Kenneth Staples which was taken from the university at the time of the annual "conversazione" in February last. The coat has been found. Crowley has been employed by livery stables at various times.

CITY AFFAIRS

Reappointed to School Board.

Hon. C. D. Richards was last night reappointed to the School Board of Fredericton by the City Council. He succeeds himself.

Additional Fire Alarm Box.

The Fire committee has been authorized to purchase an additional fire alarm box for installation at the corner of Victoria and Westmorland streets if it is deemed necessary.

May Purchase Wharf.

D. P. Clayton has inquired of the city if the Hill & Berry wharf so-called, is for sale. This inquiry has been referred to the Wharves and Cemetery committee of the City Council.

New Maryland Road Finished.

John E. Forbes contractor on the improvement of the New Maryland Road within the city limits, has completed his contract. The road is said to be excellent. The cost is somewhat in excess of \$8,000. The Provincial Department of Public Works is ready to pay its share of the cost after the next government meeting.

To Rewire Bridge.

The City Street Lighting committee has been given authority to have the Maritime Electric Co. rewire the Fredericton-Devon highway bridge at a cost of \$131.20. The new wiring is to be in the centre of the bridge. The change is made on account of complaints of interference with radio receiving through short circuiting.

Married Last Evening.

The marriage of Miss Norma Mary Smith of Oromocto and Frederick John Wilkins of this city took place quietly at the George street Baptist Parsonage Monday night, Rev. I. A. Corbett performing the ceremony. A number of friends and relatives of the bride and groom were present. The young couple who are well known and have the best wishes of a large circle of friends will make their home in this city.

Interscholastic Playoff.

After some negotiations Mt. Allison Academy has agreed to terms with Fredericton High School to play here Thursday afternoon in the playoff for the High School rugby title of New Brunswick. The game will make a double-header at College Field as Mt. Allison and University of New Brunswick will meet there for the second time in the Western Intercollegiate Section. The High School game is to begin at two o'clock and the college game will come later.

ARMISTICE DAY OBSERVANCE IS ARRANGED

Veterans to Attend Sunday Service at Parish Church — I. O. D. E. Ceremonial at Cenotaph on 11th.

The city corporation is to take part in the ceremonies of the cenotaph at the intersection of Church and Queen streets beginning at 10.45 on the morning of the 11th. A formal invitation to take part was extended by the Sir Howard Douglas Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire and was considered last night in committee by the City Council. His Worship the Mayor was invited to deliver a short address.

On motion it was decided that the invitation be accepted and His Worship gave his consent to speak. The city also will place a wreath on the cenotaph.

The ceremonial will open with two minutes of silence. The names of the one hundred and five soldiers who died on service or from injuries, will then be read. Mayor Clark will deliver an address. "Last Post" will be sounded by a bugler.

Veterans' Ceremonial.

In connection with the observation of Armistice Anniversary the Canadian Legion made arrangements last night for a ceremonial at the cenotaph, the decoration of graves of deceased veterans and the attendance of divine service. As usual the veterans will carry out this observation on the Sunday preceding the 11th.

Rev. A. F. Bate, Rector of Fredericton, is to be the preacher of the sermon the members of the Legion attending service at the Parish Church Sunday morning. Included in the service will be the unveiling of two tablets in the Parish Church, The York Regt. Band is to play the Legion to Church the parade marching off from the Officers' Square at 10.45 a. m.

In the afternoon the Legion will assemble at 1.45 and will move off at 2 p. m. At the cenotaph the service will be about the same as usual an address being an important part.

At 2.45 the Legion will march to the cemeteries in Woodstock Road where the graves of departed comrades will be decorated. The York Regt. Band will accompany the Legion.

To Sell Poppies.

The usual arrangements have been made for the sale of poppies. Mrs. Edna McMurray was named last night the convener of the Poppy Committee for Fredericton. The majority of women's organizations in Fredericton are to take part. Representatives of them were at a meeting last night at which arrangements were made. Five chapters of the I. O. D. E., two circles of the King's Daughters, the L. O. B. A., the Women's Institute and the girls of the High School are to aid. The Boy Scout organizations also are to take part. The final meeting for organization will be Friday night.

BARREL FACTORY PROPOSAL PLACED BEFORE COUNCIL

Stock to Amount of \$35,000 is Wanted From This Community—W. D. Wilkes Returned Today.

The proposal concerning the establishment of an industry in Fredericton which would develop hardwood manufacture in the form of collapsible barrels, was placed before the City Council last night by His Worship Mayor Clark. The Mayor stated that W. D. Wilkes the promoter who owns the patents on the barrel had wired that he would return from New York today and that he then would be ready to show his credentials as the owner of the patents.


Want \$35,000 in Stock.

His Worship informed the Council that the establishment of the industry would depend upon what the people of Fredericton would do in the way of subscribing stock. A total of \$35,000 was required. Mr. Wilkes had at first asked for a block of stock for his patents but he had waived that claim and requested instead that he be employed in the industry. The promoter had no capital of his own but practical lumbermen had investigated his proposals and had considered them sound.

Tax Exemption

It was stated by the Mayor that a free site was expected. W. J. Scott had offered a considerable acreage which would be used freely by the industry for five years on condition that the city would exempt the land from taxes for that period. At the
