## FREEDOM OF SAINT JOHN WAS CONFERRED ON BEAVERBROOK; NEW BRUNSWICK IS PRAISED

Saint John, Aug. 18—"It is here in the province of New Brunswick, rich with natural resources, that equal opportunity is open to the young man and if I were starting my career over again, there is no other place I would rather turn to. To the young men of the province belongs the responsibility of seeing that the natural resources of the province are developed and they have here a wonderful chance in life."

In these words Lord Beaverbrook yesterday afternoon pointed out his belief in the future of the province where he spent his boyhood and early manhood.

A distinguished gathering was present in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon when the freedom of the city was conferred on this famous son of New Brunswick and on acknowledging the honor he said he would rather have it than any other honor which he had received.

Mayor White welcomed Lord Beaverbrook and in presenting to him the freedom of the city said the city council had felt it fitting that the services of His Lordship to the city and province should be recognized. In doing this he was but voicing the opinion of the citizens as a whole, who felt that it was becoming to honor one who had had such a distinguished career and done so much for the Empire.

### Interest in Province.

Lord Beaverbrook was one of the outstanding financial men of the British Empire and known as one of the most influential and important men by reasons of the journals which he owned or controlled. In spite of all this he had not forgotten the province of New Brunswick and still took an interest in all its activities. His Worship referred to the interest taken by His Lordship in educational affairs of the province and the Beaverbrook Scholarships and the recent trip of New Brunswick teachers as the guests of Lord and Lady Beaverbrook. For these reasons it gave him great pleasure, by virtue of his authority as chief magistrate of the City of Saint John, to confer on His Lordship the freedom of the city.

### Beaverbrook Replies.

In reply Lord Beaverbrook said that 30 years ago he had come to Saint John from a small inland town to make a career for himself and now to return today and receive this honor

at the hands of the city moved him deeply. He appreciated the honor very greatly and declared that he would rather have it than any honor which had been bestowed on him.

Nothing in the world gave him greater pleasure than to return to these shores, for it was here there resided the friends of his early days, and those he treasured more than in any other part of the world, friends who always believed in him and sustained him in other days.

Kindly reference had been made to his interest in educational matters in the province. This was but natural, as it was here he had received the education which had been the foundation on which his career had been erected.

The mayor had referred to the trip of the New Brunswick teachers. This was an enterprise of Lady Beaverbrook. It was to the influence of Lady Beaverbrook that he owed whatever of success had come to him.

### N. B.'s Natural Resources.

In concluding he said: "May I say to the citizens of Saint John that gratified as I am to be so kindly received I would like to mention some of the things which have taken place. It has developed and become the metropolis of a great province, with great natural resources. I say to the young men of the province it has a great future and in your hands is the responsibility for its development."

"Here you have an opportunity which is unexcelled in the world, and were I beginning over again there is no place I would more gladly turn to build a career."

"As a freeman of the city I will always take an interest in it, and its growth and prosperity will be a source of gratification and pleasure to me."

At the conclusion of the ceremony those present extended congratulations to Lord and Lady Beaverbrook.

### Jewett Family Reunion.

The Jewett Family of America, Inc., will hold a reunion at Town Hall, Rowley, Mass., on Friday, August 20. Dinner will be served at the Historical House. This notice which is appearing in many English, American and Canadian papers has an interest to historians as well as to members of the Jewett family. It was in 1938 that Maximilian and Joseph Jewett came to Boston in a sailing ship from England and in 1939 they helped to found Rowley in Massachusetts, named for the English town from which they came. The branch of the Jewett family established in New Brunswick, that is at Maugerville, and in that section, came to Canada before the Revolution. In Saint John Leonard Jewett son of the late E. L. Jewett is member of the Jewett family Corporation whose reunions do not occur annually as the connection is a large one, and received an invitation to the gathering at Historical House at Rowley.

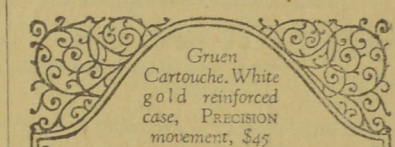
