

BEAVERBROOK SCHOLARSHIPS IN DEMAND

Applications Already Received — Time Expires With August — Commissioners Then Will be Considered.

A number of applications for the scholarships donated by Lord Beaverbrook for New Brunswick students intending to take university courses, have already been received by the secretary, S. Dow Simmons of this city. The time for filing applications expires with the present month and all intending applicants should act at once. The passing of matriculation examinations is a necessary qualification.

The scholarships are worth \$325 a year and are tenable for four years. Any student to whom a scholarship may be awarded may select the course he is to take but a course in theology is the only one which will permit attendance at a sectarian institution. Other courses must be taken at non-sectarian universities. With that qualification any university in Canada may be selected.

Five Scholarships Given.

Five scholarships are given in New Brunswick in groups of counties according to the arrangement. They have been given for several years. The impression was spread this year that the scholarships would not be given but that was incorrect.

Hon. O. S. Crockett who is chairman of the commission which selects the scholars has been in Europe on tour but is expected to return to his home in Fredericton shortly.

NORMAL SCHOOL REGISTRATION IS COMPLETE

Applications Numerous — Many Refused Admission — No Student With Less Than Class II Entrance.

The maximum registration of the Provincial Normal School which is three hundred exclusive of the French Department, has been filled and a large number of applicants have been disappointed through being refused admission to the school. The new year of the Normal School begins on the first teaching day of September this year Wednesday the 1st. The impression that the school does not open until after Labor Day is incorrect.

None Lower Than Class II.

The applications for admission to Normal School have been so numerous that no student with a poorer entrance qualification than Class II has been admitted. This means that all Class III students have Class II qualifications.

French Dept. May Increase.

This year is the second in which the maximum registration of three hundred has been enforced. There is a possibility that the French Department instructed by Prof. T. Lejeune may receive additional students when the school opens as only three girls registered at the opening of the French Course.

Dr. Bridges Ill.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Principal of the Normal School, to whom the applications were made and who selected the three hundred on a basis of scholarship as shown in their entrance examinations, is at present confined to his home, George street with a severe cold.

Provincial Government Meeting in Saint John Today — St. Stephen Delegation on Amusement Tax.

The salary of W. M. Burns, Principal of the Model School, which is operated in connection with the Provincial Normal School, was increased \$200 per annum.

The Board also made a change in connection with salaries paid those officiating in connection with Normal School and Matriculation examinations making the rate five dollars per day.
