Made Excellent Appearance.
 The K. of P. as usual made an excellent appearance and the lodge turned out in strength. The floral pieces for decoration were carried in a floral carriage and headed the procession. Chancellor Commander Kenneth McDougall was in command of the parade of Knights with William Warren as marshal.

Sermon on Friendship.

Rev. Mr. Holmes welcomed to the church the members of the Pythian order. By their annual church parade and decoration they showed respect to religion and to departed ones. His remarks to them were to be concerning the sweetest flower to be found in the desert of a fallen world—Friendship. No word was more wrongly defined. Companionship could be enjoyed with many but a friend was one would cling to and to whom one could cling in return. Unbounded love made a friend. There were many definitions of friendship. Emerson's possibly summed up the others. It was, "The only way to have a friend is to be one".

A friend was one who came in when the world went out. Some were "swallow" friends—they came in the summer and went in the winter. They could easily be spared.

Friendship was valuable because it produced those to whom the innermost thoughts might be communicated and revealed. It gave one to whom his friend could be tender without shame.

Friendship however was like china-ware. It could be broken and repaired so that it would serve again. But like china-ware it was not the same after repair. For that reason it should be prized and not be permitted to be destroyed or broken.

Favored Secret Societies.

Protestantism favored secret societies. The preacher said he believed that the Bible favored them for it referred to many things which were secret. The temple had its secret place and there were many things which were not mentioned by Holy writ. The home today was secret. Business and occupation continued their secrets. The angels themselves were said to be not privileged to tell their instructions. Christ conferred many times with three of his disciples—James, Peter and John. Their communion was secret from the others. It was perfectly proper for a good order to have secret work.

Types in the World.

The world contained men of three distinct types—like the workmen on a

great edifice who were asked what they were doing. "Cutting stone," said one. "Earning \$6.50 a day", said a second. "Building a cathedral," said the third. The first saw his work in the form of opportunity to perform a task. The second saw his in the form of opportunity to earn a living. The last saw his in the form of a vision. So were the men who would be met in lodge activities. Lodges had reclaimed many men. John B. Gough had been turned to a life of helpfulness to others by the touch of a helping hand. Although the lodge might be criticised as causing the keeping of late hours and friction in the home, it also tended to produce happiness.

Order of Today.

It was an interesting fact that the Knights of Pythias formed an order of today. There were others of ancient lineage. The organization was begun in 1864 by Justice Emery Rathbone at Washington. Since that time two million had become Knights. The order had a wonderful history and possessed great possibilities. Friendship, Charity, Benevolence, were its principles.

Christ the Great Friend.

In conclusion he would remind them that the changeless Christ was a friend who always would be with them. Let them remember that the highest symbol in the world was the Cross. It could be entwined with any other emblem or emblems and itself was the symbol of the highest manifestation of friendship the world ever had known.

MR. ANGUS M'LEAN TELLS OF THE GREAT INDUSTRIES IN SIGHT FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Halifax Chronicle.)

While the lumber industry of New Brunswick is dead, it was being replaced by a pulp and paper development, far transcending in value to the Province, the great industry which has passed out, was the opinion expressed to The Morning Chronicle by Angus McLean, President of the Bathurst Company, Limited, when seen at the Halifax Hotel last night. Mr. McLean, accompanied by Mrs. McLean, motored to Halifax yesterday, and are planning a tour of sections of the Province, including the South Shore.

New Brunswick will witness the greatest industrial development of its history within the next two years, Mr. McLean said. The Bathurst Company is to increase their output of paper and pulp by 275 tons a day, making a total of about 400 tons a day. This will be brought about within two years, will mean a very much increased employment of men, and increased industrial activity in and about Bathurst. Mr. McLean said that his company's plant was not linked up with the Grand Falls water power development, but they were developing their own power on the Nepisiguit River.

Fraser Brothers will be erecting a large 200 tons a day paper mill at Campbellton, obtaining their power from the Grand Falls Development, together with the International Paper Company, which will be erecting another mill of similar size at Dalhousie, and include in their plans of development a 400 ton mill on the St. John River.

Enormous Storage Capacity.

Mr. McLean said there was enormous storage capacity back of the Grand Falls but much of it was in Maine, and securing of it for the purpose of feeding the Grand Falls' project was a matter of International interests, and which might involve some

IRISH BANK DIVIDENDS RISE DESPITE STRIKE

Dublin, Ireland, Aug. 12—The Irish bank meetings this week afford an impartial indication of national conditions. The banks expected a boom year, but the British coal strike and the currency instability on the continent have dislocated trade. Nevertheless the banks all show some increase in their dividends which vary from 10 to 18 per cent. The result is considered satisfactory, the only discouraging feature being the general decline in deposits.

The country branches of the banks report an exceptionally promising outlook for the harvest. The stoppage of continental shipments of pigs to England has created an increased demand for the Irish animal and the pig industry is very prosperous.

Bank chairmen compliment the Irish Free State government on the legislation for the development of industry and record a moderate progress due to the protective tariff. They warmly approve the government's policy of lending money to develop trade and though the banks themselves feel unable to grant long-term loans to traders, they have subscribed to an industrial trust company established under government auspices for this purpose.

The linen trade in northern Ireland has suffered severely from the fall of the French and Belgian exchanges, to the advantage of Ulster's continental competitors. Still many northern spinners are working at a profit. Wages are being reduced 110 per cent. Hopes of returning prosperity for Ulster linen are based on a campaign of advertising in the United States.




