MINOR PRO HOCKEY LEAGUE MEETS TUESDAY

Gathering is Called for Boston—Both American and Canadian Cities are to be Represented.

Quebec, Aug. 15.—The formation of the new Eastern International Hockey League, a professional class "B" circuit which will be affiliated with the National Hockey League, is now no longer a dream but an actual fact as the inaugural meeting of the proposed circuit will take place on Tuesday evening next at Boston, Mass.

Delegates representing clubs from Springfield, Providence, New Haven, Boston, Montreal and Quebec will attend and lay the foundation to what may develop into the greatest minor professional hockey league in America. President Frank Calder of the N. H. L., together with Leo Dandurand, owner and manager of the Canadiens of Montreal, will also attend the meeting and it is expected that a working agreement between the major and new league will be reached, whereas the new circuit will come under the protection of the N. H. L. though working independently of the senior body.

With a minor pro league to work back on the players who cannot quite make the grade in the N. H. L. would be sent to this minor league to be seasoned and a year or so later would be fit for the class "A" senior circuit. The veterans of the big circuit would also be sent down to this circuit where they would form the nucleus of the six new clubs. At Tuesday's meeting in Boston the organizers will elect their officers and it is expected that Riley Hern one of the greatest goal tenders that ever guarded a net and a member of the old Wanderers Hockey Club of Montreal, will be chosen as President.

Henri Fontaine, owner of the Quebec Arena, and one of the leading sportsmen of the Province of Quebec, will lead Quebec City's delegation to the meeting. Mr. Fontaine has been connected with hockey for the past 25 or 30 years.

DROP KICKING FOR CONVERTS IN CANADIAN GAME

The Toronto Globe says: Football will be played throughout Canada this season with uniform rules governing the play. Only a few changes have been made, but there were necessary in order to lure the Inter-collegiate Union into the fold. Touchdowns will be converted by drop kicking, instead of the old placement idea and there will be running interference across the field and extending for a distance forward of three yards. For some reason or other, the college union teams failed to take full advantage of this interference in the past, but it is expected that the play will be opened up considerably in all the unions this fall. The new code is at present on the press and will be distributed to the officials before the end of August.

BABE DYE IS APPRECIATED AS BALL PLAYER

Toronto, Aug. 15.—According to despatches from Reading "Babe" Dye is headed for the lowly Key-stones. Where Manager Dunn signed the Toronto outfielder here this season he intimated that he intended to farm Dye out to Reading as soon as his regulars recovered from injuries. Apparently the Baltimore owner meant what he said. Dye has done good work with the champions and if he goes to Reading there will be a string attached as Dunn believes that the Torontonian is a high class performer when playing in his best form.

New York, Aug. 15.—Brooklyn won both ends of a double header today, the first 4 to 1 and the second encounter 11 to 3, which was called at the end of the eighth to permit the two teams to catch a train for the west.

Cleveland and St. Louis split, St. Louis winning the first 11 to 7, while Cleveland took the second 6 to 4. It was Uhle's 19th victory of the season.

The Washington Senators rallied in the eighth inning to score twice and break the deadlock defeating Philadelphia 5 to 3. Five double plays featured the game.

A NEW TYPE OF GIRL IS DEVELOPING

Washington, Aug. 14.—Flapperism is slowly passing in the United States according to Deets Pickett research secretary of the Methodist Board of Temperance and Public Morals. Furthermore, the world at large is getting better and more people are going to heaven he told the United Press in an interview.

"The flapper mode was the young women's reaction to freedom," Pickett said. "After the war girls became more independent and were freed from a certain state of society oppression."

"After a splurge of unique modernism they are gradually adjusting themselves to better standards. A new type of modern, sensible American girl is developing from the flapper rage."

"There is no real harm in paint, powder, short skirts, or boyish bobs—some carry it to extreme—that is vulgarity rather than immorality."

Pickett said one reason why flapperism is dying is that average young men do not approve of it. He said the boys liked to go out with the ultra modern girls but when it came time to select a wife the young men usually proposed to young women with some old fashioned ideas, at least.

"Meanwhile Christianity is spreading and the world is becoming morally better," Pickett continued. "The world is passing through a period of chaos where people have begun to adjust their spiritual minds and force ahead to cleaner standards."

"There is less immorality, less real sinning now than there was 100 years ago, but there is more vulgarity."

AMATEURS NAME STIFF FIGURES FOR HOCKEY JUMP

Toronto, Aug. 15.—Club owners in the Canadian Professional Hockey League are busy these days trying to lure star players from the amateur fold, and they are discovering that the task is not an easy one. National Hockey League officials could have assured them of this state of affairs long ago. One player in Western Ontario recently demanded \$18,000 for three years. EPSOM'S 96-YEAR-OLD GRANDSTAND IS DOOMED

London, Aug. 15.—Epsom's racecourse, where the world famous Derby has been run annually since 1780 is to lose its ninety-six-year-old grandstand after this year's race. The old stand which holds only 6,000 persons is to be replaced by one accommodating 20,000. While plans have been drawn for the new stand, a movement has been started to make the structure the largest and finest in the world.

It is pointed out that the Flemington stand in Australia accommodates 70,000 persons and that as the attendance at the Derby averages 300,000 to 500,000 racegoers, Epsom should have one seating at least 100,000 persons.
