

ROSARY HALL WILL BE OPENED TUESDAY, SEPT. 7

Permanent Staff From Sisters of Charity—Twenty-Four Girl Students Limit of Accommodation.

Announcement is made that the establishment for Roman Catholic female students attending educational institutions in this city which will be conducted by the Sisters of Charity, will be known as Rosary Hall. The staff of the institution is as follows: Sister Clarice, Superior; Sister Camela, Sister Rose and Sister Geraldine. The Superior is a member of the staff of Regent Strett School and has been for some time.

Not to Exceed Twenty-four. Accommodations will be provided for a number of young women not to exceed twenty-four for the present year. Rosary Hall will be open for the students on the day the Provincial Normal School opens, Tuesday, September 7th. Girls attending Normal School, University of New Brunswick and Fredericton Business College are to be accommodated.

The new departure in accommodating students has attracted attention already as a considerable number of applications have been forwarded to the Superior. Arrangements are being made as rapidly as possible and will be completed by the time the students arrive.

Not Connected with Parish. At St. Dunstan's Church, Sunday the pastor Rev. Father Carney referred to the opening of Rosary Hall. Among other matters to which he referred was the fact that the institution is to be operated separate from St. Dunstan's Parish which will have no financial obligations connected therewith.

Rosary Hall is located in Union street near Regent. The property was purchased from Bruce Simmons who recently left for Florida intending to remain there. The suggestion that Roman Catholic girls be given the opportunity of boarding in a house under religious supervision was made some time ago and some months ago was acted upon.

In Prince Edward Island hay is an average yield of good quality. Apples fair, grass pasture excellent.

LICENSE FEE ON FARM PRODUCE IS WITHDRAWN

Devon Town Council Found That Matter Already Was Covered by Bylaw Exempting Farmers.

The Town Council of Devon which a short time ago voted to impose a license fee of six dollars on each person selling farm produce from door to door in the town has withdrawn the provision it being found that an existing bylaw prevents the operation as it allows farmers to sell their own produce without imposition of any fee. At the time of the August meeting of the Town Council it was pointed out by the Town Clerk, George Danby, that the proposed license fee could not be imposed because of the existing bylaw. His opinion was not accepted however and the Council voted for the six-dollar fee.

Fees Refunded. Two fees were collected but as time went on it appeared to the members of the Council that a mistake had been made and that the licenses should not be required. The Town Clerk then was instructed to issue no more licenses and to refund the money paid in.

It is said that the matter came up originally through a general disregard of a bylaw which imposes license fees and regulates peddling and similar activities. The bylaw which caused the rescinding of the license fee does not permit the purchaser of farm produce to peddle it about the streets.

Going to Lake Rossignol. Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon of this city has been invited by the Chief Forester of Nova Scotia to attend a gathering of guides at Lake Rossignol this week. He has accepted the invitation.

GRAND MANAN HAS INCREASED ITS GAME

Three Pair of Deer Imported Seventeen Years Ago Have 500 Offspring—Partridge Imported.

L. A. Gagnon, Chief Game Warden, has returned from Grand Manan Island after spending some days there. The Chief Game Warden was particularly interested in the deer of the island. He was informed that at the present time about five hundred deer exist there in a wild state, the progeny of three bucks and three does imported from the mainland and liberated. For twelve years the animals were absolutely protected. Then an open season of a fortnight each season was permitted and later an open season of a month. Licenses are issued only to residents of the island.

Killed Sixty-Eight Last Year. In the open season of 1925 a total of sixty-eight deer were killed on the island some excellent hunting being obtained. Poaching on Grand Manan is not extensive.

Experiment With Partridge.

As the result of the success of importing deer it has been decided to experiment with imported partridge. Rev. Mr. Mullin, a clergyman located on the island, imported nine birds with the cooperation of the Department of Lands and Mines and released them.

Impressed by Island. The Chief Game Warden was most favorably impressed by Grand Manan. Some 250 cars are registered on the island and use twenty-two miles of highways which are as good as the greater part of the road mileage of the mainland.

In a collision Sunday night between two cars at the intersection of Brunswick and Regent streets, the front wheels were smashed off one car.

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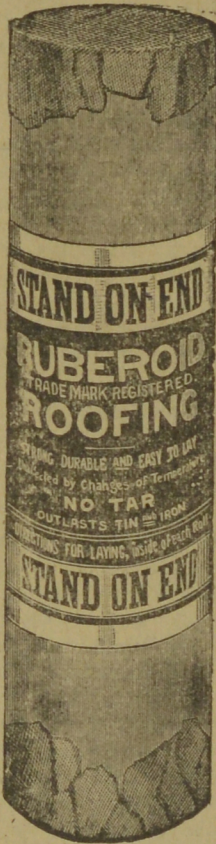
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
