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## Of Interest to the Women

### SPRING FASHIONS.

Although it has been spring on the calendar for a long time, the weather man has refused to admit it and consequently in spite of enticing fashion displays there has been little temptation and no safety in discarding the winter wardrobe can be assembled, and consequently it may be well to review the high spots of the mode for those who have not been interested enough to follow.

The straight line which has been somewhat neglected for the past season or two again appears and occupies a place of considerable importance in nearly all of the French openings. This appears in several variations, one of the most noticeable being the straight jumper which is seen oftenest with a narrow belt of self material. Belts, by the way, are especially indorsed. Numerous and interesting are the ways in which they appear, fancy buckles and novel slides introducing a decorative touch.

The "back bloused silhouette" with a draped front is smart. Often large bows are used to achieve this effect.

The "smoking" is accepted. This smart tailored suit, "smoking," which is the name by which the Frenchman knows his dinner jacket with a flat back and straight lines. It may or may not be worn with a waistcoat, but the most popular type has the waistcoat.

Green in many shades continues to be the outstanding color. Most of the houses showed many models of red. "Crushed strawberry" is a new shade that has attracted notice, for it occupies a place of importance in several of the collections.

The bolero type, or short jacket effect, which has held the interest of fashion designers for quite a while, is exploited in new and interesting ways for both day and evening wear, particularly in the Poiret collection where this silhouette finds especial favor.

Taffeta, the leading fabric for spring, is indorsed in all colors, noticeably in navy blue. This fabric offers great opportunities for the development of the robe de style.

### BANANA PUFFS.

Beat yolks 3 eggs until light, add 1 cup sugar and cup cold water, then add stiffly-beaten whites alternately with 1 cup flour mixed and sifted with 1 teaspoon baking powder and few grains salt. Peel and cut 3 bananas into slices, stir them into batter, half fill buttered cups, steam 1 hour and serve with lemon sauce.

### STUFFED FIG SALAD.

Six figs, 1-2 cup of cream cheese, 6 stuffed olives chopped 1-2 teaspoon salt, dash of paprika, 1-2 cup French dressing, lettuce. Split figs length wise, scoop part of pulp, and add this to cream cheese, olives, seasoning and 2 tablespoons French dressing. Lay half figs on lettuce pile a portion of cheese mixture high in each half and pour French dressing over.

### AFTERNOON TEA CAKES.

"I have found the following recipe a very good one to use when one is serving her afternoon sewing club or card party" writes Mrs. J. D.

Take 1 pound salted soda crackers and spread with fresh peanut

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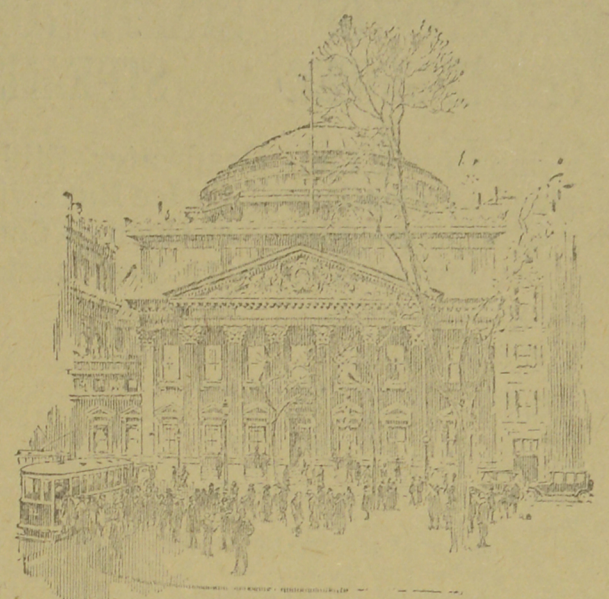
