NO DECISION IS REACHED IN REGARD TO GRAND FALLS; CONFERENCE IS CONCLUDED

St. John, March 9—No decision as to the method of development of the Grand Falls water power was reached at an all day conference between representatives of the Province of New Brunswick, the International Pulp & Paper Company, Limited, and Fraser's Limited, held in the Government rooms yesterday. The conference concluded early last evening without an agreement being reached.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C. Premier of New Brunswick, said after discussion that no result had been attained as yet. Beyond that he had no information to give out at the present time. Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, K. C., president of the Council, also had no announcement to make, while other parties in attendance were equally reticent.

The conference opened in the morning and the entire project of the Grand Falls development was discussed, as well as the contract signed under the Venn regime. A adjournment was made for lunch after which discussion was resumed and continued all afternoon. The conference broke up about 7 o'clock, just in time to allow several of those present to catch the evening train to Montreal.

Possible Courses.

It is said that three possible courses being considered in connection with the proposed development. The first is for the International Company to develop the power and sell to other large users; the second that the development be carried out by the government as was done at Musquash; the third that a company be formed having as initial

parties the manufacturers of pulp and paper in New Brunswick.

It is expected that negotiations will take some time as flowage rights and the quality or power possible are not yet definitely known. It is reported that new ways and means for development were discussed yesterday.

Other Conferences.

The conference was one of several that have taken place during the last few months. An effort is being made to come to some agreement before the legislative sittings. Last fall Premier Baxter announced that the interested parties would be brought together and it would be ascertained what mills they intended to erect and what price they were willing to pay for power.

Those present yesterday were Premier Baxter, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, K. C., president of the council; Hon. E. A. Reilly, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission; A. R. Graustein, of Framingham, Mass., representing the International Paper Co., Ltd.; C. S. Colson, chief engineer of the International; N. C. Head, confidential adviser to Mr. Graustein; R. L. Hearn, consulting hydraulic expert, of Montreal; K. H. Smith, now with the Montreal Engineering Company and formerly of the Waterways branch of the Department of Interior; C. W. Allen, of the same company; Archibald Fraser, of Fraser Ltd., who had Messrs Smith and Allen as engineering advisers for his company; S. R. Weston, chief engineer and A. C. D. Blanchard, hydraulic engineer of the N. B. Electric Power Commission.

SAYS NATIONAL SPIRIT MUST BE FOSTERED

J. W. Daffoe, Winnipeg Editor, Addresses the Montreal Canadian Club.

Montreal, Q., March 8—In order to foster and further the national spirit there must be compromise which necessarily must involve sacrifice, and the blind, rabid partisanship which at present dominated the government of the Dominion must cease, John W. Daffoe, Vice-President and Managing Editor of the Manitoba Free Press, said here tonight, addressing the Young Men's Canadian Club.

The veteran western editor, who celebrated his sixtieth birthday, said he began his newspaper career in this city 43 years ago.

Mistrust 43 Years Ago.

That feeling of pessimism and mistrust which seemed to be so popular today, was popular 43 years ago, said Mr. Daffoe, but the theory of everything going to the "demolition how-ows" could so easily be counteracted by a few moments of reading up conditions of former days.

Mr. Daffoe recalled that he had attended the first parliament of Canada, together with R. S. White, now member for Mount Royal, in the press gallery. That was 10 parliaments ago when the west had five members out of 210 and there was no western bloc, when Winnipeg was a "frontier hamlet built in a swamp." Those were the days, he said, when a Toronto newspaper, in a "superior article written with a note of finality" declared that it was absurd, of course, to say that the west would produce 6,000,000 bushels of grain. The mistrust then manifested was the more remarkable in that the West produced 452,000,000 bushels two years ago.

Can Cope With Problems.

"There is nothing in the condition of Canada to justify the belief that we have problems that we cannot cope with successfully," he said.

To ignore the continuity to the United States, he said, was impossible. To adopt the hostile attitude was both foolish and dangerous.

IMMUNITY FROM DISEASE

GOOD FEELING NOW PREVAILS IN IRELAND

Ottawa Journal: "So much nonsense and distressful news comes out of Ireland, it is a pleasure to occasionally record things, curiously missed by the cables. Thus, the other day Alderman Jameson, a Roman Catholic and a Nationalist, was elected High Sheriff of Belfast. More than that his nomination was moved and seconded by Orangemen and Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, publicly expressed warm pleasure over the incident.

Other things have happened too that show a wondrous change. One of them (recorded by Mr. Stephen Gwynn, the well known ex-Nationalist M. P.) is that the Ulster Government has made most generous provision to help Catholic educationalists; another that 33 political prisoners have had remission of their sentences by Belfast authorities.

"These things, coupled with the recent settlement of the boundary question, and with the fact that Northern and Southern Ministers now regularly confer over problems affecting the country as a whole, give cause for hope. Tolerance, the world over, is on the march."

ANOTHER CANUCK FOR TORONTO CLUB

Toronto, March 8—The Toronto Baseball Club is always glad to afford Canadian ball players the opportunity to make good. At least a score of Canadians have trained with the Leafs, and some of them while never reaching the major leagues, have done creditably in the minors. Yesterday the Leafs signed Harry McIntyre of Woodstock and he will be taken to the Augusta Ga., camp for a tryout in a few days. McIntyre is a right-hander, a most six feet in height and weighing 175 pounds. He is a youngster with all the necessary natural qualifications of a successful flinger, and has earned an enviable reputation in Western Ontario. The new comer lacks experience which is something that cannot be had in a day, and the best coaching in the world is not found in small amateur or "semi-pro" leagues. McIntyre is confident enough in his own ability to suggest that he pay his own training-trip expenses until such time as he demonstrates he is desirable twirling material.

VACUUM DISCS REPLACE FEET OF THE HUSKIES

New York, March 8—Rubber vacuum discs will replace the feet of huskies in drawing the sleds of the French navy Arctic expedition over the ice where the ordinary wheel or tractor would be stalled.

The disclosure of the secret of the mystery sleds, which are being built in France was made today by a prominent engineer who has just returned from abroad.

Daniel G. Martens, a Norwegian explorer invented the mechanism the traction principle of which consists of a wheel with rubber discs which act much like the suckers used to hold objects to glass windows.

Each sled will have a motor connected with the pulling wheel in front, to which the discs will be attached.

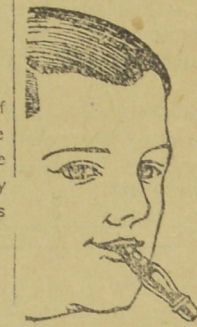
