# Acadia and U. N. B. in College Basketball Here On Thursday Night

Garnet and Blue Leads the Three Colleges Through Beating Mt. Allison—Red and Black Squad is About Same as Last Years—Won 1925 Title.

The second game in the Inter-scholastic Basketball series will be played Thursday night at the University Gymnasium. The teams will be U. N. B. and Acadia University. Acadia comes here with the prestige of a victory over Mt. Allison University at Wolfville. The score was 32 to 24. At half-time Acadia's margin was also eight points.

The University of N. B. team has been up against competition in the Saint John Trojans who are contenders for the Dominion title. What the Red and Black can do against the college teams remains to be seen.

A squad of seven players is ready to take the floor. The work of the athletic council will be to decide the five who will start against the Garnet and Blue. The squad will be, Forwards, Fraser, Babbitt, Seely; Centre, McQuay; Defence, MacPhail, Kincaid, Donohoe. Not too much importance is attached to the showing Mount A. made against the Trojans at Sackville as the Saint John team played under disadvantage.

The Acadia team is reckoned strong and fast and will be dangerous opponents to U. N. B. The latter squad captured the inter-collegiate title last year and should be as good this season, the personnel being little changed. The result will depend upon the strength of the other teams.

The Acadia-Mount A. game at Wolfville is described as follows: "Acadia started off fast and made several shots for the Mt. Allison basket but it was several minutes before they finally scored. Mt. Allison soon retaliated but Acadia's combination of O. Noble to Davidson to Wright soon put the locals in the lead again. Wright shot several baskets in succession and was followed by Smith, the Mt. Allison forward who handled the ball well, shooting a couple of fine baskets. At the end of the period the score stood Acadia 15, Mt. Allison 7. Mt. A. staged a comeback at the

He bagged two of the Senators, three goals the other going to Cy Denneny. Boucher played practically the whole game, but took things carefully.

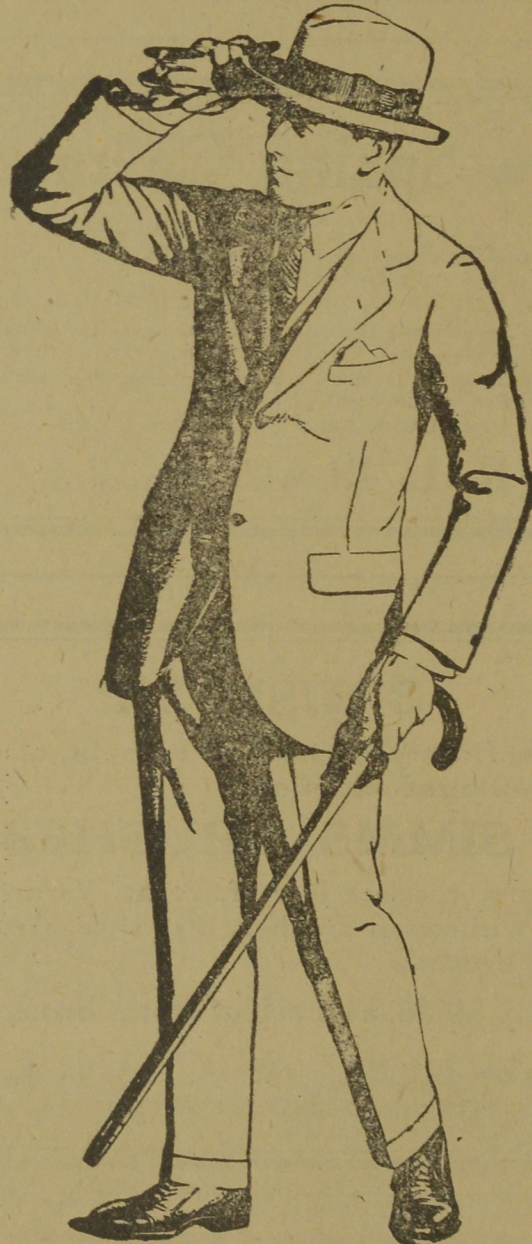
