IMPROVED BUSINESS CONDITIONS REFLECTED BY SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT OF BANK OF MONTREAL

Gain in Current Loans Indicates Increased Demand for Accommodation by Industry and Commerce. Total Assets Close to Three Quarters of a Billion Dollars. Large Growth in Savings Deposit. Profits Slightly Higher.

The half-yearly statement of the Bank of Montreal indicates that there has been a steady expansion in the general business of the country.

For the past few years there had been a gradual improvement in many lines of industry and manufacturers lately have been reporting a tendency on the part of buyers to place larger orders and this in turn has necessitated increased accommodation. Such a development has always been regarded as one of the surest signs of improvement in trade conditions.

With more business offering the Bank has found employment for a larger proportion of its funds in current loans. This condition in turn has evidently made for slightly larger earnings.

Saving Deposits also show a considerable increase, a particularly gratifying feature in a bank which has such a complete chain of branches across the entire country.

The statement, appearing as it does at the re-opening of navigation, comes at an opportune time and is certain to bring increased confidence in the whole Canadian situation.

The general statement of assets and liabilities shows total assets of \$749,132,357, up from \$718,194,797 at the corresponding period a year ago. Of this amount liquid assets are \$406,780,203, equal to 60.33 per cent. of liabilities to the public, while holdings of gold and cash of \$89,520,656 are equivalent, to 13.27 per cent. of public liabilities. It is in current loans that the more active business conditions are reflected, and they now total \$312,336,824, as against \$263,397,582 a year

ago. Of this amount current loans and discounts in Canada have gained to \$227,325,605, from \$211,096,703, and loans to cities, towns and municipalities are \$25,982,091, as against \$22,123,338. This increase in loans has been taken care of by a reduction in holdings of securities. The principal accounts in this section are Dominion and Provincial Government securities, \$93,456,444, compared with \$99,911,141; Canadian Municipal securities and British, Foreign and Colonial Public securities \$33,599,867, as against \$45,756,338.

It is the large gain in savings deposits which has brought total deposits up to \$632,412,154, from \$601,851,114. Of this amount savings deposits represent \$489,464,334 and show an increase from \$475,504,734.

Profit and Loss Account.

With the improved trade conditions and the larger business handled, profits have also shown a tendency to increase. Profits for the six months amounted to \$2,469,326, 8.25 per cent on the capital or 4.06 per cent upon the Capital, Rest and Profit Accounts of the Bank, as against \$2,414,012 for the corresponding period in the previous year. This, added to the balance of Profit and Loss at the end of the last fiscal year, brought the total amount available for distribution up to \$3,066,144. This was distributed as follows: Dividends, \$1,795,902; provision for taxes, Dominion Government, \$194,583; reservation for Bank Premises, \$150,000; leaving a balance to be carried forward of \$926,529, as against \$596,788 at the end of the fiscal year.

NEW YORKERS BACK ARCTIC EXPEDITION

Vancouver B. C., May 28—On June 15 the 75 foot power schooner Nigalik will depart for the Arctic on a fur trading expedition which will keep her in the far north for several years.

The vessel was constructed here for a newly formed Canadian company controlled by C. P. Clarke and R. C. MacGregor of Vancouver and backed by New York capital.

The Nigalik will proceed from Vancouver along the Alaska coastline trading with Eskimos and then proceed to Bothia Peninsula where it may be necessary to winter. It is planned if possible to make the northwest passage to Baffinland.

Quotes King's Book.

London May 27—Premier Mackenzie King's book "Industry and Humanity," which was published in 1918 is referred to in a letter to the Times by an anonymous English correspondent, the letter being given a prominent place in the Times. The correspondent quotes an extract from the book as being specially applicable to the recent general strike.

Hendaye, 12 miles southwest of Bayonne on the the Bay of Biscay is suggested as a possible place of internment.

Hendaye is suggested partly because of its proximity to the Franco-Spanish border.

SMALL CONCERNS WILL BE GIVEN PROTECTION

Hon. Mr. Boivin Announces Amendment to Income Tax Bill.

Ottawa, May 27—When the income tax bill is before the house next week it will have included a clause to protect the small industrial corporation from double taxation. Hon. G. H. Boivin, Minister of Customs, announced this in the house tonight when budget resolutions to amend the income tax act were under consideration.

"The clause," he said, "would give to these corporations the opportunity of making their own option of paying their taxation as joint stock companies or as individual partnerships."

To Meet Objection.

"That will meet my objection to a very great extent," observed C. H. Cahan of St. Lawrence-St. George.

Mr. Boivin intimated that the government was endeavoring to reach with taxation the man who incorporated himself as an investment corporation, evaded taxation by withdrawing from the operation only what he required to pay for his living expenses paid 9 per cent. on the balance and left the entire amount of his surplus to accumulate from year to year in the corporation.

"We have protected the small industrial investor," he added, "by placing in the bill a clause to the effect that partners going into business, or people entering what may be called a family incorporation, shall have the option of paying either as a partnership, or as a company, as they desire."

Deduction for M. P.'s.

Replying later to a question by Sir Henry Drayton, Mr. Boivin said that he thought it would be absolutely fair to allow members of Parliament to deduct a reasonable amount for board and living expenses while discharging their parliamentary duties at Ottawa from their indemnity allowance shown in their income tax return. The law was enacted by the previous administration, however, and had made no such allowance; and the Government wanted, therefore, to follow the example of its predecessors.

Mr. Boivin further stated that a clause directed at companies formed to evade taxation would be retroactive in its operation.

The resolutions carried, and a bill based upon them was given first reading.
