GRANITE CLUB OF TORONTO BUILDS PALATIAL HOUSE

Nine Sheets of Artificial Ice for Curling—Badminton, Squash, Bowling and Other Sports.

Toronto, May 27—Work commenced yesterday on what is expected to be the finest club property in Canada that of the Granite Club of this city. President Frank Shannon and the Board of Directors of the club were on the scene when a big steam shovel turned the first sod on the grounds on the south side of St. Clair Avenue, about 400 feet west of Yonge Street. The time limit on the contract for the completion of the building and grounds is Nov. 15, and it is hoped to open the elegant new quarters shortly after that date. This club will be a credit not only to the members but to the City of Toronto.

There will be nine sheets of artificial ice for curling purposes with glass-enclosed heated observation rooms on two sides; eight badminton courts, two handball courts, four squash racquets courts, six bowling alleys, swimming pool 75 by 25 feet, "snack counters," 25 bedrooms with shower baths, etc., main lounge, library, main dining-room seating 250 diners, ladies' club, barber shop, indoor golf course, etc.

Outside the building ten lawn bowling greens will be built with room for several additional greens, lawn tennis courts, spacious parking accommodation for automobiles.

The most minute details have been given careful attention in the plans for the magnificent new Granite Club and special provision has been made for the ladies and children of the members' families. Days will be set apart when they will have exclusive use of the club and its equipment and competent instructors engaged for the various activities.

Granites for some years supported a hockey team as well as curling. Dunc Munro, Hooley Smith and others now prominent pro players were with them.

DEMAR UNDER OBSERVATION BY FOUR DOCTORS

The secret of the speed and endurance of Clarence Demar, Marathon runner, is being sought by four doctors at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Demar, 33-year-old printer, won the Boston Marathon championship at Baltimore. For half an hour each morning, according to The Associated Press he is the subject of scientific experiments at the hospital. A clip is placed on his nose to close it and his mouth is covered with a rubber shield connected with a breathing apparatus. Then he rides a stationary bicycle in the laboratory for half an hour, where his heart and blood reactions are carefully measured as he exercises. In order to obtain a basis for comparison, experiments have already been conducted with other men by the physicians. It is expected that the tests may show the advantages of athletic training and the possibly greater defense of the athlete.

Montreal, May 28—The Cincinnati Reds, leading the National League, will play a game here on June 6th against the manchester team the leaders of the New England League. Judge Landis, Baseball Czar has been invited to be present.

Amateur Baseball to Have Three-Team League Opening on June 7th

C. J. Loughlin of Devon President—Fredericton, Marysville and Devon to Have Teams—Residence Rules to be Arranged by the League Executive—Three Umpires to be Named.

A meeting in the interest of an Amateur Baseball League, consisting of three teams, representing Fredericton, Devon and Marysville was held last evening in the Town Council chambers at Devon. Much important business was discussed and the following officers were elected. President, C. J. Loughlin, Devon. Vice President, W. Collett, Marysville. Sec. Treas. Alden Clark, Fredericton.

It is the intention of the League to open officially June 7th, and continue with three games per week, throughout the season.

Residence Rule.

Much discussion took place over the residence rule for players and it was laid on the table to be settled by the Executive which is to meet at Marysville on Tuesday June 1st.

Three Umpires.

Three men will be appointed by each team to act as umpires for the League, two officiating at every game and one substitute. A schedule is to be drawn up at once. The three teams comprising the League were represented at last night's meeting.

Muirfield, Scotland, May 27—A. Jamieson the Scot, who will face Bobby Jones in the round tomorrow morning preceding the semi-finals if one of those modest self-contained golfers who is quite unperturbed by his success so far and by the prospect of facing the American champion tomorrow.

Jones of course enters the next round with the greatest prestige owing to his smashing defeat of Robert Harris who only won a single hole throughout the match. He halved two more and the rest fell to Jones' phenomenal brilliancy. His astounding 25-yard putt from the edge of the first green for a birdie filled him with confidence which was never shaken throughout the game. The only hole he lost on his tee shot. He finished the first nine holes there under par while Harris could do no better than 41, which is three over par.

MORE GOLFERS FROM THE STATES HAVE SET SAIL

Walter Hagen Among Them—All Set for the Match With Abe Mitchell—Strong Squad.

New York, May 27—Walter Hagen and the remaining four members of a team of 10 professionals which will invade Great Britain for a series of matches and for participation in the British open golf championship sailed on the Aquitania.

In addition to the American professional champion, Bill Mehlhorn of Chicago, Tommy Armour of Washington, D. C., Al Watrous of Grand Rapids, Mich. and Joe Stein of Nashua, N. H. were in the contingent. They will join Jim Barnes winner of the British open last year, Fred McLeod of Washington, D. C. Cyril Walker, former American open title-holder, Joe Kirkwood, trick-shot artist and Emmett French of Youngstown, O. who already are in England.

Hagen also will engage Abe Mitchell, famous British professional in a 72-hole match for a purse of £1000. The contest will be played June 18 and 19 on the Westworth and Moor Park courses.

MR. MEIGHEN WAS GIVEN A WARM WELCOME

Ottawa, May 25—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, resumed his seat in the House of Commons this afternoon after an absence of two weeks through illness.

Premier King and Robert Forke, Progressive leader expressed pleasure that Mr. Meighen was able to return and hoped his health had been fully restored. The Conservative chieftain smilingly bowed in acknowledgement of the welcome.

YES, THEY HAVE BANANAS, BUT NO BUYERS

London, May 27—The banana boom brought about in London by the popularity of "Yes, We Have No Bananas," has collapsed and banana dealers are seeking a new slogan with the hope of reviving trade. When the song was at the height of its vogue the banana business did very well, but the trade has been slipping of late and has almost reached the doldrum stage.

A. H. Stockley, director of the largest tropical fruit shippers in England says reports of enormous profits made here and in the United States by the banana trade are untrue.

ASSERTS STAGE IS DISGUSTING

Chicago May 27—"The modern legitimate stage is disgusting" says Mrs. Lionel Barrymore. "It panders to the most vulgar tastes of the public. I do not blame actors and actresses who stick to the movies when the stage demands them, so patiently, to lower themselves.

"It is not because I dislike the theatre that I say the present trend is coarse. In fact I prefer the stage to the screen myself, but I may go back into the movies."

BOSTON RED SOX STRENGTHEN FOR AN EFFORT

Give Five Players for Two, Outfielder and Infielder—Both Reputed Heavy Hitters.

Boston, May 27—The Red Sox will have two new players within the next few days one of whom is an outfielder, the other an infielder.

Pres Quinn closed the deal by long distance telephone late yesterday afternoon. It was a case of giving five players for two.

The outfielder secured is Henry C. Fitzgerald of the Wichita Falls club of the Texas League. Pitchers Kiefer and Ross and outfielder Tom Jenkins were given in exchange for this player.

Fitzgerald is a left-handed hitter, and throws left-handed.

He is 23 years old, stands 5 feet 11 1/2 inches and weighs 163 pounds. His home is in Eagle Pass, Tex. He was highly recommended by Bob Coleman and Pat Manahan, Red Sox scouts. In 138 games last season he batted for an average of .341. His 197 hits included 43 doubles, 6 triples and 17 home runs.

McCann and Geyhan were traded to Columbus of the American Association for an infielder named Regan, who so far this season has been hitting for .344. Regan was recommended by Rury Hulswitt. Both players are to report at once.

ENGLISHMAN DIAGNOSES MANY ILLS

Cincinnati, Ohio May 27—Too many old-fashioned mines and not enough up-to-date labor-saving machinery was given as the reason for Great Britain's labor troubles by L. J. Barraclough, Linton, England, who is attending the annual convention of the American Mining Congress here today. He came to study modern methods used on this continent to cheapen coal production. "What we need in Britain are increased wages and increased production," he said.


