

### COMMUNION SERVICE GIVEN TO ST. ANDREW'S

#### Memorial to Late Her- man H. Pitts of Otta- wa — Is a Gift of His Widow.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church of Fredericton has received from the widow of Herman H. Pitts of Ottawa a handsome silver communion service, which is presented in memory of her husband who was a trustee and elder of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Ottawa, at the time of his death, and who while a resident of Fredericton was a trustee of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. The communion service arrived here recently consigned to W. M. Clark and last night at a congregational meeting of St. Andrew's he exhibited a portion of the service. It is not known when the formal presentation will take place as the minister Rev. Mr. Barry of Dalbeattie, Scotland, has not yet arrived to begin his duties.

#### Suitably Engraved.

The covers of the six silver trays are suitably engraved the inscription being, "Presented to St. Andrew's Church, Fredericton, in Memory of Herman H. Pitts".

The entire service is valuable and handsome. It is of the individual communion service type. Each of the six silver trays contains forty glasses, making a service for two hundred and forty persons. The trays are of interlocking pattern.

It was known some time ago that Mrs. Pitts intended to make the gift but there was a delay until glasses of the required type could be obtained from England.

### CITY AFFAIRS

**Manager at Stanley.**  
R. S. Jardine has taken over the management of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Stanley. He replaces C. J. Loughlin, who has been transferred to the branch at Devon.

**For Hearing Tomorrow.**  
Two juvenile offenders charged with theft of junk, are in gaol waiting hearing on Saturday. One youth is colored. Both are said to be associated with a gang of boys in the West End.

**Bylaw Violations.**  
In the police court this morning two convictions were made for violation of city bylaws. Fines of five dollars were imposed, the offences being acknowledged. One was for stopping a car abreast of another and the other was for stopping a car and failing to pull up to the curb.

**Not Out of Season.**  
A resident of the rural districts wearing a wornout fur coat & lyol—wearing a Wambat fur coat, somewhat the worse for wear, attracting some attention on Queen street yesterday. In reply to questions he declared that the coat felt very comfortable.

**Late Rev. C. N. Barton.**  
The funeral of the late Rev. C. N. Barton took place today at Hartland where the body was taken for interment. The funeral service was conducted Thursday at the Baptist Church Mouth of Keswick. Many clergymen of the United Baptist and other denominations were present and took part in the service.

**Cadet Inspection Today.**  
Col. A. B. Snow of Saint John who is registered at the Windsor, is here for the purpose of conducting the annual inspection of the cadet corps of the schools of Fredericton. The inspection in drill and physical training took place at the Officers' Square this afternoon beginning at 3.30.

**Judgement for J. S. Scott.**  
In the ejectment suit J. S. Scott vs George Donohoe, judgment was given in favor of the plaintiff by Mr. Justice Crockett. The defendant had been cutting fuel and purpwood on land owned by the plaintiff at Lake George. Stumpage of \$1.50 was allowed the plaintiff on a few pieces of pulpwood cut this year. The defendant ignored an injunction served on him and explained his action by saying that he believed the injunction was not issued until yesterday.

### SEVEN CASES ON DOCKET FOR JUNE SESSION OF APPEAL DIVISION ON TUESDAY NEXT

#### Presentation and Unveiling of Portrait of Hon. George Ludlow to Take Place—Chief Justice of Nova Scotia Appears as Defendant in One Case—Munroe vs Pinder Again.

The Appeal Division, Supreme Court of New Brunswick will meet here Tuesday morning in regular June session. The docket is composed of seven cases. A feature of the session will be the presentation and unveiling of a portrait of the Hon. George Ludlow, first Chief Justice of New Brunswick. The portrait is presented by Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen and J. M. Robinson of Saint John. Members of the bar attending the ceremony are to appear in robes.

The docket is as follows:—  
**Motion Paper.**  
Ross, Appellant and Lingley, Chamberlain City of St. John, Respondent. Referred by Chief Justice Hazen. W. B. Wallace, K. C., to support appeal.

**Crown Paper.**  
The King vs. Frank Braydon. H. W. Robertson, for defendant, to support appeal from a conviction under The Criminal Code.

**Appeal Paper.**  
(County Court.)  
McCully vs. Maritime United Farmers Co-operative, Ltd. J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., for defendant, to support appeal from Westmorland County Court.

**King's Bench Division.**  
His Majesty the King vs. Harris, et al. Hon. Attorney General, for Plaintiff, to support appeal from judgment of Mr. Justice LeBlanc.

Munroe et al vs. Pinder Lumber & Milling Co., Ltd. et al. J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., for defendants, to move to set aside verdict for plaintiffs, and enter a verdict for the defendants or for a new trial.

Verette vs. Pelletier, et al. A. J. Dionne, for plaintiff, to move to set aside verdict for defendants and enter judgment for plaintiff, or for a new trial.

**Saint John License Case.**  
On the Motion Paper the case of Ross vs Lingley concerns a decision by Police Magistrate Henderson of Saint John that Ross, an employee of the Dominion Department of Public Works at Ottawa, is liable to pay a license fee in the City of Saint John where he was sent to superintend construction work on a Federal building.

The case went before Chief Justice Hazen who referred it to the full bench.

**Queen's County Theft.**  
The Crown Paper case, The King vs Frank Braydon, is a Queen's County case, the defendant who is appealing, having been convicted of the theft of a number of mink skins. An extension was granted at the last session of the court because of delay in receipt of the transcript of evidence. Several grounds are stated in the appeal including undue severity in sentence and distant consanguinity between party concerned and trial judge.

**United Farmers Ltd.**  
The two County Court cases, McCully vs Maritime United Farmers Co-operative Ltd., and Carter vs The Same, are appeals by the company against decisions making the parent company liable for debts of subordinate company in the United Farmers' Cooperative organization.

**Chief Justice of N. S.**  
In the King's Bench Division the case of His Majesty the King vs Hon. Robert E. Harris, Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, G. Fred Pearson and Charles H. Cahan, concerns land used as right of way for the Elgin & Havelock Railway. Under provincial legislation of 1919 to provide for the sale of various short lines of railway to the Department of Railways the transfer of this line was made. It was sought to transfer the rights of the defendants in the land. Mr. Justice LeBlanc decided against the Crown which is now appealing.

**Munroe vs. Pinder.**  
In Munroe et al vs Pinder Lumber & Milling Co., the defendant company is appealing against a verdict in a trespass case concerning lumber lands in the Parish of Southampton.

The case of Verette vs Pelletier et al, concerns an action to prevent the closing of a road in Madawaska County which is claimed to be a public road leading to a ferry operated by the plaintiff. The verdict was in favor of the defendants.
