## SAINT JOHN TROJANS LOST TO U.N.B. 24 TO 0

College Team Worked  
Good for First Game  
—Back Division Scored  
All but One Try.

The University of New Brunswick rugby team made its debut Saturday at College field defeating the Trojan A. C. of Saint John 24 to 0. The score was made up of six tries and three converts and was divided pretty evenly between the two periods. Jack Babbitt made all the converts. The Trojans were unorganized and are under the usual handicap with regard to practices, and the presence of other senior teams in Saint John organized into a local league reduces available material. The teams will meet again at Saint John next Saturday and Trojans should be able to show better.

### Veteran Coach.

George Shaw who will be remembered by old-timers as a member of the Saint John A. & B. team in the New Brunswick League thirty years ago and who played with Saint John teams since then, appeared as Trojan coach. He remarked upon the handicap under which his team worked and said:

"This college team should score ten tries on them."

### Trojans Strong Tacklers.

Hollies was there with some strong punting and Short well known as a tennis player got in some good runs and so did Bayly. The Saint John team played an eight-man scrum against the seven of the college team. The advantage in weight told at the first but as time went on the college forwards heeled better and took the ball almost every scrum. Trojans tackled hard throughout the game.

### U. N. B. Squad Looked Good.

For the first game the Red and Black squad looked good. The strict rugby rule against substitution was abandoned and several players worked in on the college team at various times. Trites, Wishart, Petrie, Pierson and Stratton were used as forwards, Lockhart as half-back and Holmes and Simpson as three-quarter backs.

Babbitt was used for the kicking. Bud Steen played well but "hogged" the ball a fault for which he was reprimanded by Coach Burden. Capt. Bill Donohoe played both scrum and his old position in the three-quarter line. With one exception the U. N. B. tries were made by backfield movements with the running and passing done well. The forwards also got into the passing at times. The two wing "threes" McCaffrey and Goodspeed did the scoring except one try by Babbitt when the ball came in again from the end and another by Currie after a scrum close in on the Trojan goal-line.

As an indication of what the university has in rugby material and the success which may be expected in plugging the holes in the "big team" of 1925 the game showed that the Red and Black with some of the rough edges smoothed away should have an average team.

### The Scoring.

The first try was made six minutes after the start of the game by Goodspeed who went through all alone after the ball was sent to him on the wing. Babbitt converted. Score 5 to 0. Play went up and down the field for a time. There was much scrummaging close to the Saint John goal-line. Currie finally went over for the second try from scrum. Babbitt kicked low and wide. Score 8 to 0. Trojans held the scoring down until the half was almost done when the U. N. B. backs got away on a combined run the ball being handled from man to man until McCaffrey went over and scored. Babbitt converted. Score 13 to 0.

U. N. B. pressed in the second half although Trojans tackled well. Steen displayed selfishness in carrying the ball going through himself too often. There was a scrum close to the Trojan line from which the ball came out and Goodspeed scored again after some fine passing. Babbitt failed to convert. Score 16 to 0. The next try went to McCaffrey after a long combined run by the backs. There was no convert. Score 24 to 0.

## Even Break so Far In World's Series, St. Louis Sunday, Yanks Saturday

Herb Pennock Won His Game 2 to 1 But Cardinals  
Came Out 6 to 2 on Sunday—Crowds Attended  
as Before.

New York, Oct. 3.—Grover Cleveland Alexander, one of baseball's old masters, uncured the mighty power in his ancient right arm to pitch the Cardinals to victory over the Yankees today in the second game of the world's series before the greatest crowd that ever saw a ball game.

The mammoth Yankee Stadium rocked with the roar of a record gathering of 63,000 fans as the 39-year-old veteran of the Cardinals' staff checked the impetuous rush of the Yankees while his team mates, clouted Urban Shocker, Yankee spit-baller, from the box and battered their way to triumph by the decisive margin of 6 to 2.

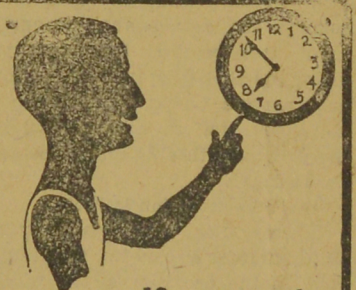
In the second half Clark scored again. There was no convert.
