

### M'GILLICUDDY REMANDED UNTIL MONDAY NEXT

#### Burgoyne Let Go to Appear as Witness—P. J. Hughes, K. C., Acting as Counsel for Prisoner.

James McGillicuddy of Cork Station appeared in the police court here this morning on a remand in connection with the death of Rose Miller aged twelve years, at Central Kingsclear, Sept. 29th. Peter J. Hughes, K. C., appeared as his counsel. Leo Burgoyne of Newmarket also appeared he having been a passenger in McGillicuddy's car which struck the girl inflicting injuries resulting in death.

#### Held on Jury Verdict.

McGillicuddy was remanded until Monday the 11th inst., as the result of the verdict of the coroner's jury. He is held for examination on that verdict which charged him with carelessness as well as stating there was carelessness on the part of the deceased.

#### Burgoyne Let Go.

Burgoyne was released on his own recognizance to appear when wanted as material witness.

Charles L. Dougherty, Clerk of the Peace, appeared for the Crown. If other business permits McGillicuddy may appear for preliminary examination before Monday.

No charge has been preferred against him.

### CITY AFFAIRS

#### Elected Elders.

The continued fine weather is very helpful to the farmers, who are reported to be making good progress gathering the potato and root crops. Potatoes are turning out well and the yield promises to be a heavy one. At present they are selling for two dollars per barrel.

#### Women's Mission Ends.

The Women's Mission at St. Dunstan's church which has been conducted by Rev. Father McGreal, C. S. S. R., and Rev. Father Quinn, C. S. S. R., during the past week closed yesterday afternoon. Large congregations were present at all the services. This week will be devoted to the men.

#### Pastor at Silver Falls.

Rev. Charles Carroll entered upon his pastorate of St. Joachim's church, Silver Falls, yesterday and was the celebrant at 10 o'clock mass. He announced his appointment to his new congregation and was heartily welcomed. Rev. Father Carroll, who comes from Moncton, succeeds Rev. C. P. J. Carleton, who has been appointed to the parish of Milltown. Rev. Father Carroll is well known in Fredericton having been curate at St. Dunstan's.

#### Fire Early This Morning

Fire early this morning occurred on the premises in King Street West owned by Mrs. Ellen Doyle. The blaze was noticed by Mrs. Abe Lavigne and an alarm was rung in from Box 17. The fire was in a discarded garment identified as an old skirt which was on a banking against the house. The flames had ignited the clapboards. Chemicals were used to put out the blaze.

#### A Good Job Done.

Mr. Frank Boone of Devon has about completed the work of rebuilding the Five Mile Brook Bridge on the main trunk road in the Parish of Stanley and teams and cars are now crossing the structure. While the work owing to its importance has been speeded up a very substantial job has been done. Mr. John A. Young ex-M. P., officiated as inspector and Mr. J. M. Chappell of this city assisted with the concrete work. The Four Mile Bridge on the same highway is reported to be in a dangerous condition and will soon have to be rebuilt.

### SPECIAL REPORT ON HYDROREADY FOR COUNCIL

#### Grand Falls Current Not Considered Feasible—Musquash Extension and Other New Projects Discussed.

The City Council in committee tonight will receive the special report on hydro possibilities in this city and vicinity. The report is in the hands of His Worship Mayor Clark who will present it to the Council. It was prepared by S. R. Weston, Chief Engineer of the New Brunswick Power Commission, acting for that body and Prof. John Stephens of the University of New Brunswick, acting for the City of Fredericton.

#### Grand Falls too Costly.

The facts set forth by the report are not known in their entirety the Mayor stating today that the Council should have the report before it is made public. It is forecasted however that the report finds that it is not feasible to construct transmission lines which will bring the current to Fredericton from the Grand Falls development at a rate at which it can be used economically.

#### Other Possibilities.

Other possibilities are discussed by the report. They include the extension of the Musquash distribution system and also new developments on the Saint John River and its tributaries within a few miles of Fredericton. Included in these possibilities are understood to be the Saint John River at Meductic Rapids also the Shogomoc and Pokiok streams and Eel River. All of these projects have been proposed before.

#### Distribution and Consumption.

The report it is said will furnish data on distribution and consumption in the city and vicinity and also the relationship of The Maritime Electric Company to the distribution of hydro current. The company it is believed would act as distributing agent or would sell its plant, price being satisfactory.


