R. B. Hanson, K. C., Given Enthusiastic Reception

Accepted Nomination in Characteristic Speech— Referred to Campaign of Slander and Abuse Against Himself—Issues of Day Discussed— Speeches by J. D. Palmer, Hon. C. D. Richards and E. C. Atkinson, M. L. A.

Richard B. Hanson, K. C., barrister, of Fredericton, was nominated Saturday afternoon as the Conservative candidate for York-Sunbury in the forthcoming Federal general election. The nomination was tendered unanimously to Mr. Hanson who accepted it amid scenes of enthusiasm. No other name was placed before the convention and the proceedings apart from the speaking were little more than formalities. The nomination of Mr. Hanson was a foregone conclusion before the convention met and the reception with which he met from delegates from every part of the two counties showed the high regard in which he is held. That regard was put in form in a resolution moved by Coun. Fred Seymour of Douglas and seconded by Coun. Walter Hargrove of Lakeville Corner. The resolution and the acceptance of the nomination of Mr. Hanson were cheered to the echo. Many ladies were present.

There also was a resolution of confidence in the present Federal government which was moved by J. D. Palmer of Fredericton and seconded by W. B. Cronkhite of Southampton. This resolution mentioned particularly Premier Meighen and Hon. George B. Jones, Minister of Labour, New Brunswick's representative in the cabinet.

The candidate in accepting nomination made a characteristically vigorous speech in which he referred to the slanders and abuse which had been directed toward himself and the reply which the electorate had given in October last at the polls when he was given a record majority. Dealing with the issues of the day Mr. Hanson stressed the Customs Inquiry and replied to the constitutional question raised as a "smoke-screen" by MacKenzie King. The candidate warned against undue optimism because of the huge majority of the last election and made an appeal for the assistance of all.

Mr. Hanson was followed by Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, and E. C. Atkinson, M. L. A. for Sunbury. Both approved the choice of a candidate and foretold victory here and throughout the Dominion.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.

W. J. Scott in Chair—Excellent Speech by J. D. Palmer.

W. J. Scott of Fredericton, president of the York-Sunbury Conservative Executive, took the chair at 2.15 and called the convention to order. He said that as was well known the convention had been called for the purpose of selecting a Conservative candidate for the approaching general Federal Election. It seemed that elections had become almost as numerous as tax bills, they were coming so close together. The presiding officer then declared the convention open for business.

J. D. Palmer of Fredericton addressed the convention stating that he believed the time opportune for the presentation of a resolution asserting confidence in the new government as led by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen. He would make his remarks brief as the time was limited, but there were one or two points upon which he believed he ought to touch. Premier Meighen in a recent utterance had declared that the Maritime Provinces were to receive better treatment in the matter of freight rates. In the Maritime Provinces many problems pressed for solution but the most important were those of transportation and distribution. With those disposed of the Maritimes could solve the others. They would do it as soon as there was in power in Canada a government which would give a fiscal policy the country ought to have.

It was hardly necessary for him to refer to the leader of the party, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen. He was recognized as one of the ablest men the country had produced in this or any other time. In Hon. George B. Jones, selected as New Brunswick's representative in the cabinet, the country had a successful business man who was well fitted for his duties.

For five years the country had been drifting like a ship without sail or rudder. It would be remembered that Mac-

kenzie King had announced the chart by which he was to be guided on his course but subsequent events had indicated that he had been guided by nothing. After September 14th when the government led by Premier Meighen would be returned to power the Dominion would have a reasonable policy and a real cabinet, and would progress. There was no reason why Canada should not make progress. The country was as good as any in the world and the people had proven them-

selves to be the equal of any by what they had done in the past. What was needed was leadership and not a man at the head of affairs who would be driven about by every wind that blew. For these reasons he wanted a unanimous endorsement of the resolution the adoption of which he moved.

W. B. Cronkhite of Middle Southampton seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

Resolved that this Convention of the Conservative Party of York-Sunbury expresses its hearty congratulations to the Right Honorable Arthur Meighen on his accession to the Premiership of Canada and to again declare its unwavering loyalty to and confidence in his leadership and policy as enunciated in the resolutions which he moved in Parliament and as declared in his recent utterances. Especially would we commend his declared policy regarding the treatment to be given the Maritime Provinces in regard to freight rates and the marketing of our products and we pledge our unanimous support to the Conservative Candidate selected by this Convention.

And further resolved that we desire to express our satisfaction at the inclusion in the cabinet of Hon. G. B.

Jones, whose ability and untiring efforts on behalf of the Conservative Party in this Province deserve our hearty support.

Resolution on R. B. Hanson, K. C.

Coun. Fred Seymour of Douglas then moved a resolution of appreciation of R. B. Hanson, K. C., to the effect that he be placed in nomination. Coun. Walter Hargrove of Lakeville Corner, Sunbury County seconded the resolution which was adopted unanimously with cheers.

The resolution was as follows:—

Moved by Mr. Fred Seymour. Seconded by Mr. Walter Hargrove. RESOLVED that Mr. R. B. Hanson be the Candidate for the Conservative Party in this Constituency, and, while re-affirming our implicit belief in his honor and integrity, we wish to add our appreciation of his valuable services as our representative in the past

Candidate Foretells Victory For Party September 14th—Deals With Customs Scandal and Other Issues of Campaign.

Mr. Hanson said that his first words would be words of thanks for the unanimous nomination tendered him. On three former occasions the party had been good enough to nominate him and three times he had led the party to victory.
