A SPLENDID ENDORSEMENT

Mr. Richard B. Hanson, K. C., who has been York-Sunbury's representa- provincial election has been declared tive in the Federal Parliament for the past five and one half years, during which time he has carried the Conscr vative standard to victory on three occasions, was on Saturday unani mously chosen to contest this consti tuency at the election to be held of September 14th. The convention which placed him in nomination with out a dissenting voice, was in the opinion of those competent to judge the largest, most representative and either of the great political parties. This is an exceedingly busy seaso for the farmers; they are expected to make hay while the sun shines, bu on Saturday hundreds of them pitche the job for the time being and jour neyed to the city to express emphatic representative and to make sure of his nomination for another term. Every parish in the two counties, and as far as can be learned every polling district was represented in the splendid gathering which thronged the Cour House to capacity and joined heartily in paying to Mr. Hanson one of the finest tributes ever given to a public man in this province.

Mr. Hanson's unanimous nomination by the Conservatives of York-Sunbury on Saturday simply means that, whe ther he is opposed or not, he will be the next representative of this con stituency in the Parliament of Can ada and in the future as in the pas he can be depended upon to worthily discharge his duties in the best inter ests of all the people. 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
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
