Holyoke, July 22—Jack Delaney, light heavyweight champion of the world, was tendered a public reception tonight at Holyoke. The reception started at 7 o'clock when a host of friends and admirers had the pleasure of shaking hands with him. At the Maplest playgrounds, he was presented with a silver loving cup the gift of friends of Holyoke. The presentation was made by Mayor Scaulon. Delaney accepted the gift and the crowd, numbering about 5000, shouted for a speech. With a smile the champion turned to the audience and said: "I thank you, all that's all."

On the platform with the champion and the Mayor was a delegation from the Board of Aldermen and other city officials. George W. O'Connell of the Board of Public Works introduced the Mayor who paid a glowing tribute to Delaney.

Following the exercises the marchers filed to Lyman st. to the home of the champion's parents then to South Holyoke and back to the Hotel Nonotuck. The silver loving cup presented to Delaney was carried by Jack's niece, Miss Delina Durand of 650 South East st.
