WAR ON THE CROW.

Jack Miner, the noted naturalist and bird fancier of Kingsville, Ontario, who maintains a game sanctuary on his farm, should have the support of the farmers of Canada in the war he is waging on the crow. In published letters and speeches he is denouncing the crow as a robber and declares that it should be given no quarter. Mr. Miner has devised a trap on his farm for the capture and destruction of these black marauders and has already accounted for hundreds of them. That he is on the right track and is rendering a good service to the agriculturists of the country there is not the slightest doubt. The Toronto Saturday Night in an article commending the work of Mr. Miner has this to say:

"Jack Miner, Canada's foremost bird lover and naturalist, has declared war on the crow. More power to his elbow and to his trigger finger. Long ago we took up the case against this black robber and murderer, and we are glad to see so doughty a warrior as Jack Miner come to our rescue. The plea for the crow was that he is the enemy of the corn borer. Jack Miner has pretty well settled that by proving the sable villain to be of little use even in this respect. Crows will never bother looking for corn borers or anything else of that sort when they get a nice young song bird or the eggs of a song bird. These with young chickens or even young turkeys are much more to their taste."

There is no doubt that the farmers of New Brunswick regard the crow as a destructive nuisance and will heartily sympathize with Mr. Miner in the energetic campaign which he is carrying on.

HEROISM OF THE SEA.

The story of the heroism of the crew of the American steamship President Roosevelt, in rescuing at sea the crew of the British tramp steamer, Antioch, is one which will never die. The Roosevelt which is a passenger ship stood by the crippled ship for four days and never left her until the last man had been taken off. A mountainous sea was running at the time, and two of the Roosevelt's crew perished in an heroic attempt to reach the stricken ship. As the St. John Globe well says:

"The story of Captain Fried is a tale to warm the heart and to inspire nations to high enterprise. The American people and the American Merchant Marine are justly proud of the Roosevelt and its men from Captain to stoker. Older nations of sea-going folk, and those who live far inland respond to the thrill of this deed, which is one of the most heroic in the story of the Atlantic, already rich in traditions of sacrifice and sheer bravery. The acclaiming bells of New York will long echo and re-echo this story in London and in Canada where gratitude and admiration are everywhere expressed for the rescue of the men of the Antioch under such terrible conditions."

Capt. Fried of the Roosevelt and his gallant crew have been honored by the people of two great English speaking nations, and the tributes paid them have been well deserved.

SPORT IN THE EAST.

The editor of the Truro News in commenting on a letter from a correspondent in Alberta singing the praises of that province, has this to say: "We thank our thoughtful correspondent for very ample supplies of

pamphlets, maps, views, newspaper clippings etc. We were naturally interested in what was said about Central Alberta "as a sportsman's paradise"; and to quote further, "its streams are filled with rainbow trout, lake trout and coarse fish;" but we would not give a dozen of our Atlantic Salmon and big sea trout caught only a mile or two from "Alberta's" old Nova Scotia home, for all the lake and river fish of the West, nor the "fishermen's paradise," in fly-catching these strong lively sea fish for a whole Summer's holiday in capturing with worm or troll of spoon bait these "lake trout or coarse fish" of Central Alberta."

Right you are, Brother Dimock, what is true of Nova Scotia, applies with even greater force to New Brunswick. When it comes to gamey fish the Atlantic salmon which frequent the Saint John River are in a class by themselves.

Hon. Charles Dunning, Premier of Saskatchewan will join the Federal cabinet as Minister of Railways in succession to Hon. George P. Graham, resigned. This announcement was made at Ottawa on Saturday by Premier King. Hon. Mr. Dunning will seek election in Regina, the sitting member, Mr. Darke, having made way for him. Nomination will take place on March 16th and polling a week later. The new Minister is a native of the Old Country and is only forty years of age. He succeeded Hon. Wm. Martin as Premier of Saskatchewan four years ago, and on appealing to the people last year his government was sustained by a large majority.

A motion to extend the civic franchise to ratepayers in arrears for taxes one year was defeated last week by the casting vote of the Mayor. It is just as well perhaps that the soft pedal was applied to this proposal. The plan might probably have worked out in the case of real estate owners but it would scarcely be in the interests of the city to give it a general application. There would be little to be gained in adding to the difficulties now being experienced in collecting the taxes.

Mr. Theobald M. Burns, former member of the New Brunswick legislature for Gloucester, died at his home in Bathurst on Sunday. He was a member of the Local House for nine years and though a Conservative gave his support to the Liberal government of the day. He was a very useful member of the House and many friends throughout the province will regret to learn of his death.
