PREMIER DUNNING WILL TAKE OVER THE RAILWAY PORTFOLIO; TO SEEK ELECTION IN REGINA

Ottawa, Feb. 21—Another "key" Bruce, has also been frequently mentioned, although if Mr. Malcolm entered the cabinet, it would probably be as minister without portfolio.

Whatever by-elections are scheduled they will come after the one in Regina on the 23rd of next month. This would mean early April at least before the ministers to follow Mr. Dunning into the cabinet would be able to take their seats on the treasury benches.

Weight Lent Ministry.

It was also made known that Francis Darke, Liberal member for Regina, with the approval of his local executive, has placed in the hands of the Speaker the resignation of his seat in the House of Commons to make way for Premier Dunning. The speaker, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, has in turn issued the warrant for a writ and the latter has been also issued. Nominations will take place in Regina on March 16 and the election on March 23.

To Continue in Cabinet.

Premier King stated, in connection with the resignation of Mr. Graham, that the latter will continue as a minister without portfolio, and that he will attend the meetings of the cabinet, the leader of the Government exercising his prerogative as Prime Minister of inviting any privy council he chooses into consultation on matters of state business. While Mr. Graham will terminate his active association with parliamentary life, he will therefore continue his connection with the Government in an advisory capacity.

Is Youngest Minister.

Premier Dunning will have the distinction of being the youngest member of the cabinet with portfolio, having not yet reached the age of 40 years. He was born in Leicestershire, England, on July 31, 1886. Hon. Lucien Cannon, Solicitor-General, is his junior by two years, but Mr. Cannon cannot properly be regarded as a minister with portfolio. It is interesting coincidence, too, that Premier Dunning as leader of the Saskatchewan Government, was Minister of Railways for that province.

First of Changes.

The appointment of Mr. Dunning marks the first of the several cabinet changes forecast since the general election in October.

Mr. Dunning is expected in the capital within a few days to be sworn into the Privy Council. Mr. Graham tonight declined to comment on his own resignation. "I have nothing to add to what has been said by the Prime Minister," he said.

Others From Commons.

Other by-elections will undoubtedly follow the one in Regina next month, but it is stated now unofficially that any new ministers will be selected from the Liberal ranks in the House of Commons. The most probable new member of the cabinet is W. D. Euler, Liberal member for North Waterloo. Mr. Euler has been constantly among those named in cabinet forecasts since the general election in October and he has been mentioned for the portfolios of either immigration or labor. James Malcolm, Liberal member for North

LONDON IS PLANNING A GAY SEASON

London, England, Feb. 17—There will be a burst of social functions and entertainments in royal and aristocratic circles with the termination next week of the period of court mourning for Dowager Queen Alexandra.

Numerous big dances already have been announced for society's debutante daughters. The Prince of Wales will make his first public appearance at such a social function at the Victoria league ball at Grosvenor house next Tuesday evening.

The prince yesterday paid a two-hour visit of inspection to the industries fair, minutely examining the exhibits and bombarding the attendants with questions.

Prince George, the youngest son of the sovereign, has just been promoted from sublieutenant to lieutenant and reappointed to H. M. S. Hawkins, the flagship of the China squadron, to which he was appointed last year.

U. S. SLANG MAKES BIG HIT IN LONDON

London, England, Feb. 22—London has accepted James Gleason's play, "Is Zat So?" as the best farce of the year, following the initial performance in which Gleason and Robert Armstrong received an ovation. From the point of view of the critics the play vindicates H. L. Mencken's theory that the spoken American language has evolved into a status of its own, requiring translation into the language of England. From the first act to the last the English section of the audience was forced to refer incessantly to a printed glossary of American slang words and phrases. Even then when they learned that "to moyder a skoyt" meant "to kill a girl" they found themselves three or four sentences behind the actors.

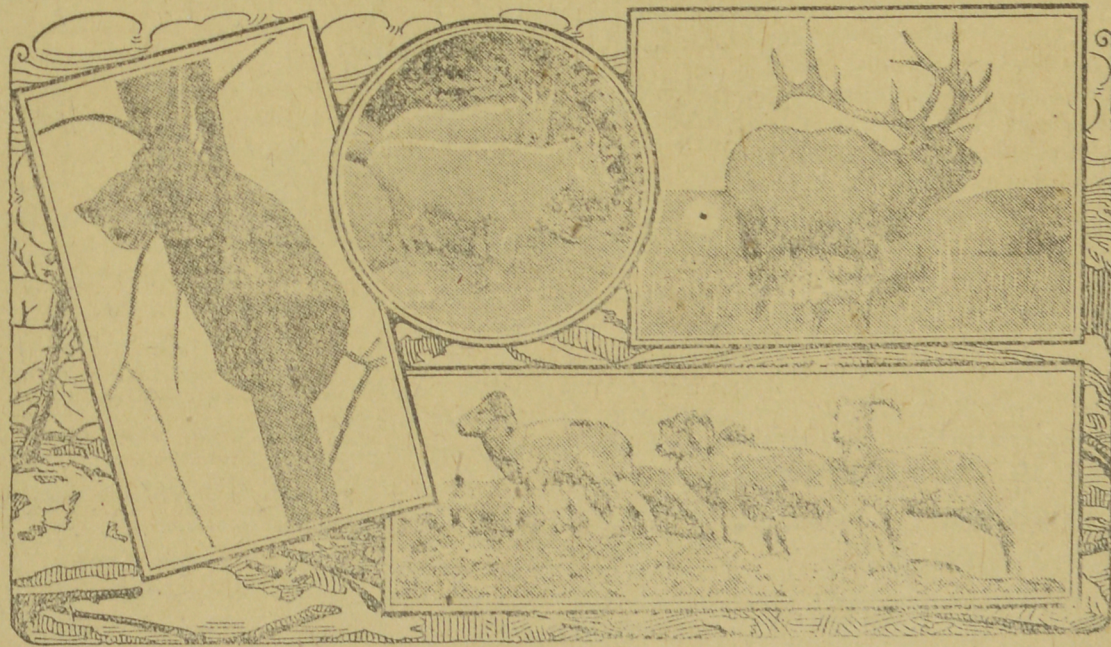

Jasper Park - Game Sanctuary



JASPER National Park, Alberta, in the heart of the Rocky Mountains enjoys not only the reputation of being the world's largest national playground but also of being one of the world's largest game sanctuaries. In every square inch of its huge area of more than 4,400 square miles Jasper Park gives to animals and birds all the protection that the rigor of the law and the ingenuity of man can provide.

The results of this wise policy of protection and conservation are apparent. Every year the number of animals within the Park is increasing and Col. Maynard Rogers, Superintendent, states in his most recent report that animals and birds are now to be found in the park that never before inhabited this type of country. As examples he cites the presence of large numbers of moose and prairie chicken.

The pictures printed above show only four of the many types of animals thriving in Jasper National Park. Up the tree, and none too pleased about it, is a brown whose black and brown sisters and brothers inhabit the park to the number of well over 2,000. The black fellows are great friends of the visitors to Jasper Park Lodge and are to be seen frequently about the hotel, on the golf course and on the trails. For a sugar lump or some other dainty they will agree to a photograph and they remain good humored as long as they are not pressed.

In the circle are two mountain goats. These animals inhabit the most inaccessible spots on the mountains and you can get near them only if you possess a pair of strong binoculars or a sturdy pair of legs and a clear head. There are 5,000 goats in the Park.

The upper right is seen a Wapiti or mountain goat. From a number not exceeding 1,000 these animals have increased to almost 1,000 and the sanctuary afforded them in Jasper Park is said to have saved them from extinction. A naturalist said that this photograph which was taken by the official photographer of the Canadian National Railways is the best of a wapiti he has ever seen.

In the bottom panel is a herd of mountain sheep. Like the goat these animals live in the high altitudes and are difficult of approach. More than 10,000 make their home in Jasper Park and because they have learned to have no fear of man in that territory, the camera hunter has a better chance of getting a "shot" at them there than in almost any other spot on the continent.
