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Fredericton High Is Qualified to Meet Bathurst High for Title

Trimmed Rothesay Collegiate 7 to 3 Saturday and Less Carelessness Would Have Produced a Shutout — Yellow and Black Had Game Right Through.

Fredericton High had no trouble at all in winning the Interscholastic title in the original N. B. Interscholastic League Saturday afternoon when Rothesay Collegiate was beaten 7 to 3 at the Arctic Rink. Capt. Thompson said after the game that the Yellow and Black should have made it a shutout. Rothesay was without Richards a strong player who injured one of his hips and is laid up. The Blues and White also complained of lack of practice due to snow covering the open-air rink on which the Rothesay team plays. Even taking those facts into consideration the only verdict could be that Fredericton High was much the better team.

The result made it four straight for Fredericton High one of the four being a game here defaulted by Saint John High.

Provincial Playoff.

The Provincial playoff is the next interscholastic feature. W. E. Sterling of Saint John suggested last week that Bathurst High as North Shore winner and Fredericton High meet in home-and-home games. Fredericton High however would prefer a "sudden death" game as usual not having the finances to travel its team over the province.

The Westmorland County league winner also will come into the series. It is uncertain yet which team that will be. Moncton High, Carleton Place and Mt. Allison Academy are also reported strong.

ONE-SIDED GAME.

Fredericton High Got Careless and Let Rothesay Score Late in Game.

MONTREAL AND OTTAWA MAINTAIN PLACE

Played Eighty Minutes to Draw at Ottawa — Canadiens and Pittsburgh Lost Their Games.

Ottawa, Feb. 21—Playing what can be classed as real championship hockey and one of the best games seen here this season, Montreal Maroons and Ottawa Senators battle 80 minutes to a scoreless tie in a scheduled N. H. L. fixture here last night. During the greater part of the time the crowd was standing up. This marked the fifth meeting of these two teams this season, and resulted in the second game of that number ending in a tie.

Boston Beat Canadiens.
Montreal, Feb. 21—Boston Bruins defeated Canadiens 3 to 1 at the Arena Saturday night and their victory together with Pittsburgh's downfall at Toronto put the clan of Art Ross into a secure third place position in the standing of the National Hockey League.

Systematic hockey against a more or less disorganized opposition gave the Bruins their victory. The Bruins played a four and five-man defensive game practically throughout and when an opportunity presented itself they would break away in neat and three combination rushes to pepper Rheame in the Canadian net. Two of the Boston goals were scored on shots from the blue line, Rheame being caught napping on long drives from Hitchman and Cooper. Cleghorn made it three to nothing for the Bruins half way through the final session and Canadiens' lone tally came as a result of fast combination rush with Joliat and Morenz working a double pass.

St. Pats Beat Pirates.

Toronto, Feb. 21—St. Patrick's squelched the hopes the Pittsburgh Pirates entertained of ousting the Boston Bruins from third place in the National Hockey League, for the time being at least, when the Irishmen, displaying unusually good form, defeated the Buccaneers by a 3 to 1 score here Saturday evening.

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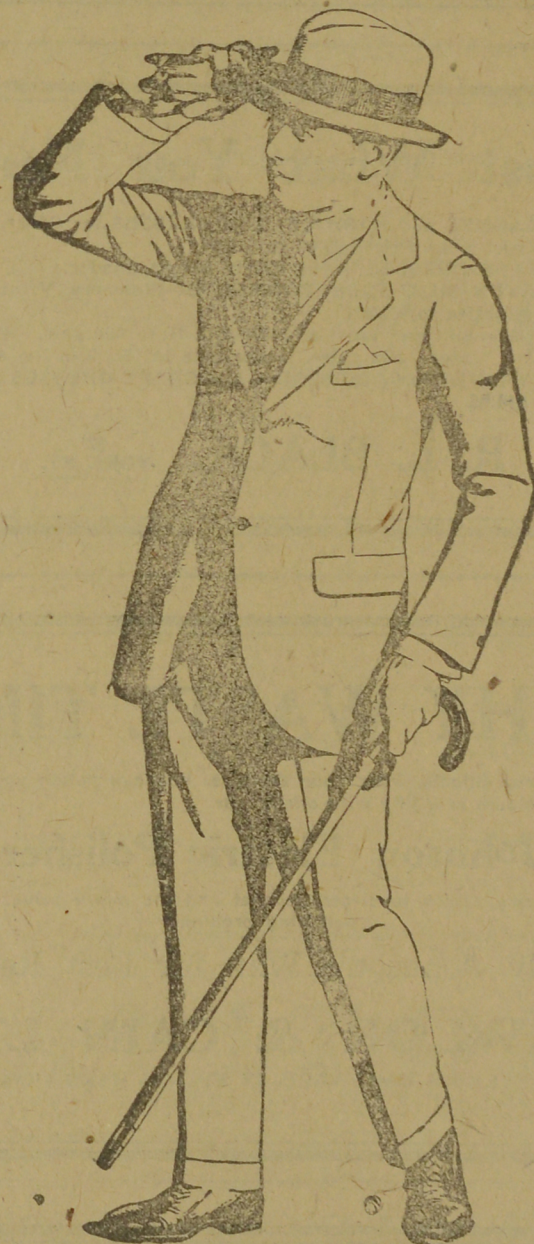
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
