INSURGENCY ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE OVER THE LIQUOR QUESTION

(Toronto Globe.)

Liberal party differences over the Brackin-Pinard Government control amendment were precipitated into open debate in the Legislature yesterday by Frank Wilson (Conservative, Windsor), who after expressing admiration for the action of the Liberal members, complained that last year he had been jockeyed out of opportunity for fair discussion on a similar proposal presented by himself. While Premier Ferguson thus was being administered a slap on the wrist by his "wet" followed, Liberal Leader W. E. N. Sinclair, K. C., was dealt a wallop by J. A. Pinard (Liberal, East Ottawa), the seconder of the Brackin motion. Mr. Pinard declared Mr. Sinclair was only a temporary leader, chosen by a small group "because there was nobody else in sight." He proposed to tell him some more, he said, when it was his turn to speak in the House.

Some Reconciliation.

Strange to relate, in this somewhat torrid atmosphere Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Brackin found opportunity publicly to bury the hatchet. Mr. Brackin's denial that he was in receipt of a retainer from any brewer or distiller was accepted in full by the Liberal Leader, who commented upon the West Kent member's outstanding position in the legal profession and un doubted ability to do justice to any retainer he might receive. Neither Mr. Pinard nor Mr. Brackin had been read out of the party, he said, as proclaimed in one newspaper. There was comedy to the almost unprecedented situation, too, when J. A. Currie (Conservative, South-east Toronto) reminded Mr. Sinclair of his declaration that before Mr. Currie could "lead" a "wet" party he must have 12 followers. Mr. Currie said that the Liberal Leader's action in reading Pinard and Brackin out of the party—later denied by Mr. Sinclair—left him without a legal group, and his salary as Leader must forthwith cease.

"Intellectual Party."

K. K. Homuth (Independent Labor, South Waterloo), as a denouncement, tendered an open invitation to all the sundry of the apparently dissatisfied followers of various leaders to join the "intellectuals," represented by himself and J. F. Callan (Labor, Rainy River).

"I am quite sure that if they come," he said, "they will find here a Moses ready and willing to lead them—"

Mr. Brackin—Into the bulrushes. Mr. Homuth—Out of the political wilderness.

Mr. Wilson opened the discussion by reading from The Globe the statement of Mr. Sinclair made to the Legislature yesterday, which included the declaration that neither a man who operated a business in another Province which would be illegal in Ontario, nor a man in receipt of a distiller's retainer, could speak the Liberal party's liquor policy. Mr. Wilson finally had to move the adjournment to complete his statement.

Wants Open Discussion.

Mr. Wilson held that Mr. Brackin was doing perfectly right, and he hoped it would bring on the open discussion desired. "We have been trying to get a show-down on this question ever since the election of 1923," said Mr. Wilson. "I have tried myself by introducing a resolution to the Provincial Conservative convention in Toronto, tried it at local conventions, and other members have tried it in various ways, and last session I introduced a resolution for that same purpose, and although I was assured by the Premier that it was to be called, it was called on the last day, without any notice to me. The adjournment of the debate was moved, on which there could be no discussion, and when everybody had gone off it was called early the following morning. Mr. Proulx—Will you vote for the amendment? Mr. Wilson—Absolutely.

Mr. Brackin rose to a question of personal privilege. He thought Mr. Currie had misconstrued the remarks of the member behind whom I still sit, as I don't think it was the intention of the Leader of the Liberal party to read myself and Mr. Pinard out of the Liberal party."

Mr. Sinclair—Hear, hear. Mr. Brackin—I think his intention was that we should be put upon probation, and, not being entirely excommunicated, we should be allowed to go on suspended sentence. Honorable members, I think, have misinterpreted his remarks as my honorable friend misinterpreted certain things in connection with Mr. Pinard and myself.

"Public Spanking."

"What I am pained at," he said, "is that instead of taking us to the woodshed and giving us a spanking, he undertook to do it in public."

Mr. Brackin then took up the reference of Mr. Sinclair to himself as being in possession of a retainer from some distillery.

"I want to say to this House that I have not now and never have had a retainer from any distillery, brewery or any company of that kind. I did appear a few weeks ago before the Customs Inquiry Committee on behalf of the Dominion Distillers and the estate of W. George of Montreal. I appeared in ordinary course because I was asked to go, because it was apparent that the committee intended to deal with matters which had not been referred to by the terms of the resolution, and my advice was desired by that company upon those points.

"I finished the work that I had to do and I furnished my bill, and I don't know whether it is paid or not. I have no retainer from any distillery company. I have not introduced this from any bad motives.

"It is true I attended the convention and voted for the plank in 1919, but that is six years ago. We have had six years of this law, and, instead of proving a benefit and a blessing to Ontario, in many parts of the Province it has proved to be the contrary. That was why Mr. Pinard and myself introduced the resolution."

Mr. Pinard then secured the floor in a race with Mr. Sinclair, and proceeded to discuss the reported reading of himself out of the Liberal party.

Says Leader is Temporary.

"As I belong to the old-time Liberal party, under the Mowat style," he said, "and never liked very much the Rowell style, I do not think the temporary Leader of the official Liberal party, who was defeated in convention when he ran for the leadership, can read me out of the Liberal party, and he only started as House Leader, selected by a group of fourteen. We had nobody else to choose, and we picked on him. (Conservative laughter.)

Statement Accepted.

Mr. Sinclair said: "I accept with pleasure the statement of the honorable member for West Kent (Mr. Brackin), and he has interpreted rightly, the reason why I spoke as I did in regard to certain retainers. I accept his statement, and am glad he has presented it to the House in the kindly, gentlemanly way which he has. I am sorry that he is not in possession of these big retainers, as most of us all hoped he was because of the high standing in the profession he honors, and he would do honor to any retainer that was given him. I have not read either of them out of the party, and do not intend to."

MANY WILL GO TO CHICAGO FOR EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS

Largest Special Passenger Traffic Movement in History of Canadian Railroads is Looked For.

According to advices received by Passenger Traffic Officials of the Canadian National Railways, one of the largest special passenger traffic movements in the history of Canadian Railroadings will take place in June next in connection with the Eucharistic Congress at Chicago.

Preparations are being made in Chicago for the reception of more than a million pilgrims during the Congress which will be held from June 20th to June 24th, and the problem of transport for this multitude is already engaging the close attention of both American and Canadian Railroad Officials.

The Canadian Delegation will, of necessity, be a very large one, and will be thoroughly representative of the whole Dominion. Already the Canadian National Railways have contracted with various Organizations for ten special trains from the Maritime Province as far west as Alberta. Most of these specials will be operated from Quebec and Ontario, but already enough travel is assured from the Maritimes for a special train to leave Moncton at or about 2.30 P. M., on Friday, June 18th. This train will reach Chicago early Sunday morning. The train equipment will be of the very best, and standard C. N. R. diners will serve meals enroute. The return trip will be made by special, leaving Chicago Thursday, June 24th, allowing side trips to Niagara Falls and Ste. Anne de Beaupre, reaching Moncton on Monday, June 28th. Delegates from Saint John and all Maritime Provinces points, outside of Moncton, will make their connection with the special train by the regular C. N. R. train services.

This tour includes five days in Chicago, and a half day side trip to Niagara Falls. There will be one whole day at Montreal, and one at Quebec or Ste. Anne de Beaupre. It will be a notable tour under the very best auspices, and in the Railway Service there will be nothing lacking.
