

TWO ATTORNEYS ADMITTED HERE THIS MORNING

Appeal Court Observes Two Minutes of Silence—Saint John Appeals are Heard Today.

Two attorneys were admitted before the Supreme Court this morning on the motion of Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., president of the Barristers' Society. They are Dyson W. Wallace of Fredericton and F. C. Lowell Compton of Summerside, P. E. I., who was articulated in Saint John.

Court Observation.

When eleven o'clock struck on the intimation of Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen all present stood and observed the two minutes of silence in recognition of the sacrifice made by those who had lost her lives in the Great War.

Hung on East Wall.

The portrait of Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen presented to the Supreme Court by the Barristers' Society on Tuesday was hung on the walls of the chamber on Wednesday. The portrait has been placed in the middle of the east wall. The only other portrait on that wall is that of Chief Justice Ward Chipman.

No Foundation for Report.

Chief Jones of the Fredericton police states that there is no foundation for the report that his son Ernest Jones had been shot in Detroit. On Wednesday he received a letter from him dated November 6th at Windsor, Ont., in which no word was given of any injury to him. As the story was current here before Saturday there evidently is no foundation for the report.

All After McCurdy Cup.

University of Mount Allison have challenged the Wanderers for the McCurdy Cup, to play at Halifax or Sackville on November 20, or any other suitable date. Caledonia, champions of Cape Breton, have also challenged for the cup, and it is understood that if Nova Scotia Technical College defeats University of New Brunswick for the intercollegiate championship, they also will challenge. ARMISTICE ANNIVERSARY OBSERVED TODAY, SERVICE WAS HELD AT THE CENOTAPH

Many Beautiful Floral Pieces Placed at Foot of Shaft—Address by Rev. J. Garrow Berry, Benediction by Very Rev. Dean Neales—Opening Address by Mayor Clark—Impressive Ceremony Witnessed by Many.

Fredericton observed the signing of the armistice which ended the Great War, by a short ceremony at the cenotaph this morning under the auspices of the I. O. D. E. There was a large gathering of the general public and public bodies taking part as well as students of Provincial Normal and Fredericton High School. The drums and bugles of the latter school were present.

Hymns were sung by a selected choir of twelve voices. The opening address was by His Worship Mayor Clark. Rev. J. Garrow Berry of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church read scripture and offered prayer and also delivered an address. The benediction closing the service was by Very Rev. S. Neales, Dean of Fredericton. At eleven o'clock the two minutes of silence was observed in accordance with the Royal request. The one hundred and five names on the cenotaph were read by Sergt. Major A. Fowler and "Last Post" and "Reveille" were sounded by Bugler Seymour Tyler. The placing of wreaths and other floral pieces was an impressive part of the ceremonial. The bearers of the floral tributes approached the cenotaph through the ranks of six standard-bearers of the I. O. D. E. carrying the national colors. Included among the large number of floral tributes were those from the Province of New Brunswick placed by Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, and from the City of Fredericton placed by the Mayor.

Immediately after the ceremony the chimes of Christchurch Cathedral played God Save the King, O Canada and The Maple Leaf Forever.


We recall how faces blanched when news came, in the early periods of that awful four years, of successes on sea and land of the great enemy; but, with what determination our men rallied! how recruiting was

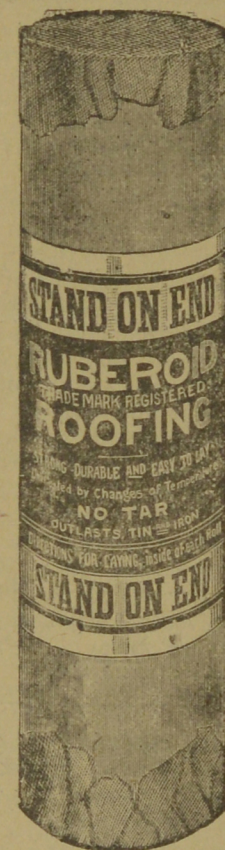
