TEAMS TIED IN WESTMORLAND SCHOOL LEAGUE

Mt. Allison Academy and Moncton High to Meet Again at Sackville—Winner for the Playoff.

The opponent of Fredericton High for the Provincial title if the Yellow and Black comes through as expected with a win over Saint John High here will be either Moncton High or Mt. Allison Academy. The latter team was in the finals last year losing 3 to 0 at Sackville to Fredericton High.

These two teams so far are tied in the Westmorland County league. As they next will meet at Sackville the odds should favor the Academy.

An account of the game Saturday is as follows:—

Moncton, Oct. 18—Moncton High and Mount Allison Academy football teams are still tie for the leadership of this section of the New Brunswick High School football league as the result of their scoreless game on the M. A. A. field here on Saturday. Each team holds a decisive decision over the Dorchester outfit and it was expected that Saturday's game would decide the leadership.

The game was fast and a good example of football. Territory play was about even with Moncton having the edge in the first period and Mount A. in the second. The visitors touched for safety several times in the first session but reversed things in the second, forcing Moncton to take the defensive.

Freeze of the Mount A. team was injured during the game when he received a kick on the head. Following the game the visitors were entertained at a banquet held at the High School.

MT. ALLISON BACK DIVISION REPORTED FAST

Three-quarters Scored Five Tries Against Moncton and Halves One—Seven of '25 Team.

The proposition of University of N. B. that the Western Section rugby dates be October 21st at Fredericton and October 28th at Sackville having been declined by Mt. Allison because of the 21st being Founders' Day at Mount A., other dates have been suggested. Mt. Allison suggested a week's shift in dates but U. N. B. has come back with the proposal that in order to bring the final date ahead a little one game be at Sackville on the 26th and the other here November 2nd.

Mt. Allison Backs Fast.

Any impression that Coach McCarthy has not worked up a fast team for the Garnet and Gold can be abandoned. They defeated Moncton handily in the opening match of the New Brunswick League at Sackville six tries to one. No try was converted. Drummond the Scottish veteran three-quarter scored Moncton's only try. Stuart, Rice and Miller of the Mount A. three-quarter line scored in the first half and in the second half Rice, Lister of the halves and Miller. The Garnet and Gold played a combination passing game among the backs and were very effective. This is the same style of game which U. N. B. plays and there should be keen contests when the teams meet.

Seven of Last Year's Team.

Of the team which defeated Moncton seven were here last year against U. N. B. They are Rice and Stuart of the three-quarter backs, Lister and Wilson of the halves and Cliff, Morris and Hierlthy of the forwards.

TWO PROVINCIAL GIRLS' LEAGUES FOR BASKETBALL

Boys' Rules to Hold in One—Maritime Play-off—Meeting in Saint John Tonight.

Saint John, Oct. 20—The formation of one or possibly two provincial girls' basketball associations in New Brunswick is under contemplation with the idea of having the provincial championship team play off for the Maritime honors. As the first step towards the formation of the provincial association for inter-collegiate, or girls' rules basketball, a meeting is to be held in the Y. W. C. A. recreation centre in Saint John tonight, to discuss the prospects and to take steps towards the organization of a city league.

Every one interested in girls' rules basketball has been invited to attend tonight's meeting. The meeting has been arranged by Miss Hazel McCready, physical instructress of the Saint John Y. W. C. A. and Miss Edna Hunt, the Y. W. C. A. representative to the last provincial organization meeting held in Moncton. Miss Marion Belding, president of the Maritime Province branch of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation, will be present and it is expected that all of the city organizations, which have girls playing basketball under inter-collegiate rules will have a representative at tonight's meeting.

"Boys' Rules."

No definite announcement has been made with regard to the plans of the second group of girls' basketball players, who prefer boys' rules. It is understood that this group also is hoping to have a provincial association formed and to arrange for a Maritime play-off.

Last year in Saint John boys' and girls' rules were both played in the Girl's City Basketball League, each group having a separate section and championships being awarded for both.

BLUENOSE BETTER CRAFT DID NOT FINISH

Great Contest in Seamanship—Five-hour Time Limit Set by Walters is Stumbling Block.

Halifax, Oct. 19—Bluenose, Captain Angus Walters, again failed in today's race to clinch the championship of the Canadian fishing fleets by her inability to finish the race within the time limit of five hours, stipulated by Walters himself as a condition of the contest.

The champion defeated the challenge Haligonian, Captain Moyle Crouse, by 27 minutes, 12 seconds, on the 37 mile course, romping away from her as in the previous races in windward work. But with the northwest wind averaging between 15 and 20 knots she was unable to finish before the time limit expiring at 3 o'clock.

As a contest in seamanship today's race was easily the most thrilling of the three held to date. drouse got the better of the start, after much jockeying, and tore across the line five seconds ahead and to weather of his rival. A luffing match that took the schooners far to weather of their course and was only stopped by the proximity of the cliffs lining the eastern shore of Halifax harbor followed.

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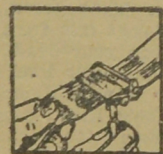
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
