
London newsboys crying New York mother didn't lengthen her dresses? papers-New York newsboys crying London papers-and this on the very photoradiogram.

There have been European editions of certain American newspapers-notably the Paris edition of the New York Herald. These papers were not, of course, identical reproductions of the New York edition, but were made up from cabled dispatches.

Whether the reprinting of a British newspaper, wholly of in part, in an American city, or vice versa, would be commercially feasible, may be doubted; certainly not until the reproductions by radio can be made clearer than any yet shown.

There is, nevertheless, a thrill in getting pictured news by wireless. so many hours sooner than it can be had in any other way. The crudities of the art are sure to be smoothed away as time goes on.

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
