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## THIS DWINDLING WORLD.

London newsboys crying New York papers—New York newsboys crying London papers—and this on the very day they are issued—is one of the wonders which may grow out of the photoradiogram.

Already there is talk in London of this possibility. It all grew out of the fact that metropolitan newspapers in the United States printed radioed replicas of the front pages of the British Gazette, official organ of the British government during the strike, thus permitting more readers in New York city alone to see the Gazette than saw it in London.

There have been European editions of certain American newspapers—notably the Paris edition of the New York Herald. These papers were not, of course, identical reproductions of the New York edition, but were made up from cabled dispatches.

Whether the reprinting of a British newspaper, wholly of in part, in an American city, or vice versa, would be commercially feasible, may be doubted; certainly not until the reproductions by radio can be made clearer than any yet shown.

There is, nevertheless, a thrill in getting pictured news by wireless, so many hours sooner than it can be had in any other way. The crudities of the art are sure to be smoothed away as time goes on.

## PLAYING THE GAME.

Four race horses in the United States have been poisoned by gamblers anxious to make a "killing" by seeing to it that the horse on which they were to bet would have no serious competition. It is reported that two of the gamblers confessed complicity in the poisoning while thousands of angry race followers milled around the police station.

## CONSERVATIVE CHIEF SPOKE IN MONTREAL

Hon. Mr. Meighen Was Greeted by an Audience of 8,000 People.

Montreal, June 4—About 8,000 persons thronged the Forum here tonight in the demonstration arranged by the various Conservative organizations throughout the province for Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons.

Elaborate preparations had been made to receive Mr. Meighen when he arrived this evening and a large gathering of Quebec notables was present at the station.

For the occasion some of the outstanding parliamentarians of the Conservative party had accompanied their leader to the Quebec metropolis among them being Sir George Perley, C. H. Cahan, K. C., Leslie Bell, M. P., A. J. Doucet, M. P., R. S. White, M. P., Hon. R. J. Manion, M. P., Dr. Raymond Morand, M. P.

### The Late Campaign.

Rt. Hon. Mr. Meighen dwelt upon the circumstances of his not having spoken in Quebec during the last federal election campaign and declared that those who were in charge of the campaign in this province had been prompted by lofty motives in that they had refrained from inviting him, feeling that Mr. Meighen's presence might be made the means of arousing past prejudices. That purpose had not succeeded, however for his absence, he said had served only to intensify those prejudices.

Mr. Meighen paid tribute to Hon. E. L. Patenaude and felt that Mr. Patenaude had been actuated by the leftest motives. From the beginning to the end of his campaign Mr. Patenaude had preached the policy of the Conservative party which under Cartier and MacDonald had become the pillar on which confederation rests.

### Imperial Bonds.

He made short reference to the matter of the imperial connection and declared that he continued to believe as he had always done that Canada's destiny was within the empire; that Canada should have no other guide than her higher interests and that the duty of this country was to decide what these interests demanded. He spoke of the unanimity in 1914 of both parties and quoted from Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech at the outbreak of the war where that statesman gave complete support to the government of the day.

Mr. Meighen deplored the lack of French-Canadian Conservative members in the House of Commons and hoped that in the next election this situation would not recur.

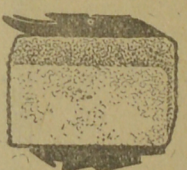
