LLOYD GEORGE STILL A POWER.

By securing from the conference of Liberal associations a general approval of his land scheme, Mr. Lloyd George has undoubtedly strengthened his hold upon what remains of the party. The recent defection of Sir Alfred Mond removed one influential opponent of the trend to Socialism; and there are threats of a further revolt, with the formation of an independent party in the House of Commons, co-operating on occasion with the Conservatives. Lord Oxford rather plaintively declared at the session last week that no Liberal who objected to the scheme need be barred from the party. But Liberals of this class appear to be leaving it without compulsion. Lord Oxford may regret this, but Mr. Lloyd George will at least profess satisfaction. His abusive attack on Sir Alfred Mond excited wonder that he stood his former colleague as long as he did.

The resolution affirming the need of a reform of the land system was adopted unanimously. But it seems unlikely that all the Socialistic features advocated by Mr. Lloyd George will receive full support. The nationalization of agricultural land is a direct break with all English tradition. A public body would take the place of the individual landlord; tenants would be under the control of committees. This idea is more or less borrowed from Denmark. It might or might not work effectively in England. The extent of the social as well as the economic changes that would follow its adoption is incalculable. Mr. Lloyd George undoubtedly hopes to get back at the country squires, who have never liked or trusted him. He regards them as a blight, and looks to see a great increase of efficiency in the tilling of the soil if they are no longer large landowners.

It is probably true that English agriculture has lacked something in the way of scientific direction which control by the State might supply. On the other hand, the squire felt certain class obligations which a body of officials would not feel and maintained a certain community of interest with his tenants. It may be that he never brought up to date, in order to get out of the land all it is possible to get. But so sweeping a change as the Lloyd George plan is naturally regarded by conservative Englishmen with dismay.

6. That only salmon licenses be issued non-resident fishermen for streams frequented by salmon and trout at the same time.

7. That grouse or partridge be protected for at least two years.

8. That bear be considered a game animal and be protected from December 1st to September 14th, but that bear may be killed at any time when doing damage to stock.

9. That a close check be kept on fur-buyers and the law enforced by cancellation of licenses.

10. That an effort be made to enforce the law requiring that holders of game licenses return a report of the bag taken during the season, and that a guide conducting a non-resident be held responsible for compliance.
