Former U. N. B. and
Fredericton Player —
Recently with Peter-
borough — Benefit
Match for Him.

Hockey fans in Fredericton and throughout New Brunswick greatly regret to learn that Bert Burgess in recent seasons with the Peterborough, Ont., senior team in the O. H. A. and some years ago with the University of New Brunswick and Fredericton teams, is in ill-health and is undergoing treatment in a sanitarium. "Tiny" Burgess as he was known in New Brunswick hockey or "Shorty" Burgess as he has been known in Ontario after serving an apprenticeship here made good in Ontario hockey. A few nights ago a benefit hockey match was played for him in Peterborough and a substantial sum realized. Other O. H. A. Clubs contributed players to make up an all star aggregation to meet Peterborough in the benefit game.

Before coming to Fredericton Burgess resided in Campbellton. After serving overseas he completed his course at University of N. B. and went to Peterborough with the General Electric Company.

The Toronto Globe has the following despatch on the benefit for Burgess:—

Peterboro, Feb. 17—A packed rink greeted the Peterboro' seniors and an all-star team from Toronto in the exhibition testimonial game played for Bert "Shorty" Burgess, Peterboro' player, who is now confined to an eastern sanitarium. A substantial sum was realized and the fans enjoyed a good game which ended 5 to 4 the all-stars winning.

The call for players for this purpose was well received in Toronto, the Parkdale Club sending down four players. Parkdale paid their expenses. Other teams were also represented.

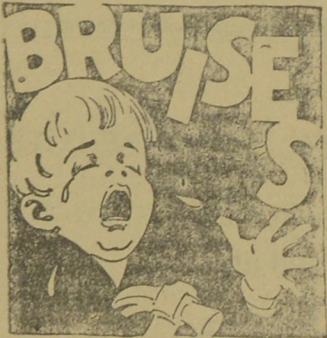
Bill Jackson of Peterboro' was the highest bidder for the office of referee. The promoters of the enterprise were gratified with the response by the players and the fans.

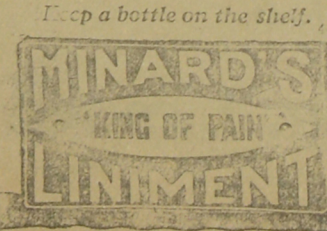

Fredericton Minus University Players Beat Marysville

Score Was 5 to 1—Hockey Was of Individual Type — Edgar Wade and Clark Did All the Scoring for Fredericton.

The York County Series opened Tuesday night at the Arctic Rink with Fredericton hockey team minus the players who are with University of N. B. defeating Marysville 5 to 1. Hickson, Steen, Keene and Keenan were away with the college team. Taylor in the net is from the Devon league "Nuck" Irvine was used as relief forward, Archie Sterling as relief defence man and another of the numerous Wade family as a relief forward. Marysville also let some of the youngsters get into the game and the result was to show that there is quite a bit of hockey material still around this section.

"Tart" Titus was particularly easy in penalties and the players were quick to take advantage. The result was that there were a number of clashes which could have been omitted and one clinch late in the game which was entirely unnecessary. The sooner that stuff is cut out the better for players, spectators and the game.

Although outplayed right through Marysville was game to the last and showed some good play of the individual variety. Fredericton also depended largely upon that the change in players making it necessary to a great extent.

Edgar Wade and Clark were strong with the individual rushes which resulted in all the Fredericton goals. Allen and Jimmie Sterling on the forward line played the same kind of game. Charlie Wade of Marysville and Harrison also rushed from the defence. The one Marysville goal was scored by combination. Forward in general Marysville was outplayed.

The Scoring.

Clark scored late in the first period. There was a kick about it as the goal was not signalled. A hole in the net showed that the score had been made. Clark sending in one of his high hard shots.

Clark scored almost from the face-off in the second period on a sole effort. He got his third goal by poke-checking the rubber from a Marysville forward and going in for his shot. Edgar Wade just to show that he knew all about that long shot stuff tallied the fourth in the same way. Marysville then pulled a surprise getting the rubber right after the face-off. Neill went through with it and passed to Fullerton who snapped it in.

The last goal was by Edgar Wade on an end-to-end rush and fairly long shot. Clark moved up to wing forward for part of the game.

AMHERST WON CENTRAL LEAGUE

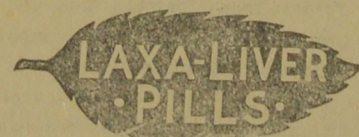

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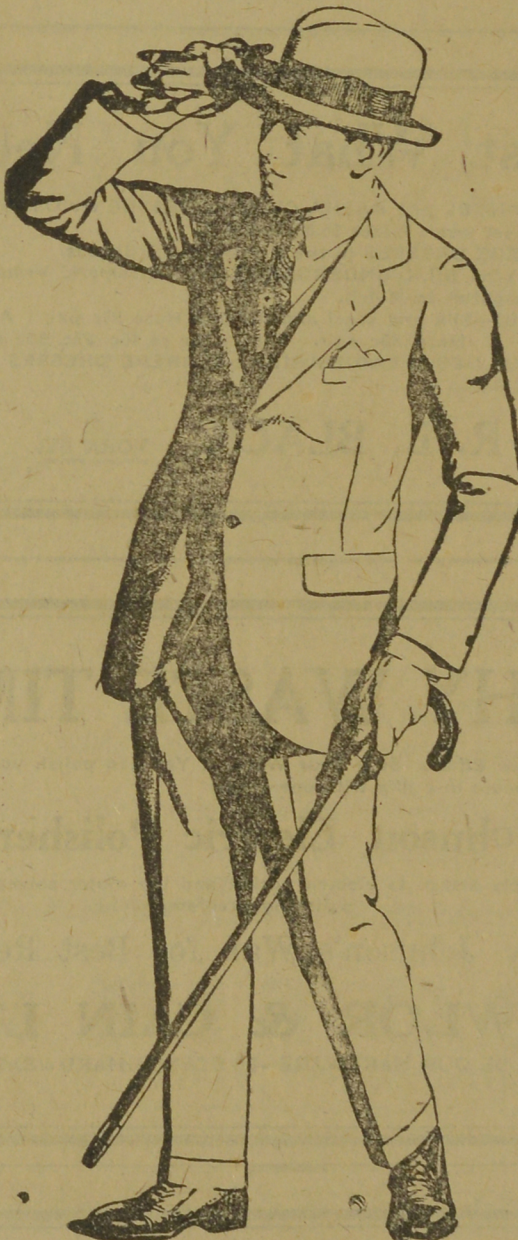
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
