VELVET DOMINATES STYLES IN PARIS.

MY NEIGHBOR SAYS.

When polishing furniture, if it is rubbed the same way as the grain it will polish much brighter and quicker.

It is essential to health that one should eat leafy green vegetables, such as lettuce, cabbage, celery or spinach, every day.

When making a fruit tart, mix a little cornstarch with the sugar before adding it. This will make the juice thick and prevent it boiling over.

In a custard recipe calling for several eggs, one or more may be left out if one half tablespoon of cornstarch is added for each egg omitted.

In ironing silks, woolens and colored materials, use medium hot irons. Iron all these materials on the wrong side, except aprons and children's dresses. If they have a smooth surface. Silks and woolens may be ironed on the right side if covered with dampened, cheese-cloth.

When blankets are being washed remember that the rinsing water must be soapy in order to make the blankets light and fluffy. Another point to be remembered is that all the waters in which the blankets are washed should be of the same temperature.

When making pie of fresh fruit, green apple or peach, where the tenderness of the filling depends upon the length of the baking. If you take an inch wide and long enough to encircle the pie, wet it in cold water and bind it around the edge of the pie and tin, it will prevent the pie crust from becoming too brown around the edge before the fruit is cooked.

Before you begin to make any cake take care that all your ingredients be all ready at your hand. Beat up your eggs well and then do not leave them to go about anything else.

INEXPENSIVE NUT BREAD.

1 1-2 c. graham or whole wheat flour
3-4 c. pastry flour
3 tbsp. molasses
1-2 c. chopped nutmeats
4 1-2 tsp. baking powder
1-2 tsp. salt
1-2 tsp. soda
1 1-2 c. milk.

Sift together all the dry ingredients, add the molasses and milk, mix thoroughly and bake one hour in a moderate oven. This makes one good sized loaf.

Strange this street's insignia—

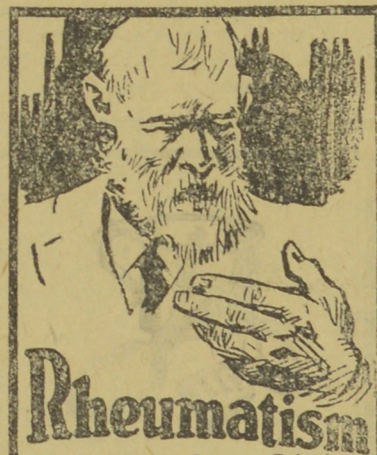

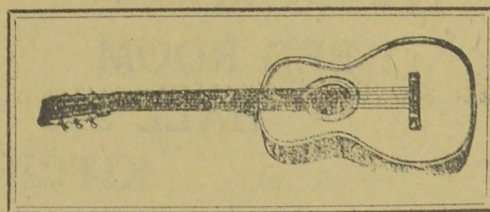
