THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE WAS DISSOLVED YESTERDAY; LIQUOR LAW TO BE AMENDED

Toronto, Oct. 18—Premier G. Howard Ferguson will make amendment of the Ontario temperance act an important plank in his campaign platform. This was indicated tonight when in a manifesto the Premier outlined his attitude towards the liquor question.

The government proposes to amend the Ontario temperance act and substitute for the doctor an independent commission who will have the authority to issue to all citizens over 21 years of age, who desire to purchase spirituous, or malt liquors for their own use, an annual permit upon which shall be entered each purchase and which may be suspended or cancelled at any time for abuse or misconduct.

House Dissolved.

Toronto, Oct. 18—Dissolution of the Ontario legislature was signed this afternoon and Premier G. Howard Ferguson announced a general election to be held on December 1. Nominations will be held on November 20.

Following a cabinet meeting held this evening announcement was made from the Parliament Buildings that the resignation of Hon. W. F. Nickle had been accepted and that Col. W. H. Price will succeed him in the post of Attorney General.

Monteith Gets Post.

It was also announced that Hon. J. D. Monteith, member for North Perth, would be sworn in as provincial treasurer, succeeding Col. Price in that position. W. F. Finlayson, Simcoe East has already been sworn in as Minister of Lands and Forests, and Hon. David Jamieson, South Grey, has been sworn in as minister without portfolio.

The administration of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson came into power following the provincial general election on June 25, 1923, when the United Farmer-Labor coalition under Premier E. C. Drury was swept from office after a 4-year trial. Mr. Ferguson, leading the Conservative party, entered the 1923 campaign with an ostensible strength of 25 out of 111 seats, and emerged with a party following of 74. 10 Seats Vacant.

At present there are 10 vacant seats in the legislature, seven of which were vacant during the last session. They are: North Norfolk, Centre Grey, East Kent, Manitoulin and Middlesex, all formerly U. F. O.; Simcoe South and London, formerly Conservative; Cochrane and Kent West, formerly Liberal, and Kenora, formerly Labor. The death of Sir Adam Beck and the resignation of Hon. Manning Doherty left London and East Kent vacant, while Norfolk, Centre Grey, South Simcoe, Kenora and Cochrane were vacated when their holders became candidates in the 1925 Dominion elections. Manitoulin and Middlesex East were vacated in the same way in the 1926 Federal campaign. Kent West was vacated by the recent death of R. L. Bracklin.

Sinclair Leads Liberals.

F. Wellington Hay led the Liberals in the 1923 campaign, when the election resulted in a reduction of the party's strength from 28 to 12. W. E. N. Sinclair is the present Liberal leader in the province. W. E. Raney, attorney-general in the U. F. O. government of 1922-23 was the active head of the United Farmers of Ontario forces in the house during the last session.

Since the last provincial election the legislature has passed a representation act, which, with accompanying amendments, considerably changes the aspect of Ontario's constituencies and effects a net increase of one member so that the next house will consist of 112 members. Ten rural ridings were removed and nine urban and two rural ridings (South Cochrane and South York) substituted, while boundaries were changed in varying extent almost throughout the province.

THREE FLEETS TAKE OVER \$1,000 WHALES

Tacoma, Oct. 18—More than 1,000 whales have been captured so far this year by three fleets operating in the North Pacific and Bering Sea fields, a much higher total than in 1925, according to figures issued here by auditors for the concerns.

At the Rose Harbor station 260 of the huge mammals were killed and towed to port by six whaling vessels. Bad weather and of many kinds added to the great hardships endured by the whaling crews. The Yakutat rendering station claims a toll of nearly 400 whales taken mostly from the vicinity of the Aleutian Islands. Some of the largest whales seen in years were harpooned during the late summer. The abundance of whales in the northern waters was due, it is said, to the massive runs of herring, salmon and other fish, the mammals following the schools in search of food.

In Bering Sea operating floating plants to car for the bladder and by-products of whales another large concern succeeded in taking over 300 whales. At one time there were forty whales each tagged with a tail pole and flag anchored about the rendering ship awaiting turn to be stripped of the fat.

Each whale produced from 40 to 80 barrels of oil selling at this time on an average of 55 cents per gallon, a lot of whalemeat; about a ton and a half of dried meat for chicken food and a ton of bone for fertilizer, about \$1,200 worth all told.

The money does not go to the crew because they are hired by the oil companies. But the man receive a bonus for each leviathan. The gunner, the prince of the game, gets \$10 00 a month and \$12.50 for every whale. During this season he averaged as high as \$500 a month. The captain of each ship takes the same. The chief mate a little less; the chief engineer \$10 for each whale; his assistant \$5 and the sailors and firemen \$2.50 each. The crew that boasts a crack grunner gets the big end of the bonus, thus they treat him as a prince.

The whale oil is sold to soap manufacturers and petroleum products concerns as a base for lubricant oils.

INSPECTION AND GRADING OF POTATOES

(Experimental Farms Note.)

The consistent and increasing demand during the last few years for superior, disease free seed potatoes made it necessary that a system of inspection and certification be adopted. Such a system was instituted by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Experimental Farms Branch, under the direction of the Dominion Botanist. The Potato Inspection Service, now in operation for some ten years, has been of immense benefit to the large number of growers in every province of the Dominion.

Two field inspections are performed, and a concise standard is set for each, the first allowing approximately double that of the second. The disease allowance for the second inspection is—Black leg 2 per cent; Leaf roll 1 per cent; Mosaic 1 per cent; Wilts 2 per cent; Foreign ½ per cent; Misses unless due to Black leg or mechanical causes 2 per cent. Providing not more than a total of 4 per cent be allowed.

This standard is very high, but will eventually serve its purpose by eliminating all stock which is not fit for planting. It will doubtless have the effect of creating a greater demand on account of the high yields which freedom from disease assures.

There is, however, another phase of high quality and that is the individual grower's responsibility in the matter of grading. Growers and dealers are requested to co-operate as much as possible with the inspection service. This will assure that only the highest quality stock will be shipped and be the means also of maintaining a steady market and a constant demand.

The standard for tuber inspection is equally high. Allowances are made for wet rot 1 per cent; Late blight and Dry rot 1 per cent; Common scab and Rhizoctonia (Black scurf) severe 5 per cent; Powdery Scab 1 per cent; Necrosis, Wilts and Internal discoloration 5 per cent. Providing that in no case shall a total of more than 8 per cent be allowed. Furthermore not more than 2 per cent of the tubers shall be "off type" or be damaged by cuts, bruises, growth cracks, insect injury, second growth, etc. No frost in-

PREMIER KING INTERVIEWED BY REPORTERS

Will Not Discuss the Governor-General or His Actions at Imperial Conference.

London, Oct. 18—In the course of an interview with more than a score of reporters here today, Premier Mackenzie King scoffed at suggestions of Canada's annexation by the United States; declared that his policy in Imperial matters was one of "evolution" and stated that Canada would not raise at the Imperial conference the question of the Governor-General of his actions.

For almost three-quarters of an hour Premier King submitted to cross-questioning. He generally declined to discuss subjects which were on the agenda of the conference but he was emphatic that Canada did not intend to raise the question of the Governor-General.

Denies Question Exists.

"We haven't any question respecting the Governor-General," Premier King declared. "Any matters we had were democratic matters. We settled them ourselves. The Canadian people dealt with their own questions in their own way."

Questioned on Imperial relations Premier King amplified his views, as wirelessly from the Megantic by the Canadian Press correspondent. "Relations between Canada and Britain and all parts of the Empire were never better," he said. "That is one reason why some of us feel that it is not too wise to do much in the way of new forms of organization."

Evolution Doing Well.

"We would rather let evolution play a part where it is doing so well at the present time. The British constitution has been a matter of growth. It has been a matter of evolution. It has not been a mechanical structure worked out by any set of men. It has come to be what it is just by that capacity for growth. I think we will all be helping along Imperial relations if we act the same way."

"I have not the slightest doubt that what is needed in the way of a constitution for the Empire will evolve with the growth of the Empire itself."

"Then you are presenting nothing revolutionary?" an interviewer put his question.

"Nothing," Premier King agreed. "Our policy is one of evolution."

Scoffs at Annexation.

Premier King scoffed at any ideas of annexation of Canada. "I don't know a single man in Canada who is even thinking it," the premier exclaimed.

He declared that Canada was not worrying about effects of American penetration.

"We like British capital, but if we can't get it, we are prepared to take capital from elsewhere," Premier King declared.

The premier made light of any possible political effects as the result of such penetration.

"You cannot change the character of the Briton by giving him a little more money to invest in his industries," he added.

Butter Restriction.

Australian newspapermen questioned him about the imposition of the "dumping duty" on Australian butter imported to Canada. Premier King replied there had been correspondence between the two governments on the matter.

"If the situation is unsatisfactory we want to adjust it," he said.

He felt that both Canada and Australia were anxious to have the treaty work out satisfactory.

In the case of Rhizoctonia (Black scurf) our experiments have shown that early digging will reduce the amount of infection of this disease very materially.
