

DAVID CREMIN
DROPPED DEAD
MONDAY NIGHT

Death Occurred in Front
of Windsor Hotel—
Deceased Resident of
City for Some Years.

David Cremin, chauffeur at the Windsor Hotel, passed away very suddenly shortly after six o'clock last evening in front of the hotel where he was employed. He had driven the hotel auto to the C. P. R. station and had returned with a number of passengers who had arrived by the six o'clock train. He had taken their baggage into the house and on returning to the car dropped to the sidewalk just as he was about to board it. He was carried into the hotel, and Dr. Vanwart who was hastily summoned, pronounced him beyond medical aid. He passed away a few moments later without having uttered a word. Heart failure was the cause of his demise. The body was later in the evening removed to the home of his brother Mr. Charles Cremin, Saunders street.

Hunter and Guide.
Mr. Cremin for many years followed the occupation of a big game hunter and guide on the Nepisiguit headwaters, and his skill in Woodcraft, his never failing good nature and willingness to work made him scores of warm friends among visiting sportsmen. He was an expert moose caller, excelled as a ranoeman, was a crack shot with the rifle and one of the best wing shots in the province. On one occasion while bird hunting, he flushed a pair of partridges near the forks of a woodroad, and although they started off in different directions he brought down one with each barrel, a most difficult achievement.

Failing health compelled Mr. Cremin to give up woodcraft some years ago, and he found employment as a chauffeur. For a time he worked for the late Dr. H. H. McNally and afterwards for Mr. Guilford Hammond. For several years he has been driving an auto for the Windsor Hotel and was very popular with the travelling public.

Surviving Relatives.
The deceased was fifty-eight years of age and a bachelor. He is survived by two brothers, Mr. Charles Cremin, the well known guide of this city, who is on a business trip to New York and will return home at noon tomorrow and Laughlin Cremin of Bangor, Me. The hour for the funeral has not yet been arranged.

MOVE TO QUASH
MINTO LIQUOR
CONVICTION

Alex. Vandermerian
Found Guilty Last
Month—Time Extended
in Pinder Co. vs
Munro.

Common motions being heard this morning by the Appeal Division, Supreme Court, J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., ex parte Alex. Vandermerian, moved for rule absolute to quash conviction under the Intoxicating Liquor Act made by Scott W. McLeod, in the County of Sunbury, Justice of the Peace.

In this case conviction was made at Minto January 18th a fine of \$200 being imposed. No jurisdiction by a Justice of the Peace was claimed in the case by Mr. Winslow the penalty exceeding \$40. The arrest was made by Sub-inspector James Welton.

Order was made returnable next term.

Saint John Case
C. F. Inches, K. C., ex parte Charles H. McDonald, moved for rule absolute removing into the Supreme Court a judgment of Mr. Justice LeBlanc sitting as persona designata on review.

The ground urged was lack of jurisdiction on the part of the judge. Motion that judgment be quashed and set aside.

In the Saint John City Court the appellant McDonald secured judgment but on review before Mr. Justice LeBlanc a new trial with jury in the Saint John City Court was ordered.

Pinder vs Munro Appeal
Re Pinder Lumber and Milling Co. and Herbert Caverhill, appellants, and Segee Munro and Hugh Munro, J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., moved for extension of time and adjournment to next term.

Motion was granted.
This action was for trespass on lumber lands in the western part of York County.

Docket Taken Up
Court took up the docket the first case heard being Long, an infant, by next friend, et al vs. McLaughlin et al, in which G. H. V. Belyea, K. C., for defendants, moved for verdict for defendants or for new trial or for reduction of verdict. This case was being heard when court rose.

DISBARMENT
OF DAVIDSON
AND HUNTON

Completed This Morn-
ing Before Supreme
Court on Motion of F.
R. Taylor, K. C.

The disbarment of Roy A. Davidson and Sidney H. Hunton, barristers of Saint John who absconded from the Province some months ago previous to investigation of acts with which they were charged, was completed before the Supreme Court this morning.

Against one there was a charge of theft of bonds and against the other a charge of a spurious sale of property, as well as other matters.

Motion by F. R. Taylor.

The matter came up on the motion of F. R. Taylor, K. C., president of the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick, who moved that the rule disbarring them be made absolute. Dr. Taylor said that no return of the rule had been made and for that reason action could be taken at once.

Disbarment Ordered

Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen said that the rule would be made absolute and there would be an order disbarring Messrs. Hunton and Davidson and striking their names off the roll as Solicitors and Attorneys of the Court.

Trustee and Inspectors.

The creditors of Patrick Michaud of Siegas, Parish of St. Ann, County of Madawaska, met Monday afternoon in the office of E. A. MacKay, official receiver. They named L. J. Dionne of Edmundston trustee and H. S. Wade of Perth, H. S. Hatfield of Edmundston and Camille Gaudet of Edmundston inspectors.

Creditors Meeting This Afternoon.

The creditors of J. Weiner an absconding debtor of this city whose business was placed in the Bankruptcy Court recently, are meeting this afternoon.

The appeal of Palatine Insurance Co. vs. Begin et al, was set over until the next term, counsel consenting.
