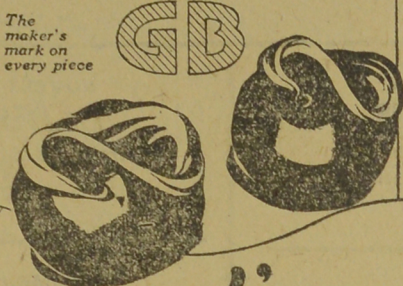

MANY TONS OF CENTS ARE DROPPED INTO SLOT MACHINES; WEIGHING DEVICES POPULAR

Tons of cents slide down penny-in-the slot weighing machines annually—most of them in the summer.

In Providence alone yearly 560,000 mortals climb aboard the wiggly platforms to send said cents jingling down the tin throats of the most familiar of all money collectors.

Five hundred and sixty thousand pairs of eyes follow the hand around the dial or are glued to the little tray whereupon the rasping, metallic inwards disgorge, the ticket weight and date neatly printed. Five hundred and sixty thousand mortals step down to feast or fast, according to the story told by the dial and ticket. Figured in walking hours, somebody is weighing every thirty seconds, says the Providence Journal.

The proof is easy. A survey of the city reveals those figures not only trust-worthy but really conservative. At the railroad station there are eleven weighing machines in constant use. Their total receipts for a year amount to \$800, indicating that 60,000 weights are registered for 60,000 persons patronize them.

Receipts Are Great.

The records of a large downtown drug store show monthly receipts from its penny-in-the-slot machines ranging from \$40 in the winter months to an \$80 top through the summer, or that from 4000 to 5000 people are weighed monthly.

The 8000 total prevails through June July and August. September sees a slight decline. October drops to 7000 and so down to the 4000 minimum. For the year a grand total of 65,000 is attained. Other Providence stores belonging to the same chain register a total of 85,000 weight customers.

The five-and-tens, whose customers are always equipped with cash, furnish a cool 300,000. Other stores, shops and scores of cold places where "Correct weight, 1 cent," is available add at least 50,000. That makes the 50,000 and all authorities agree that it is a very conservative estimate.

The fact that this is fully twice population of the city doesn't invalidate the figures. Tourists and other transients are just as likely to do their weighing-in here as in their own home towns. Moreover, those addicted to the weighing habit are great repeaters. Some of them are "regulars", weighing themselves at least weekly.

Every Bit Helps.

It is easy to see how the machines gather their annual harvest of some 2000 or 2300 pounds of coppers.

FRINGE CLINGS TO SKIRT OF FASHION.

Fringe again becomes extremely popular for evening occasions, forming tiered skirt effects, cape backs and hem finishes. Both silk and beaded fringes are used, and among the newer silk types are fringes printed in contrasting designs. Hawaiian straw fringe in gay colors is also among the novelties. Metal fringe adorns metal cloth wraps and gowns.

Since we will see much black in frocks and wraps the colored georgette handkerchief edged with wide black silk lace or net becomes a smart accessory. Little squares of ecru georgette bordered deeply in black lace make an adorable handkerchief for dress wear. One can make these kerchiefs at little cost and with little effort.

Vivid hued dresses of afternoon or evening type invariably use the large ragged chrysanthemum as a shoulder corsage. The flower matches exactly the shade of the frock, often being made of the same material.

Transparent velvets are entering into the mode for fall. Some plain velvets are so sheer that they are transparent when held to the light and checks and plaids of velvet designed on chiffon backgrounds also supply the demand for transparency.

APPLE DUMPLINGS.

The materials are: 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon lard, ¾ cup sweet milk.

The sifted dry ingredients are worked into the butter and lard and the milk added. Rolled out about half an inch thick, the dough is cut in pieces large enough to encase a peeled and quartered apple. The dumplings are then placed in a steamer over boiling water and steamed from 30 to 40 minutes, or until the apples are tender. They are served with a pitcher of "dip," i. e., milk to which some cream has been added, and sugar and nutmeg.

LIGHT FRUIT CAKE.

One half pound each of butter, flour, currants, candied peel and sugar, 1 teaspoon nutmeg a few chopped almonds, the juice and rind of 1 lemon, 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons baking powder. Beat the butter to a cream, add the eggs, one by one and then the other ingredients. Bake in a paper lined and greased tin a moderate oven from one to hours.

DATE PIE.

One pkg. dates, 2 cups milk, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 3 tablespoons cornstarch, small pinch of salt.

Line plate with rich crust and bake; let it cool, then fill with dates cut in small pieces. Make a custard, scald 2 cups of milk in double boiler; mix 1 cup of sugar, yolks of 2 eggs, 3 tablespoons cornstarch and small pinch of salt, with a little cold milk; stir this into hot milk and cook until stirring constantly. When cooked 10 minutes take and pour over dates.

Frost pie with the beaten whites of 2 eggs, ¼ cup of sugar; brown in oven. "Fit for a king."

TEAKETTLE HAS GONE FROM THE N. Y. KITCHENS

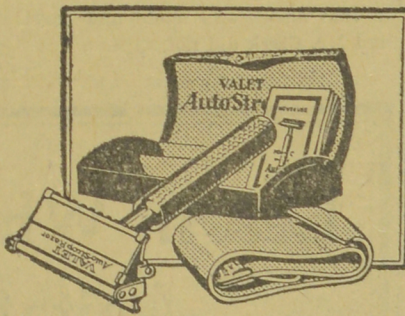
