BUDGET BROUGHT DOWN IN THE NOVA SCOTIA HOUSE; DEFICIT OF OVER \$1,000,000 LOOKED FOR

Halifax, March 5—Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Premier of Nova Scotia brought down the budget at this afternoon's session of the Legislative Assembly, announcing that on March 8 he would move that the house go into committee of supply for consideration of the estimates. The budget calls for an estimated expenditure during the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1926, of \$6,666,674.64, against an expenditure in 1925, according to the public accounts tabled in the House March 2, of \$5,956,544.24.

The budget speech was replied to by Hon. William Chisholm, leader of the opposition, who agreed that the increased expenditure was probably necessary, but was not in keeping with the pre-election promises of the Conservative party to reduce expenditures and lower taxation. He criticised the method by which figures were arrived at in the public schools, accusing the government of departing from the usual system for the purpose of creating a more attractive report for 1926. The debate was brief.

Audit Referred to.

Before entering upon consideration of the details as set forth in the estimates, Premier Rhodes referred to the report, tabled in the House on February 9, of the firm of accountants who made an independent audit of the public accounts last year, copies of which are being prepared for general distribution. Financial statements submitted in previous years had been extremely unreliable, he said, and quoted an instance in which a net deficit of \$7,364.62 reported by the government as at September 30, 1924 is shown to be underestimated by no less a sum than \$1,733,774.79.

\$1,180,866 Deficit in 1925.

The deficit for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1925, as set forth in the auditors report amounted to \$1,180,866.37. The estimated deficit for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1926 was given by the Premier as \$1,127,374.72.

Premier Rhodes pointed out the highly favorable prices received on bond issues in connection with recent loans, indicating, he said, that the

province rated high in the money markets of the world. More loans would be imperative, the Premier said, stating that the overdraft at the present was over \$2,000,000. The Premier drew attention to the low rate of bank interest required on overdrafts since December last when by arrangement with the banks the government was able to reduce the rate on overdrafts from 6 per cent. to 5 per cent. per annum.

On the other hand the rate of interest to be allowed on credit balances in those banks was reduced from 4 to 3 per cent. As it is rarely there is a credit balance, the arrangement, Premier Rhodes said, would save the province a considerable amount.

The per capita debt of the province was given as \$69 as compared with \$100 in Ontario, \$114 in Manitoba, \$72 in Saskatchewan, \$134 in Alberta and \$142 in British Columbia.

The estimated revenue for 1926 amounts to \$5,295,978.92, as against the amount shown in the public accounts for 1925 a \$4,467,483.54.

Military Bill Unpaid.

Among the items under the heading of provincial treasurer's department were: \$25,000 set aside for a plebiscite should it be necessary to take this procedure; \$2,000 to cover the expense of the railway freight commission; \$51,750 for the independent audit; \$30,000 for the royal commission inquiring into the Nova Scotia coal industry, and \$13,000 as a loan to the United Mine Workers of America. It was pointed out by the Premier that no provision had been made for payment of the bill amounting to \$134,084.65 rendered by the Dominion Government for service of the military in Cape Breton last year.

"Until our responsibility and liability in the matter is decided we shall hold this account in entire abeyance," said the Premier.

To Probe Water Powers.

Under the department of public services heading, a sum of \$25,000 was being set aside for an investigation into the water power of the province, the Premier said.

To Maintain the Charter.

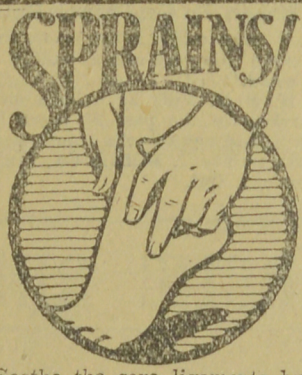

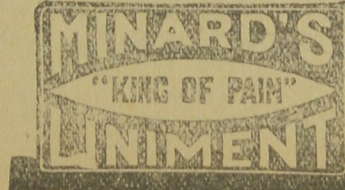
Instruction to Local Police.

SHORTER SKIRTS BIG PROBLEM IN NOVA SCOTIA

The problem of shorter hours in Nova Scotia has given way to the problem of shorter skirts. Principal David Solaan, whose age the Canadian Press neglects to give us, and which fact might have explained much has decreed that girl students must wear skirts that reach at least to a point "one-quarter the distance from knee-caps to ankles." This in the Provincial Normal School. The girls, of course, protest. They do not profess to want further emancipation from fetters which have already receded to the knees and, as one writer picturesquely phrases it, "points north," but they apparently stand firmly upon the rock of "what we've shown we'll show."

It is a pretty issue, Honorable William Chisholm, a Liberal leader who evidently thinks that this is one question that must be decided by something more precise than a "chart" demanding a Royal Commission to look into it—or at it. We have no doubt that volunteers for such a Commission could be found—even without pay. But we don't think a Commission will be appointed. What we venture to predict is—and we don't wish to be thought partisan—that Premier Rhodes will insist upon facing this issue personally and alone. And while we have no desire to intrude upon a Nova Scotia domestic question, we think we can assure the Chloes and Susies who are troubled that he can be depended upon to look at their problem with sympathy and discrimination.

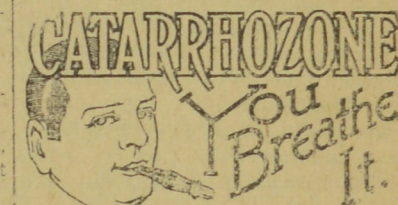
