### Fredericton High Into Finals for Provincial Title

**Swamped St. Stephen High 10 to 0—Will Meet Bathurst High Probably in Home-and-Home Games—Miles Scored Six of Home Team's Goals.**

The Fredericton High School hockey team is on its way to a New Brunswick scholastic title. Bathurst having shut out Sussex High at Bathurst last night and Fredericton High having shut out St. Stephen 10 to 0 here. The Bathurst and Fredericton School teams are to meet probably in home-and-home games for the Provincial title.

The Yellow and Black was distinctly on Friday night. Probably the team has suffered during the season through not having experienced sufficient opposition but last night they showed that they had enough to put them into the provincial interscholastic finals. The Border team showed nothing beyond individual efforts which usually brought them within long range of the Fredericton net. The home team had it on them in both team-play and individual effort. The score just about indicated the merits of the two teams.

#### Some Features.

In spite of the one-sided score there were some features which made the game attractive. Miles' individual and combined efforts stood out. He showed poorly against Rothesay Collegiate in the final league game but against St. Stephen he scored six of the ten goals. What was left were divided among his teammates. St. Stephen hardly came within reach of scor-

ing. They worked hard in the last period to break the goose-egg but without success. The contest between Prilutsky the Jewish right wing of St. Stephen and Thompson the Syrian left wing of Fredericton were watched with interest. Thompson had the better although Prilutsky was about the most effective man on his team. Neill again was prominent with his end-to-end rushes and scored once. Horncastle played the same style but did not score. The St. Stephen players seldom got within shooting distance of the Fredericton net their scoring attempts almost all being long distance efforts.

#### The Game.

The attendance should have been larger the crowd being small. The St. Stephen team was accompanied by quite a number of supporters as the value of coming hockey players evidently is recognized at the Border. The game was not in progress many minutes before it was apparent that the result was to be different from that in St. Stephen. Miles scored the first working in with Horncastle. Neill made the next on an end to end rush. Miles scored the next after a mixup right in front of the St. Stephen net after a combined Fredericton rush.

The second period was all Fredericton High and St. Stephen was put

beyond any eleventh hour rally. Miles started scoring on a rush and wing shot. He combined with Neill for another five minutes later. Five minutes after that he scored on a rebound. Thompson who shot poorly throughout the game, scored his only goal on a rebound not long before the period closed.

The last period opened with Fredericton not lying back on their lead. Miles again began the scoring putting the rubber in from a mixup in front of the net. Horncastle made one from a long rush. Keenan scored on a pass after a combined rush.

The penalties were light McAlenen serving two minutes for St. Stephen High and Miles and Keenan two minutes each for Fredericton High.

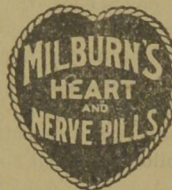

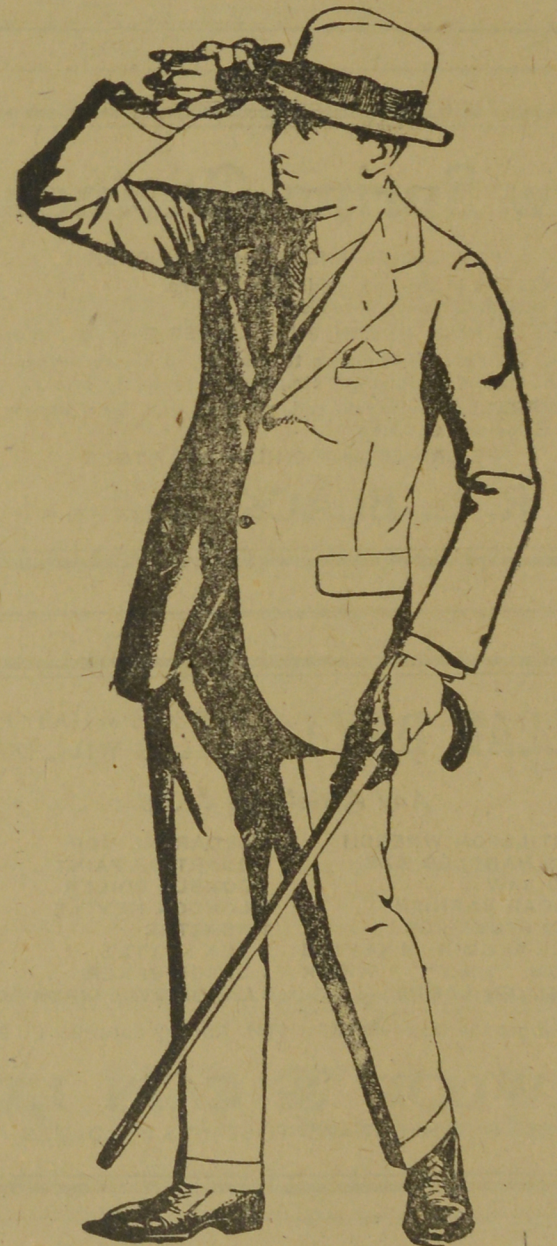
