Merchants Offered Good Values for the Day — Streets Crowded, and the Trade in Various Lines Good.

The advertising which the event was given and the transportation arrangements have resulted in a great turnout of shoppers. Many of them are from points outside Fredericton but the city and neighboring towns also sent their quota. The result was that the streets were lively from an early hour and the places of business were crowded by shoppers.

Mock Trial at College.

The annual Mock Trial of the undergraduates of the University of New Brunswick took place last night. John F. Rankine, of Woodstock, was judge, and counsel were C. R. Blair, of Ottawa; W. Stuart McFarlane of Fredericton; G. W. Mersereau, of Fredericton and J. E. Stuart, of Fredericton Junction. There was a large attendance and the trial was conducted in an entertaining manner.

Mock Parliament

The annual election for U. N. B. Mock Parliament took place Friday. The Imperialistic Party was returned to power. This party was in power last year under the leadership of E. O'C. Broderick, of Saint John. W. Stuart McFarlane, of Fredericton, will be the Premier this year; W. W. Graham, of Milltown, Governor-General, and C. H. Blair, of Ottawa, Speaker. T. L. Foulkes, of Campbellton, is to lead the opposition, composed of the Students' Party.

Preparing for Next Winter.

George F. Burdea of the Chief Sealer's Office has returned from Northumberland County where he was on official business. He saw at Ferryville four carloads of supplies destined for camps of the Miramichi Lumber Co. north of that point. Four pairs of horses and a heavy plow had been used to open the roads to the camps. The snow was about four feet deep. These supplies are for woods operation of the winter of 1926-27.

THE POLICE COMMISSION ORGANIZED.

The Police Commission of the City of Fredericton was in session Friday for the first time since its personnel was changed by the election of W. G. Clark as mayor and the appointment of ex-Ald. D. W. Olts in the place of W. A. B. McLehlan. Organization was completed. Ex-Ald. Olts was chairman and Police Magistrate Walter Limerick was re-elected secretary. Mayor Clark is the other member of the Board. Police matters in general were discussed as there had been no meeting of the Commission for some time. There have been rumors of economy in connection with the police by curtailment of the force or reduction in pay but the Commission did not consider such matters.

PROHIBITION ENFORCEMENT STAFF ACTIVE

Quebec Beer Seized at St. Leonard — Two Convictions and Fines — Other Prosecutions Coming.

There has been recent activity in connection with the enforcement of the Prohibition Act in the Upper Saint John Valley. Inspector Fraser Saunders has returned after taking part in activities in Madawaska and Victoria Counties. At St. Leonard there was seizure of Quebec beer to the value of \$1,000. This was the property of Lebel and Violette. Prosecution will follow.

At Grand Falls before Police Magistrate Kelly a man was convicted and fined \$100 for having liquor in his possession. A woman was convicted and fined a similar amount for having Quebec beer on her premises.

BOARD OF TRADE OFFICE GOES TO THE CITY HALL

Meeting Friday Night Decided on That Action — Charter to be Maintained for Present Year.

The Fredericton Board of Trade at a meeting held at the office last night decided to close the office and remove all the Board's records and documents to the City Hall in accordance with the desire of the City Council which granted the Board \$750 for the present year instead of \$1,500 as formerly. The removal began today and the office is now closed. A meeting of the Fredericton U. N. B. Club is to be held there Tuesday night, next having been booked but no other meetings are to be arranged for the office.

Twenty members of the Board and others met last night at the special meeting called for the purpose of considering the future of the Board of Trade. His Worship Mayor Clark who has strongly supported the action of the City Council in reducing the grant was present. The attendance of owners of garages, service-stations, hotels and other businesses which might be particularly interested in the tourist business, was meagre although they had been specially requested to attend and it had been thought that they might contribute to a special fund which would keep the publicity office open for the coming summer, for the benefit of the motorists who might desire information.

The majority of those present spoke. His Worship the Mayor was the only one to support the action of the City Council in reducing the grant and removing the Board of Trade office to City Hall. The others emphasized the value of the office for the many organizations which used it and also for purposes of publicity.

Resolution adopted.

The Board by formal motion adopted the following resolution:—

That this Board appoint a committee to take an inventory of the property of the Board with the idea of disposing of same, and to interview the landlord and try to obtain the cancellation of the lease at the first of May next and suggest methods of paying off the liabilities of the Board (Continued on Page Five.)
