Poultry Fanciers of City And Vicinity Prominent In Exhibition Prize-Lists

Prof. Graham of Macdonald College, Spoke in Terms of Highest Praise of Quality of Birds Shown Here—Suggested More Light in Quarters.

The judging of the Poultry Section of the Fredericton Exhibition was completed fairly early in the week and the pens are all tagged now with the cards showing the various awards. Prof. Graham of Macdonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, Que., who judged this important section spoke in highest terms of the quality of the birds shown. He was particularly warm in his praise of the manner in which they were penned and of the care which was taken of them.

With regard to the quarters in which the poultry are shown he suggested a couple of skylights to improve the lighting by day.

Although the Poultry Section at the Fredericton Exhibition has been larger it has not been surpassed in quality.
