

MURDERED  
GIRL DID NOT  
BELONG HERE

Edith Green Murdered  
in Boston Not Girl of  
Same Name Who Left  
Few Months Ago.

The identification of the girl murdered in Boston whose dismembered body was discovered two days ago near that city, as Edith Green with no further explanation as to identity, caused great anxiety in Fredericton on the part of the friends of a girl of the same name who left here a few months ago. A telegram was sent to the address of the Miss Edith Green who formerly lived here, by Mrs. John Delong. Today a reply came from the Police Department explaining that the murdered girl had been a resident of Boston for fifteen years and had been positively identified.

Photographs Not Like Her.

This morning Mrs. Delong was shown by a reporter of the Mail the picture in the Boston Globe taken by a police staff photographer. There was no resemblance to the young lady formerly living here. Other friends of her said the same, when shown the press picture.

Description Tallied.

The anxiety was felt because the first descriptions tallied with those of Miss Green to a considerable extent and the announcement of her name on identification by a sister added to the fear felt by friends. Miss Green and her sister left for Boston a few months ago and entered a hospital to train as nurses.

MARKS SHOW 136 PASSED  
WITHOUT CONDITIONS

Forty-eight Placed in Division III, Half of Them  
on Cross-tests—Three Failures in Total List  
of 187—Individual Marks Withheld Until Af-  
ter Award of Lieut.-Governor's Medal.

The Fredericton School Board today announced the classification of candidates in High School Entrance Examinations. Those who passed are classified, Division I, 65; Division II 71. Others are classified as follows.—Made Division II mark but fell to Division III in cross-tests, 24; Division III 24, Failed 3. The percentage of failures in the total of 187 is very low. No individual marks will be given until the winner of the Lieutenant-Governor's Medal is announced. This is because of re-examination of papers of those classed highest, to determine a winner of the medal in each county.
